B.J. Pacius, who recently sold out the Mabton Chronicle has leased of Peye Andrae the Soda Springs for the coming season and will conduct an excellent summer resort.

A fine restaurant will be established, tents provided to lease and all of the privileges commensurate with the opportunities will be provided to give patrons of the resort an excellent outing if they choose to make that place their headquarters.

The Yakima Auto company has promised some concessions in rates and stated day trips may be made at a nominal charge.

The heretofore established charge for freighting may be mderated considerably—The Takima Terald, May 19, 1909.

Fully 150 people from North Yakima are encamped at Soda Springs and there is a line of tents several blocks long presenting the appearance of a small white city.

Practically all of the campers are from this town and they are enjoying themselves.

The plans which has been laid by the mineral sprins company recently taken over by Pete Andrea promise to turn the place into one of the most summer resorts in the state. The Yakima Herald, July 22, 1908.

There is no more attractive spot to be found in this vicinity for campers than the soda springs on the Yakima Indian reservation.

The water is excellent, while oak groves can be found in the vicinity and the reservation offers good fishing and hunting. Fred Hoffer lives in the neighborhood of the springs and furnishes grain and hay at reasonable prices. He will also, for those who are not provided with conveyance, take parties to and from the springs if he is notified by letter or otherwise—Yakima Herald, August 5, 1897.

The property of the Yakima Soda Springs company was sold at sheriff's sale on Saturday last to satisfy a judgment in favor of Stanton Cody for \$3376. Attorney Lewis D. Campbell of Tacoma bid in the mortgage-Yakima herald, Nov. 21, 1895.

The structure was a mere shell of small walue and inasmuch as themachinery was only slightly damaged, theloss is not seriously heavy--Yakima Herald, August 17, 1993.

He reports that there have been an hundred people camped at the springs at one time and that there are now upwards of fifty.

He said the hunting is good and the trout plentiful. The campers are enjoying life and each and every one of them is loaded down with good health-Yakima Herald, August 14, 1890.

With the coming week the season at Soda Springs will be brought to a close although the hotel will bekept open for a couple of weeks longer to accommodate guests who are drinking the water and taking the soda baths for their health.
