Also, I believe you will want to send George M. Martin, 216 S. 28th

Avenue, Yakima, Wash., your next Indian catalogues or Western Americana, also anything that lists stamps.

George is an attorney, a good collector and recently compiled the U.S. Postal Card Guide for some book company (a stamp publishing house) It is now in print.

It might be well to send him some back catalogues if available.

Besides considerable book purchases in the Americana line, including for occasional gifts, he has a top stamp collection and knocks off top awards at exhibitions in San Francisco, Portland, British Columbia etc.

It surprised me today when he told me he was not familiar with Shorey's. He gets around to Seattle occasionally too and likes to browse.

I'll be interested in seeing how the Treaty Centennial booklet went. When I got back from vacation I dropped by the agency and found several "orders" setting there that had been waiting around for three weeks. I only spotted a few of these around to help out the tribe. I called the agent in and asked him to get action because I don't want to get mixed up in anything that isn't run efficiently. But, that's the way some of the Indians are.
