GENERAL SUMMER SEASON BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS

DAILY CATCH LIMITS:

Trout, Whitefish, Steelhead—Not to exceed 6 pounds and 1 fish; provided the numbers taken do not exceed 12 fish; provided the above bag limit shall not exceed 2 steelhead over 20" in length. **Note:** This bag limit shall not be construed as limiting any one person to less than 2 trout per day, regardless of weight.

Exception—No person under the age of 16 years, while fishing for trout without a fishing license, shall catch, take or kill in any one day more than 4 pounds and 1 fish; provided the numbers taken do not exceed 8 fish; provided the above bag limit shall not exceed 2 steelhead over 20" in length.

Exception—2 fish per day in Bayley Lake, Stevens county, and 2 fish over 12" in length per day in that portion of the Spokane River from Seven Mile Bridge to the Monroe Street Bridge in Spokane county.

Exception—7 fish per day in Lake Desire, King county, Bonney Lake, Pierce county, Ebeey Lake, Snohomish county, and Hannan Lake, Snohomish county.

Exception—No catch limit on Whitefish in the Columbia, Snake and Pend Oreille rivers.

Silver Trout (bonus limit)—In addition to the regular daily catch limit shown above, it shall be lawful to catch an additional 4 pounds of silver trout, but not to exceed 8 additional silver trout, from the following lakes:

Bass—Not to exceed 20 pounds and 1 bass. **Note:** It shall be lawful to take a limit of bass in addition to a limit of trout.

Bluegills, Catfish, Perch, Crappie, Sunfish—No catch limit.

POSSESSION LIMITS—Daily catch limits and possession limits are the same. One day's catch limit is the total possession limit.

Note: The weight or length limits as used in this regulation shall mean the weight or length before any part of the fish is removed or otherwise processed.

WEEKLY CATCH LIMIT—STEELHEAD ONLY: The weekly catch limit shall not exceed two day's bag limit. The term "week" as used herein shall begin on Sunday morning and end on Saturday at midnight.

ANNUAL CATCH LIMIT—STEELHEAD ONLY: Thirty steelhead over 20" in length, not to exceed 20 steelhead taken from the Columbia River and tributaries above Bonneville Dam, including the Snake River and its tributaries.

Note: Annual catch limit is on a calendar year basis effective January 1, 1963.

Note: Any steelhead over 20" in length caught from the main Columbia River below Bonneville Dam shall be recorded on the punch card as Lower Columbia River.

SIZE LIMITS—General Summer Season

Bass, Bluegills, Catfish, Perch, Crappie, Sunfish—No size limit.

All other game fish—Minimum length of 6".

EXCEPTION: See individual counties for any exceptions to above size limits.

The following restrictions shall apply only to waters designated as "Restricted Fishing Waters":

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to catch, take or kill more than 3 trout in any one day, and no person shall have in his possession at any time more than 3 trout taken from said waters.
- B. No person shall kill or possess any trout under 12 inches in length. Trout caught under 12 inches in length shall be returned to the waters from which taken with the least possible injury. It is unlawful to release trout over 12 inches in length.
- C. No person shall use as bait while fishing, any fish eggs, worms, insects, live bait, meat of any type, or any other perishable substance.
- D. No person shall fish in any other manner than with one line or rod held in the hand. Such line shall not have attached to it more than two flies or one flasher, spoon or artificial lure. Such lure shall have no more than two single hooks attached thereto. The use of double, treble or any multiple hooks shall be unlawful.
- E. No person shall fish from any boat, raft, or any other floating device equipped with or propelled by machinery.
- F. No person shall deposit into these waters any feed or other substance for the purpose of attracting game fish.

FLY FISHING ONLY—Legal angling tackle is limited to dry flies, wet flies, bucktail flies, nymphs and streamers.

It is unlawful for any person to fish for or to take game fish in or from waters restricted to fly fishing only by use of any metal, plastic, or wooden lure, plug, spinner, spinner fly, or any fly to which there is attached or tied any weight of any kind.

Fixed spool reels and/or monofilament lines may not be used in fishing in those waters restricted to fly fishing only.

Any type of angling whereby the fly is cast directly from the reel shall be prohibited.

It shall be unlawful to use any motor propelled craft to fish in waters which are restricted to fly fishing only.

STEELHEAD FISHING PERMIT (PUNCH CARD) REQUIREMENTS—Effective January 1, 1963, every person while fishing for steelhead in any waters designated under summer and/or winter "Steelhead Management Waters" MUST have in his possession a Steelhead Fishing Permit (punch card). Immediately upon catching a steelhead over twenty (20) inches in length, the holder of a Steelhead Fishing Permit (punch card) shall completely remove from the card one punch and shall enter on the corresponding space the date of the catch and the name of the water in which the fish was caught.

NOTE: Every person possessing a steelhead fishing permit (punch card) shall, by February 1, 1964, return such card to any authorized license dealer or shall mail such card to the Department of Game.

FISHING FOR GAME FISH IN SALT WATER—It is lawful to fish for sea run cutthroat, steelhead and Dolly Varden trout the year around below the mouths of rivers emptying into Puget Sound, Hood Canal and Straits of Juan de Fuca, or bays, harbors and sounds that are connected therewith. A license is required. A punch card is required from January 1, 1963 to December 31, 1963 if steelhead are taken. Size and possession limits are the same as provided for in this pamphlet for game fish. It is lawful to use feed and multiple gear when fishing for game fish in salt water.

1963 WINTER SEASONS, BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS

The following limits apply only to the waters listed below. (See individual waters for open season dates)

STEELHEAD AND OTHER TROUT:

DAILY CATCH, SIZE AND POSSESSION LIMITS:

Daily catch limit—Two (2) trout regardless of weight.

Minimum size limit—Ten (10) inches.

Possession limit—Not to exceed four (4) trout regardless of weight.

WEEKLY CATCH LIMIT—STEELHEAD ONLY—Six (6) steelhead over twenty (20) inches in length. The term "week" as used herein shall begin on Sunday and end on Saturday at midnight.

ANNUAL CATCH LIMIT—STEELHEAD ONLY—

Thirty (30) steelhead trout over 20" in length, not to exceed twenty (20) steelhead taken from the Columbia River and tributaries above Bonneville Dam, including the Snake River and its tributaries. Note: Annual catch limit is on a calendar year basis effective January 1, 1963.

Note: Any steelhead over 20" in length caught from the main Columbia River below Bonneville Dam shall be recorded on the punch card as Lower Columbia River.

WHITEFISH:

DAILY CATCH, SIZE AND POSSESSION LIMITS:

Daily catch limit—Not to exceed seven and one-half (7½) pounds and one (1) fish, provided the numbers taken do not exceed fifteen (15) whitefish.

Exception: There shall be no catch or possession limit on whitefish caught in the Columbia, Snake and Pend Oreille Rivers. (Does not include tributaries.)

Minimum size limit—Six (6) inches.

Possession Limits shall not exceed one day's catch limit.

Note: A person may take a limit of whitefish in addition to a limit of trout during the winter season.

WHITEFISH—SEASON:

Eastern Washington—January 1 to February 28 and December 1 to 31. This season applies to those rivers and streams east of the summit of the Cascades, including the Big White Salmon River, and in such waters and at such times as they are open to fishing during the winter fishing seasons; in addition, the waters in Chelan and Okanogan counties shall be open from January 1 to March 31, and from November 1 to December 31. Exceptions: Wenatchee River, Chelan county, is closed from November 1 to December 1; Asotin Creek, Asotin county, is closed.

NOTES ON MEANS OF TAKING GAME FISH:

Artificial Lights Unlawful—It is unlawful to fish for game fish in any waters of the state of Washington by the aid of, or use of, any artificial light.

Juvenile Age and Bag Limit—It is unlawful for any person fourteen years of age or over to fish in any waters restricted to juvenile fishing only. The daily bag limit and possession limit for fish taken in waters restricted to juvenile fishing only shall not exceed eight fish per day or four pounds and one fish.

Live Fish for Bait Unlawful—It is unlawful for any person to use live fish as bait while fishing for game fish or to possess live fish with intent to use them as bait while so fishing.

Feeding Unlawful—It is unlawful to place or deposit in any waters in the state of Washington any fish eggs, or fish roe or food, or other substance for the purpose of attracting, collecting or feeding fish EXCEPT in designated lakes shown in individual counties where "feeding" is lawful.

Multiple Gear Lawful—It is lawful to use multiple gear in all waters of the state, EXCEPT in designated waters open to fly fishing only.

One Line for Fishermen—No person shall fish for game fish in any other manner than with one line or rod held in hand; such line or rod shall be under his immediate and absolute control.

Two Hook Maximum—No line may have attached to it more than two hooks or flies, or one plug which may have attached to it any number of hooks.

Closure by All Dams—It is unlawful to fish within 400 feet downstream from any man-made dam or other man-made obstruction or any fishway or fish ladder unless otherwise specified under individual counties.

HUNTING OR FISHING PROHIBITED IN AREAS DESIGNATED AS EXTRA FIRE HAZARDS

Session Laws of 1953, Chapter 24, Section 1, provides that no one legally entering the region of extra fire hazard will be permitted to use the area for recreational purposes which are prohibited to the general public under the terms of this act.

USE OF PUBLIC FISHING AREAS—It is unlawful to park vehicles on boat launching areas or block travel thereto when so posted. Certain other acts are unlawful, such as camping, discharging firearms or fireworks and building fires.

LICENSE FEES COVERING HUNTING AND FISHING

RESIDENT: A "resident" means any citizen of the United States or person who has in good faith declared his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States, and who for at least ninety days (90 days) immediately preceding any application for a license has maintained a permanent place of abode within this state with the intent to permanently reside within this state.

ALIEN: An "alien" means any person who is not a citizen of the United States and has not in good faith declared his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States.

NON-RESIDENT: A "non-resident" means any person who is neither a "resident" nor an "alien" as defined.

This license permits any resident to hunt and fish in any county of the state until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to hunt or fish therein.
2. State, resident citizen fishing license 4.50
This license permits any resident to fish only in any county of the state until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to fish therein.
3. State, resident citizen hunting license 4.50
This license permits any resident to hunt only in any county of the state until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to hunt therein.
4. County, resident citizen hunting and fishing license 4.25
This license permits any resident to hunt and fish in the county wherein he resides and for which the license is issued until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to hunt or fish therein.
5. County, resident citizen fishing license 3.00
This license permits any resident to fish only in the county wherein he resides and for which the license is issued until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to fish therein.
6. State, 7-day non-resident fishing license 4.00
This license permits any person who is a non-resident or any alien temporarily sojourning in the state of Washington to fish in any county of the state for a period of seven (7) consecutive days following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to fish therein.
7. State, non-resident fishing license 15.00
This license permits any person who is a non-resident or who has been a resident of the state for less than ninety days (90 days), or any alien to fish in any county of the state until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to fish therein.
8. State, non-resident hunting license 35.00
This license permits any person who is a non-resident of the state or who has been a resident of the state for less than ninety days (90 days) or any alien to hunt in any county of the state until the first day of January next following the date of issuance, when it is lawful to hunt therein.

Goat Tags are obtainable only by permit holders, and will be issued only by the State Game Department, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington.

Non-resident Supplement Goat Tag..... 25.00

All non-residents and aliens in addition to a valid hunting license required by law to hunt mountain goat, must have in their possession a Non-resident Supplemental Goat Tag. Goat tags are obtainable only by permit holders and will be issued only by the State Game Department, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington.

SERVICE CHARGE

License Dealers are required by law to charge a fee for their service in issuing a license. Fees to be charged are shown on the covers of the respective types of license. Agents are not permitted to charge a fee for issuing supplemental licenses (tags) or permit cards.

LICENSE REQUIREMENTS FOR JUVENILES —SERVICEMEN—INDIANS

1. Juveniles:

FISHING: Any person under the age of 16 years may fish for game fish without a license. Juveniles fishing for steelhead must obtain a steelhead permit card which is issued free of charge. Dealers will enter "Juvenile" in the space reserved for the fishing license number.

HUNTING: Any person including those under the age of 16 years must have a license to hunt game birds or game animals.

DUCK STAMP: Any citizen under the age of 16 years may hunt migratory waterfowl without a duck stamp.

TRAPPING: Any person, including those under the age of 16 years, must have a trapping license to take fur-bearers.

2. Servicemen:

Any serviceman regardless of the length of time in the state of Washington, who is actually stationed at a military installation within the state of Washington, is entitled to purchase a resident license. All servicemen must have a license.

3. Indians:

Treaty Indians

Any person of Indian ancestry who is eligible by virtue of the Stevens Treaty may hunt or fish without a license within the area originally ceded by his Tribe as set forth in said Treaty. Such persons are not required to possess deer, elk, or goat tags or permit cards while hunting or fishing within such areas.

Controlled Hunt Applications

Treaty Indians, hunting without a license, may submit applications for controlled hunts (special draw-

ings) only if the areas selected are within the boundaries of lands originally ceded by their Tribe.

A letter sent to the State Game Department office, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, which contains the applicant's name, address, tribal name, and the deer or elk game management unit number and county in which the applicant desires to hunt will be considered as an application for a controlled hunt.

Non-Treaty, Non-Resident and Alien Indians

Persons of Indian ancestry in this category have no special privileges and are required to be licensed in same manner as all other persons when hunting and/or fishing off their respective reservations.

The State Game Commission does not have authority to make any change in license requirements or conditions as stated above.

SOME FACTS

Twenty-three species of game fish are found in Washington. These include eleven different kinds of trout, ten species of spiny-rayed fish, and two others—the Montana grayling and the whitefish—which are classified as soft-rayed fish.

Average annual harvest by Washington sportsmen includes over 125,000 winter steelhead, 35,000 summer-run steelhead, and an estimated minimum 18,000,000 of other types of game fish; as well as more than 2 million 500 thousand game animals and birds.

The popularity of fishing in Washington is shown by the fact that nearly one in every four persons in the state does fish. About one in every nine hunts.

Results of a nationwide survey: in 1960, one in every four men fished, and one in every ten women fished; 25,323,000 sport fishermen in the United States spent \$2,690,872,000 and piled up 18,834,947,000 miles in automobiles.

Currently, approximately 750,000 Washington sportsmen are annually spending over \$100 million in pursuit of their sport. The fishermen's expenditure amounts to slightly under 55 per cent of the total. Of the expenditure, the sportsman pays about 3.5 per cent for his license; the other 96.5 per cent goes to the business economy.

It is estimated that nearly 90 per cent of the rainbow trout caught in Washington each year have their origin in a hatchery. Last year State Game Department hatcheries in Washington raised and released over 500 tons of fish.

The Washington State Game Department controls 286 public fishing sites on lakes, 74 parking and launching sites on streams, and is continually developing new public fishing sites. Present sites are listed on page 34 of this pamphlet.

Keeping up with costs—in terms of purchasing power the average state fishing license fee has actually decreased over 16 per cent since 1938. Although the majority of states have raised license fees within the past 20 years, the increases have not been sufficient to keep up with inflation.

Better than one out of three persons in Washington fishes for free. There are about 354,000 licensed resident fishermen, and 17,000 licensed non-residents. Approximately 150,000 juveniles fish for free, along with about 50,000 disabled veterans and oldsters. Managing fish for these non-paying persons spreads the money of the paying licensee a little thinner.

The use of dry food pellets has greatly increased efficiency of hatchery fish production. Compare the figures for 1956, when fish were fed a wet diet, with 1961 when hatcheries had converted to a diet largely of dry food:
