Dear Sirs:

Several days ago I received a circular from you
on STRANGERS IN THE LAND and ~~XXXXX~~ 1855-1955,
THE YAKIMA, at \$2.25 and \$2 respectively, and note
that you offer a dealer discount.

I do not have either of these items and am not
familiar with them, but I have been doing some
dealing in books, Americana, by mail. The discount
we generally get is 40% off retail. If you wished
to make me the same deal I will take a couple of
copies of each of the books. Let's see, that would
be \$8.50 less 40% or \$5.10. My check is enclosed if
you wish to accept this and no harm should be done
if you do not wish to deal on this.

I have some Americana for sale if you have any book
collectors. Have Samuel Parker, EXPLORING TOUR BEYOND
THE ROCKY MOUNTAINS, etc., 1835, but 5th. edition,
no map (but possibly available by facsimile), side
trim, but very good otherwise. Bound in black cloth,
(book has been rebound, library bind.) Also pertaining
to eastern Washington I have Lawrence Kip, ARMY LIFE
ON THE PACIFIC. Kips are pure hell to find but are
ordinarily worth only about 20 dollars and my Kip
here is priced at 40. It has an unusual binding and
was the personal property of one of Wright's officers,
carries title page signature. Also have a G. Wright-
John Mullan TOPOGRAPHICAL MEMOIR, a rare book.

Lest you think my sympathies were with the whites in
the conflict of 1858, I am writing and printing a history
of the Indian war of 1858, written as much as possible
from the Indian point of view.
