Your Claim No. 029735% for \$400.00, repayment under the act of December 11, 1919, of purchase money paid on Outbreak and Snowshoe mining claims, a portion of mineral entry, Sacramento, California, 016676, Receipt No. 2905386, has been carefully examined and it is found that no part thereof may be allowed for the reasons hereinafter stated.

The records show that the entry was erroneously allowed and could not be confirmed as made for the reason that on June 4, 1875, patent issued for the Secret Cannon Quartz Mine, Mineral Lot No. 37, which embraces portions of original Lots 14, 15, and 16. Because of this conflict the entry was cancelled to that extent by letter of October 14, 1927, from the General Land Office. Thereafter the Forest Service filed a protest against the Snowshoe and Outbreak claims and subsequent thereto you filed withdrawal of the application for patent as to said two claims.

Under the Act of December 11, 1919, in order that there may be a repayment of payments made, there must be a rejection by the Government in lieu of a relinquishment by the entryman. The records show that you filed withdrawal of the application which is considered a relinquishment within the meaning of the act of December 11, 1919, and repayment is not authorized.

I therefore certify that no balance is found due you from the United States.
