The Rodeo Game

The story of rodeo has no beginning or end. Of necessity, it encompasses the unfenced plains country of the past and the arena enclosure of the present, for the rodeo cowboy is cast from the same mold as the early day riders of the open range.

Rodeo was not born. It came into being during the early days of the cattle industry. The assertion that Santa Fe, New Mexico, in 1847, Deer Trail, Colorado, in 1869, or Pecos, Texas, in 1883, was the birthplace of rodeo may be accepted only in terms of locality, tied to certain conditions.

Prescott, Phoenix, Willcox and Williams in Arizona, all had early day rodeo contests; so also did Dodge City, Kansas; Denver, Grand Junction and Steamboat Springs in Colorado; Lander and Cheyenne in Wyoming; Miles City and Wibaux in Montana.

Between the birth of the cattle business, at the end of the War between the States, and the dates of the earliest rodeos rode the trail driving cowboys. Rodeo took form in the cow camps, matured along the trails to the feeding grounds in the North and then moved toward spectator acceptance in the more modern dress of arena competition.

In 1963, professional rodeo recorded the biggest year in its history. There were 582 cowboy contests—approved by the Rodeo Cowboys Association—across forty-one states and five Canadian provinces; these same rodeos paid out a thumping \$3,511,247 in prize money to establish another new mark.

For the 2,829 R.C.A. members it was the fifth season in a row the prize money payoff had climbed over three million dollars but the '63 bonanza was over a quarter-million more than the previous high set in '59.

Of all rodeos held under the R.C.A. banner each year, at least ninety-eight percent are sponsored by non-profit groups to benefit their community. One of the oldest, Cheyenne Frontier Days, now in its 68th year, fills hotel and motels within a sixty-mile radius of the Wyoming city during the six-day rodeo, and boosts the town's economy with 3½ million dollars in added business.

An estimated 18,000 visitors each spend \$75 during the annual 4-day Roundup at Pendleton, Ore., while the JayCee-sponsored rodeo at Phoenix, Ariz., in March, hikes local retail sales some 14.2 percent, besides raising funds for the organization's youth projects.

Financial reward varies for the competing cowboy, who pays his own way and receives only what he is good enough to win in the arena. The full-time pro estimates two thirds of what he wins goes for expenses and entry fees and plans his itinerary carefully, weighing output against income. Over the past ten years, the top money maker of the season has a \$35,303 winning average.

Rodeo has a simple system of deciding its world champions each year. High money winner in each event at the end of the season becomes the titlist. There are a total of seven such event championships—saddle and bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding, team roping and single steer tying—and an eighth title, the all-around cowboy crown, going to the big winner in two or more events. The most coveted title of all, no one-event contestant is eligible for the all-around championship.

Records of each contestant's winnings thru the year are kept by the R.C.A., tallied from itemized results sent in by the arena secretary of each member rodeo. These tabulated standings are printed bi-monthly for the cowboy kingdom in Rodeo Sports News, official publication of the R.C.A., whose editor, Gene Pruett, was saddle bronc riding champion in '48.

At a pre-set cutoff date, in November, the standings are audited by certified public accountants to determine the top fifteen cowboys in each event, who qualify for the sport's title playoffs, the National Finals Rodeo. Winnings there are added to seasonal earnings to decide the new champions.

In recognition of the new titlists, the R.C.A. pledges \$24,000 in cash awards, gold and silver belt buckles at \$275 each, and silver-mounted trophy saddles. The money total is divided, \$3,000 per event, with each event champion receiving \$1,200; second, third and fourth place winners, \$900, \$600 and \$300, in that order. The all-around champion gets \$1,500, the runner-up \$900, and third, \$600.

Cost of joining the R.C.A. is \$50 and includes a \$15 initiation fee. Annual dues are \$35, of which \$26.50 applies on an accident insurance policy carried for all members with a Dallas, Tex., company. Maximum coverage for each

injury is \$1,200, with a \$5,000 death benefit. Fatalities in competition have averaged one a year for the past two decades, while in '63 there were 411 injuries requiring medical treatment, a drop of 79 from the '62 accident figure.

Spectator count at R.C.A. rodeos in '63 rose to nearly nine and a half million, a climb of eight percent over the preceding year. Six rodeos televised nationally by ABC's Wide World of Sports program, were estimated to have been seen by ninety million viewers. The sale of television rights to ABC added \$160,000 to pro rodeo's coffers.

Nearly a third of the current R.C.A. roster are alumnae of either the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association, the National High School Rodeo Association or the American Junior Rodeo Association.

The N.I.R.A., founded in '49 at Sul Ross State College in Alpine, Tex., has 54 colleges in its charter now. Regional competition, from Louisiana to Oregon, among the 600 student cowboys and cowgirls, decides the teams to compete in their finals, during June, for the championships.

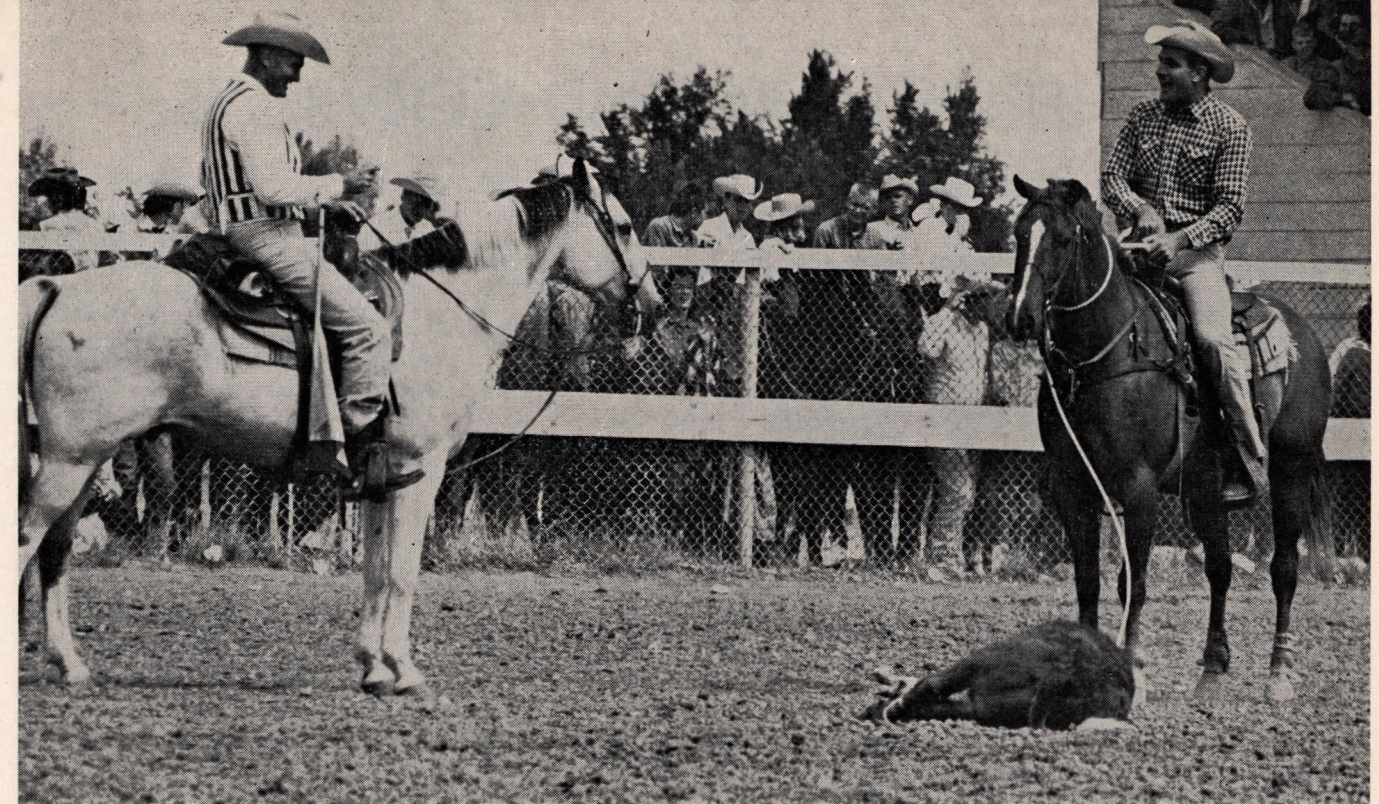
Nearly 600 rodeos in twenty states are held annually at the high school level. State-wide playoffs determine the trio in each event who travel to their national championships in August.

For its contestant membership of 500, the A.J.R.A. conducts some 40 rodeos a year, ending with their finals in August. Competition is held in age groups, 12 and under—13 to 15—16 to 19, with events for both boys and girls.

The R.C.A. annually awards silver and gold buckles to the all-around champions of each association.

Since '53, the R.C.A. had used a scoring system for riding events which, in essence, allowed the cowboy 1 to 20 points on how well he rode, and the animal 65 to 85 points for how hard it bucked. Possible high marking from any one judge was 105 points.

In '63, to give judges wider range in marking the action and also to clarify their decisions for the spectator in the grandstand, the point spread was changed to 1 to 25 for the rider and 1 to 25 for the animal; with 50 points the maximum mark available from a judge.



1963's All-Around Champion Cowboy

By earning the all-around cowboy crown, and his sixth calf roping title to boot, in '63 Idaho's Dean Oliver gained membership in a small band of legendary figures in the professional rodeo world who have won seven or more world championships during their careers.

The big man from Boise became the tenth to accomplish this feat since 1929, first year of accurate record on rodeo happenings.

Others in the select group are Oklahoma's Jim Shoulders, Arizona's Everett Bowman, Toots Mansfield and Harry Tompkins from Texas, New Mexico's Homer Pettigrew, Montana's Bill Linderman, Colorado's Don McLaughlin, California's Smokey Snyder and South Dakota's Casey Tibbs.

Oliver's 1963 all-around total, \$31,329 came from \$28,375 won calf roping plus a meager \$2,954 in steer wrestling. Such lop-sided money division for the big title which goes each year to the top winner in two or more events, hadn't happened in twenty-five years.

(It was in 1938, another Idaho cowboy, Burel Mulkey, won the saddle bronc riding championship and climbed on the all-around throne with just a few hundred dollars added from single steer roping contests on the west coast.)

The usual all-around money pattern follows that of the '62 titlist, Tom Nesmith, whose \$32,611 came from \$16,789 in steer wrestling and \$15,822 calf roping.

To further document Oliver's talent

with lariat rope and tie string it must be written here the rangy 200-pounder has captured the pro roping crown the last four years in a row with previous wins recorded in '55 and '58.

Dean also owns the sport's record for the most prize money won in a single season (\$28,841 for his '60 calf roping title) and is the biggest earner yet in calf roping with a total \$215,950 logged in the event since '52.

However, it wasn't until '61 his name ever appeared as a threat in all-around title charts. He picked up \$57 that year steer wrestling and ended up second for the big title with \$28,062.

(Dean had concentrated on just one event after '56 when casual entry into steer wrestling that fall handed him a broken leg and cost him the biggest roping bundle of that year; but winning third highest sum of the '60 season in just the roping event convinced him he'd been travelling the wrong road.)

1962 saw Oliver pad his roping money, \$27,756, with \$2,233 from the steer grappling, to end that season as runner-up for the all-around again. He logged an overall \$29,989, the most he'd ever won in a year up to that time.

In 1963, Dean jumped in front, after the first three rodeos of the season. (\$2,903 he won roping at Houston, Tex., in early March was his biggest single grab of the year.)

Through much of the season, Dean and Guy Weeks, who finished second for the all-around title, were head and head for the lead, with the Idahoan taking command for good after Labor Day. Overall tabulation shows Oliver

placed 39 times in calf roping during the year, and made 13 trips to the pay window in steer wrestling.

Dean set another sort of money record for rodeo in '63 by paying \$5,000 for a new roping mount when his sorrel standby, Mickey, went lame in a stifle in July. (Further details on that transaction are on page 8.)

Oliver's personal background has the hue of an Horatio Alger odyssey. Born Nov. 17, 1929, at Dodge City, Kan., his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Oliver, were living at Nampa, Ida., when the father was killed in a light plane crash.

Dean left school in the tenth grade to help support his mother and six other children by working on a dairy farm. He never saw a major rodeo until '48 when he was 19.

Seven years later, after overcoming obstacles and financial pitfalls that would have stymied anyone less dedicated, the Idaho farm hand owned his first world championship with a lariat rope; and became the first northern cowboy to ever earn the title.

In contrast to those early days, when a punctured tire could assume the proportion of a catastrophe and entry fees looked almost as big as the national debt, Dean and his wife, Martha, now own an up-to-date 75-acre farm on the outskirts of Boise, and are the proud parents of Sheryl, 11, Deann, 8, and Nikki, born September 22, 1963.

OTHER ALL-AROUND COWBOYS

Harry Charters, Jr. **Melba, Ida.**

This good-natured, easy-to-talk-to roper and steer wrestler, who, unbooted, stands six, six and nudges the Fairbanks needle over 240, could have gone almost any route in professional sports.

A 3-letterman in high school, (he was named on Idaho's all-star basketball team), Harry spurned two college sports scholarships, pitched semi-pro ball against Vernon Law, and at 30 laughed off a bona fide offer to join pro footballers in the Canadian league.

Born April 26, 1925, Harry rodeoed week-ends for ten years, as a pastime, staying close to the livestock holdings he shares with his father. Not until the fall of '58 at 34, did he join the R.C.A.

His first full pro season, '59, Harry won the "rookie of the year award" and the steer wrestling championship to boot. His winnings as a pro are \$97,339 thru '63. Never out of the top ten, Harry has been fourth for the all-around cowboy title three times in the last five years, '63 marking his biggest packet of prize money yet, \$25,149.

With good quarterhorses and dairy cattle going for him, on the home place, Harry and his petite wife, Fern, (5'4") have four children, Kenneth, Theresa, (now married) Tom and Dennis. The boys 19 to 15, are like dad, big enough to hunt bears with a switch.

Barry Burk **Wagoner, Okla.**

Some seven years back a magazine, devoted to things western, published the photo of a slim, scary-eyed youngster under a big hat as the winner of what turned out to be the first of his five all-around cowboy titles in junior rodeo.

Today, Barry Burk stands a solid six feet and 185 pounds, and in '63, his first professional rodeo season, calmly collected \$17,884 roping calves and wrestling steers; went to the NFR among the top 15 in the latter event. Experience was paying off.

To veterans watching from the sidelines there was nostalgia and a hint of proprietorship in all this. Barry is a second generation rodeo hand. His father, Dee, was a top roper in the late Thirties and Forties and two uncles, Jiggs Burk and the late Clyde Burk also were famous in the sport. The latter won the calf roping championship four times in his career.

For Barry too, '63 was a milestone, "I grew up wanting to be a rodeo pro." He's realized that ambition.

Born Jan. 11, 1942 at Duncan, Okla., Barry, in the spring of '64, married Joyce Shelley, of Silver City, N. M., who was Miss Rodeo America of '63.

Jim Charles **Oakdale, Calif.**

Jim Charles fell under the spell of rodeo in his early teens. Born March 26, 1936 in the solid Navy town of Coronado, Calif., he spent two years learning the rudiments of cowboying, working for west coast stock contractor Andy Jauregui, before trying actual competition.

For the past five years "Charley Jim" has been one of the top fifteen winners in bull riding, combining this with another talent, steer wrestling.

His two-fold activity has returned \$46,426 since '59, most of which Jim—with wisdom far beyond his years—has invested in real estate. He's landlord now of half a dozen homes bought with hard-earned rodeo dollars.

Steer wrestling is the giants' event. Weight is a great factor but lack of poundage doesn't keep Charley Jim from winning. Some 165 pounds—soaking wet—his work is something for the perfectionists. All-time great, Harley May, claims Jim "as great a stylist as Tom Nesmith," the ultimate accolade.

Jim's '63 season was the best in his career. He won \$13,298, and what was more important, Patty Ivory, the girl he'd been hoping to marry for two years.

Saddle Bronc Riding, 1963

WORLD CHAMPION **\$19,372**
Guy Weeks **Abilene, Tex.**

A rodeo cowboy with a winning average of better than \$24,000 a season for ten straight years—like Guy Weeks—needs no fanfare. Only a handful ever won more in their entire rodeo career than this black-haired six-footer's \$242,705 in three events—saddle broncs, calf roping and bareback bronc riding—from '54 thru '63.

For the record, saddle bronc riding always was Guy's favorite — he's earned \$131,388 in this event alone—and fittingly this was his first world championship title.

Other cowboys could tell you they felt Guy was a good gamble for a title buckle any year he decided to concentrate on one event more than the others, a thing he did thru most of '63.

(The \$19,372 he won riding saddle broncs was almost \$4,000 more than he'd ever collected in the event before while his roping and bareback bronc riding take dropped.)



Guy's decision to go for the title was influenced by the healthy \$7,774 he'd won in the event by mid-April. Six weeks later—so quickly can the financial picture change in rodeo — he found himself spurring hard to regain the national lead he'd lost to Marty Wood. The latter had picked up \$4,731 in that same month and a half.

From then on until the end of the season, six months later at the NFR in Los Angeles, the wiry Texan and his Canadian rival dueled neck and neck in one of the sport's longest and closest battles for a title. Not until the last go-round ended at the Finals was Guy's championship a certainty. He defeated Wood by the narrow margin of \$244 for the entire year.

(Only once in the last 20 years was the race for a riding title any closer. In '50 Bill Linderman nudged Casey Tibbs off the bronc riding throne by \$177—\$12,485 to \$12,308.)

Born Jan. 3, 1932 at Ft. Worth, Tex., Guy rode races for his dad, Luther Weeks, who had turned from calf roping to training runners. Then, when a bad spill on the fairgrounds track at New Orleans, put too much weight on

the "bugboy," Guy turned to rodeo. He joined the R.C.A. in '49.

A quick-moving 155 pounds, Guy looks exactly the popular conception of a cowboy. Married he and his blonde wife, Jo, have three children, Jacqueline, Debbie and Guy Jr.

Marty Wood **Bowness, Alta.**

(2nd—\$19,128)—One of the great saddle bronc riders of the last twenty-five years, Marty concentrates on just the one event. Owning style on a bucking horse reminiscent of the legendary Doff Aber and Billy Ward in their heyday, Martin rides for first every time the gate cracks; almost double-timing his spurring stroke, he seems to urge his mount to turn it on a little harder.

This approach won Marty 1958's world championship.

Marty's tally from '57 thru '63 is \$112,464 which figures out slightly more than \$16,000 per annum. Closest to him in the dollar category, for the same period, is Wyoming's Enoch Walker, the '60 titlist, with \$96,457. Like Wood, Walker is a one-event specialist.

Born June 4th, 1933 at Calgary, Alta., Marty grew up with horses. His father, Harry Wood, close friend of the Dominion's late, great Pete Knight, knew what a bronc rider should be. He admits to "being rough on the kid when he was learning."

A natural-born horseman, Marty was riding colts at six, helping his dad train jumpers—and winning classes on them—before he was 12. In '53, unheralded and unsung, Marty won his first major rodeo "in the States," was Canadian bronc titlist in '54, and '55.

Runner-up for the world championship in '57, Marty never has been out of the top five since, finished second for the title in '62 as well.

A compact 5'11" and 155 pounds, Marty and his wife, Jeannie, have one son, a husky coming two-year-old the cowboys have nicknamed Chipper.

Jim Tescher **Medora, N.D.**

(3rd—\$15,099) — This stocky 185-pounder is one of the few who have successfully combined rodeoing with other business interests, in his case a 5,500-acre cattle and quarterhorse spread midway between Medora and Sentinel Butte in North Dakota.

To win, most rodeo pros feel they have to be on top of the action all year long. Jim belies this theory. He'll win a bundle riding broncs or wrestling steers, then go home and work on the ranch for a month.

This was the familiar pattern at the start of '63. He won \$600 at Denver in early January, four weeks later tallied \$3,369 in two events at San Antonio, Tex. Next time he showed up was mid-May at Las Vegas, Nev., where he won \$1,595 steer wrestling.

Actually during the rest of the year,

Jim deserted the ranch a lot more than usual. He placed at 23 more rodeos—including his riding win at the NFR—to establish high money mark of his career so far, \$20,904.

From his start, in '48, Jim's been known as a "bronc rider's bronc rider." Thru the years he's made as many near perfect rides on top bucking horses as anybody. Those who saw him tangle with Trail's End, at Billings, Mont last August tag it one of the great bronc rides in rodeo.

A vice-president of the R.C.A., Jim was born Aug. 15, 1929 at Beach, N.D. He and his wife, Loretta, have three youngsters.

Bill Martinelli **Oakdale, Calif.**

(4th—\$13,722)—Born and raised in the greater Los Angeles area, Bill's rodeo career first took shape in Sunday afternoon jackpot ridings during the summer he turned 14; later stylist Johnny Hawkins schooled him on bareback broncs and until the last couple of years this was Martinelli's best event.

1963 was the best yet for Bill dollar-wise. He placed at 38 rodeos, won four times as much on saddle broncs as he did in the rigging event, winding up with an overall \$16,863. Most of the season he was hot on the heels of Wood and Weeks. (Bill finished 11th for the saddle bronc championship in '62).

Flattened on his first horse at the NFR, Bill never could get in gear on the next seven head and saw Jim Tescher wheel on by him.

One of the best-liked cowboys in the game, bachelor Bill was born March 4, 1935, is 5'10", weighs 148 pounds. His father, Marty Martinelli, is a well-known coach in Los Angeles.

Larry Kane **Big Sandy, Mont.**

(5th—\$13,322)—Pint-sized (115 lbs.) Larry Kane handles the rein on a bucking horse much as Bill Shoemaker takes charge of a runner; both rely mainly on touch and balance to get the most from their mounts.

Another trait they have in common, which has nothing to do with riding ability, is an amiable but firm opposition to flinging any words around. Larry's been nicknamed Gabby for the tight grip he keeps on his lip.

Born June 21, 1938 at Havre, Mont., Larry burst on the pro rodeo scene like a rocket in August, 1960, climbing into the season's top 15 bronc riding winners in three months time. He was sixth for the event's championship in '61, fourth in '62. His gross winnings, '60 thru '63 are \$31,313.

Rookie of the year in '61, Larry's slimness, he's 5'4" tall, has brought him a lot of offers as a race-rider, all of which he refused. He placed at 38 rodeos in '63, his biggest haul, \$1,580 at Houston, and won second in the 8-head NFR riding.

Sonny Worrell **Altoona, Kans.**

When Sonny was just a button around the parental ranch at Neodesha, Kans., (just a few miles from where he lives now) he landed in the doghouse pretty often—coming home with his clothes in tatters. The youngster's determined practice roping of family livestock, in the thick brush pastures, raised plain hob with shirts and jeans.

But, undaunted, Sonny ever since has hankered for a horse, a rope and cattle to pursue. Thru '63 this way of going had won him \$50,589 in pro rodeo.

Born Aug. 24, 1936, the stocky 165-pounder attended Oklahoma A&M, was on the college rodeo team. Living some 50 miles from the Oklahoma Osage whose rolling blue-stem hills have produced scores of top cowboys, Sonny picked up pointers from Shoa Webster, Merle Lee Davis and Royce Sewalt.

At college Sonny met and married Mary Sue Shaw, only daughter of Everett and Nell Shaw. Father-in-law Everett, legendary 6-time steer roping champion, put further gloss on Sonny's rodeo prowess.

The year '63 was Sonny's best yet. He won \$15,429 in the three events he enters, calf and steer roping and steer wrestling. Second in the NFR calf roping, he finished sixth for the year's championship. He and Mary Sue have two youngsters, Neil and Beverly Ann.

Ken Stanton **Weiser, Ida.**

This wiry 145-pounder, who rides bareback broncs and bulls, comes from Oregon cow country which in the past has produced many a top cowboy in pro rodeo.

But Kenny, who entered a kids' rodeo in his hometown of Redmond when he was 9, turned to working for Oregon stock contractor Hank Christensen in order to get on enough bucking stock and learn the right moves. Along the way, old pro Manuel Enos and Johnny Mitchell gave the young newcomer needed pointers.

It was '61 when Ken bought his first R.C.A. card, earned just \$3,929 that year. But '62 saw him come on like gangbusters, sacking up \$12,439 for the season after qualifying for the NFR on bareback broncs and finishing 11th for that event championship.

In '63 Kenny was one of just seven cowboys to finish the year among the top fifteen winners in two events. He totalled winnings of \$18,592, ended up sixth for the bull riding title and thirteenth on bareback riding charts, notching a remarkable climb up the sport's financial ladder in just thirty-six months.

Born Oct. 8, 1942, Ken is married. An older brother, Bill, also follows rodeo, competes only in bull riding.

Benny Reynolds **Dillon, Mont.**

Good 4-event cowboys in rodeo are as scarce as top decathlon athletes in the Olympics.

Ben Reynolds, an amiable, rangy 190-pounder, who competes in saddle and bareback bronc riding, bull riding and steer wrestling, has won an average of more than \$2,400 per month for the last six years in those events.

This overall bundle of rodeo loot, \$146,002, lodges Reynolds among the sport's most consistent earners. In 1961, his collective talents gained him the coveted all-around cowboy championship (he won \$31,309 that season) even tho' he was no closer than fifth to top spot in any of his events.

Born into a rodeo-minded family, ranch-raised in southwest Montana, Ben can do everything a cowboy is supposed to do. He handles a lariat rope pretty well but he'd be the first to admit nobody worries about "the Reynolds surge" to the calf roping title.

Ben was "rookie of the year" in '58 after winning \$26,450 and finishing third for the all-around crown his first full pro year. He was sixth for the big title in both '59 and '60, third in '62.

Crippled a lot during '63, Ben ended up eighth in the all-around race, with \$19,303. Born March 5, 1936, Ben and his wife, Mary, have a son, a coming 3-year-old.

Bareback Bronc Riding 1963

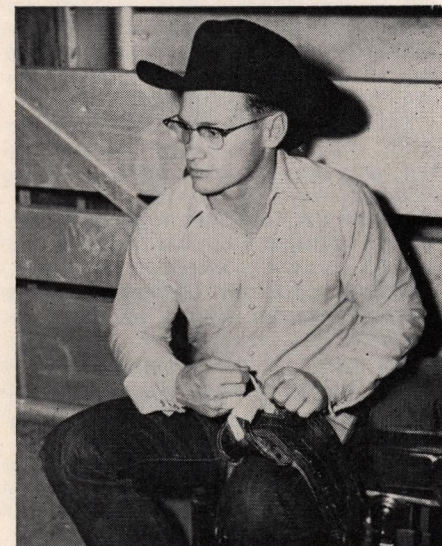
John Hawkins Twain Harte, Calif.

There were a lot of cowboys glad to see the Hawk win his championship buckle, at long last. He'd been quite a spell on the way, for a guy owning that much riding talent.

Injuries and hooking into Akridge, Shoulders and Buschbom in their biggest years explain the delay. For example three years in a row, '57 thru '59, John was title runner-up, missed once by a nerve-jangling \$18; in '61-'62 he was out eighteen of the twenty-four months mending a shattered thigh, the result of a riding wreck at Houston, and then trying a comeback too quickly.

In further slant on Hawkins' consistency is his record of never ending a season worse than fourth for the title since '56, excluding, of course, his year and a half on the sidelines.

The last half of '62 he came on like a runaway — won the NFR riding — wound up seventh for the season. (John also won the '63 Finals bareback riding to become the event's first two-time winner at the title playoffs.)



Born May 22, 1930 at Elk City, Okla., John was a quarter-horse race-rider until weight became a problem. He turned to pro rodeo in '52. Records show since that year he has won a total \$125,963. Not too many remember John rode bulls and roped calves along with his "taw" event during his first few years in the R.C.A. (The books still show a \$467 roping win at Denver in Oct. '52.)

Owning one of the strongest riding arms in the game, John stays fit—he neither drinks nor smokes—at a hard-muscled 150 pounds, stands 5'7". Married, he has a profitable sideline, making spurs for fellow contestants.

Placing at forty rodeos in '63, John's biggest single win was the \$1,818 he collected at the Finals.

Buddy Peak

Tucson, Ariz.

(2nd—\$15,655)—Buddy headed into the '63 NFR within easy striking distance of the championship. Just \$682 behind leader Hawkins when the playoffs started, all Peak needed was a nudge from Lady Luck to cap the best season in his 16-year career with a title.

At any other Finals, being that close to the lead and placing on half the draw—which Buddy did—would have meant the championship; amazingly, Hawkins collected on six of his eight mounts, left Buddy behind \$733 for the year and the crown. But it was close right down to the wire.

Born December 17, 1933 at Shoshone, Ida., Buddy joined pro ranks at 14. A year later he won a go-round at Madison Square Garden, which may always be the competitive highlight for him. From a skinny youngster then he's grown to a six-foot, 180-pounder.

Up until the last couple of years Bud won almost as much money riding bulls as on bareback horses (he made the '60 Finals in both events), but since slacking off the bovines he has stayed sounder and tougher in his other event.

(Bud's absorbed some dandy jolts from the bulls. In '61 a lung was punctured by a rib that snapped under the weight of a bull's hoof; a horn literally shattered his jaw two years ago at Sidney, Iowa. Touches like that make a cowboy lose interest in an event after so long.)

Still he won \$2,165 on bulls during '63 which hiked his overall winnings to \$17,868.

Buddy and his wife, Nona Ann, have three youngsters, Jesse James, Wyatt Earp and Dianna Lynn.

Bernis Johnson

Cleburne, Tex.

(3rd—\$12,891)—Laconic, sandy-haired Bernis has been one of the toughest 3-event men around for the last three years. Last season, '63, turned out the best yet financially but his ability riding bareback broncs, bull and steer wrestling, didn't make any sudden surge forward; he just drew better and got to more rodeos. The \$22,110 Bernis accumulated in his trio of events pegged him sixth for the all-around cowboy championship. (In contrast, his '62 total was \$17,699, which carried him to ninth among money winners for that season. He totaled \$15,094 in '61.)

Unobtrusive, six-foot, 176-pound Bernis, who has been a pro for fifteen years, lets his cowboying speak for him. He's qualified for four of the five Finals, the last two in both bareback bronc and bull riding. Few others in the game can tally such consistency.

Records show Bernis placed 39 times on bareback horses in '63, his biggest single grab, \$1,482, at Houston in March.

In addition, he picked up 24 checks in bull riding, 13 in steer wrestling.

Married, Bernis owns and operates 200 acres of farm land six miles south of Cleburne, where he raises and trains registered quarterhorses. He was born September 19, 1932.

Jim Bausch

Rapid City, S.D.

(4th—\$12,693) — A four-event threat who also had his best season in '63, is this former intercollegiate cowboy champion, ranch-raised in the Black Hills country of South Dakota.

Jim joined the R.C.A. in '58, while still attending Sul Ross State College, at Alpine, Tex., where he earned six rodeo crowns. His first competitive trip in the arena had occurred in '53, in high school rodeo at Rapid City.

Bausch got tapped off early in '63 with \$1,466 won on barebacks at Ft. Worth, then snared what was to be his biggest grab of the year in the event, a neat \$1,788, at Houston. He placed forty-two times more on the rigging broncs, drew twenty-one checks on saddle broncs, seventeen steer wrestling and five in bull riding to complete the season, with an overall dollar income of \$19,040.

Jim won the third go-round at the Finals, on Barnes' Pilot Rock, but came down off three others, which kept him from climbing any higher in the year's title charts. Six feet tall, and weighing 170 pounds, Bausch was born July 10, 1939.

Clyde Frost

Lapoint, Utah

(5th—\$10,243)—Getting to four of the five Finals in this event pretty well defines the ability of this cowboy, born and raised in southern Colorado ranch country. Clyde is tough on saddle broncs and steer wrestling as well—where the steers aren't kingsize—but he would be the first to admit the rigging event is what keeps him going down the road.

Born July 19, 1933, Clyde is married to the former Elsie Nell Rose, and with the addition of two youngsters since '61, he is rodeoing with the avowed intention of pouring all he can into ranching property, in the northeast sector of Utah, where he shares ownership with two brothers.

Although Clyde got away badly at the start of '63, he made a Garrison finish to account for one of his best years dollarwise. Collecting 33 checks in bareback bronc riding—including his \$1,075 grab at the NFR—plus 29 checks on saddle broncs, he totaled \$15,825.

Evidence of the regard in which Clyde is held by fellow contestants is his election, twice, as their bareback bronc riding director on the R.C.A. board.

WORLD CHAMPION

\$15,452

Bill Kornell Palm Springs, Calif.

Not since the advent of Harry Tompkins and Jim Shoulders fifteen years ago has anyone won the bull riding title in the explosive fashion of Bill Kornell.

Tompkins was 21 years old, Shoulders 23, when they earned their first championships aboard the hump-shouldered miscreants—Bill was 19 when he vanquished Hurricane Red—final night at the NFR—to cinch the title and wind up his 90th rodeo of the year.

Here, for the present, comparison ends; for Tompkins and Shoulders over a dozen years—'48 thru '60—tossed the bull riding crown back and forth to establish a rodeo record of their own. (Shoulders won it seven times, Tompkins, five.)

Freckled, redhaired Billy has it all in front of him; but as Shoulders has remarked, "this boy'll get on a lot of bulls, and tries to win something."

Born March 13, 1944, Kornell grew up in Palm Springs where his grandfather W. A. Serruys encouraged him to become a roper. Bill couldn't see handling any manila other than the flat-plaited bull rope.



Joining the R.C.A. in '61, Bill spent a lot of that summer prying himself off the arena floor, and healing up from a concussion and a broken wrist.

Graduating from high school the following spring Bill logged 31,000 miles on his car during the rest of the year, gained a lot more experience anticipating what move a bull might make next. 1963 saw him placing deep at the big building rodeos during January and February, (\$1,000 at Denver, \$1,412 at Houston and Ft. Worth). A third place finish at Springfield in his home state during April gave him another \$1,056, and he was third in the standings.

Late in July—at Cheyenne—Bill hit another good lick, \$1,360, but not until after Labor Day rodeos could he overhaul front-running Dickey Cox. Even by the time the Finals began, Kornell had only a \$659 bulge on his rival. But

winning \$1,767, and second in the 8-head NFR average, double-cinched the championship. (Kornell placed in a total 37 rodeos during '63.)

Also named rookie of the year (page 14) Kornell, unmarried, is 5'9", weighs 145, ideal size for a bullrider.

Dickey Cox

McKinney, Tex.

(2nd—\$13,180)—A cold streak that hit him during the last few weeks of the season is all that kept this stocky (5'7", 160-lb.) Texas cowboy from claiming the '63 bull riding crown.

Dickey led the event through most of the year—after snagging a spectacular \$4,136 bundle at Ft. Worth and Houston early in the spring—only to have Bill Kornell get the drop on him after Labor Day rodeos. When the chill descended, Cox never got hold of the track again.

Even so, trailing by \$659 when the NFR started with \$6,500 up in the event, Dickey's title bid wasn't hopeless. But nothing went right there either. He goose-egged on four, earned only \$154 on the four head he did mark on. Kornell, on the other hand, had a ball, winning \$1,767.

Actually, Dickey had a big year despite his loss. Records show he'd won \$10,145 by the end of July, more than two-thirds of his seasonal total. A lot of the riding fraternity would have been pleased with such financial status. It was luck, not ability, that quit Dickey down the homestretch.

Born July 12, 1939, Dickey competed first in college rodeo, at East Texas State, gives much of the credit for his skill to veteran R. C. Bales, who helped him get started as a pro in '61.

Ranch-raised, a good hand training horses, Cox and his wife, Judy, have two youngsters.

Carl Nafzger

Olton, Tex.

(3rd—\$13,010)—A slender 22-year-old with an engaging grin, Carl had his best year in '63. Like Kornell and Cox who wound up ahead of him Nafzger is one of the new crop of real title threats to appear since the end of the Shoulders-Tompkins era.

With a background of high school and junior college rodeo experience. Carl joined the R.C.A. in '60. Of his entry into pro competition, veteran Harley May commented, "there were lots of bulls in every string that could flatten him but, man, I never saw one that could make him lay. You never saw such guts!"

Carl gained some much needed confidence when he rode Inman's seldom-conquered Flying I to a 181 marking in '61. In '62 he banked \$4,530.

Heading into '63 Nafzger got a boost from his \$1,523 win at Las Vegas in May, another \$1,107 at the L. A. Coliseum in June. He collected 27 other checks before the Finals.

There, Carl drew his hottest hand of the year, in the double-tough, 8-head average. He rode six of his mounts, placing on five of them, to win third in the NFR contest and \$1,819. It was enough to bounce him ahead of Bob Wegner for the year.

Born August 29, 1941 at Plainview, Tex., Carl is single, weighs 150, is 5'10".

Joe Green

Sulphur, Okla.

(4th—\$12,047)—Joe is a one-event specialist. His record of consistency, finishing out of the top eight winners on bulls just once since '59 reflects real riding ability.

But what the records don't show is this 27-year-old Oklahoman is capable of riding more double-rank draws than any other cowboy around — when he's hot—with such style and grace it looks easy. On the other hand—Joe's the first to admit this—he often rolls off mediocre draws.

This quirk of fortune used to bother Joe but now he shrugs off his losses with a grin. Fellow contestants aver he gets careless on the easy ones but stays "pumped up" by the challenge of the "impossibles."

Money-wise, '63 was Joe's best year so far, and the second time he's finished fourth for the championship. His big wins in '63, came early in the season, \$1,043 at San Antonio, \$1,207 at Phoenix. Joe banked twenty-three other checks before the NFR. He came down off four head, placed on the other four, won \$924 which carried him ahead of Wegner in the year-end standings.

Born Aug. 9, 1936 at Sulphur, Joe is single, stands 5'10", weighs 155, joined the R.C.A. in '53.

Bob Wegner

Ponca City, Okla.

(5th—\$11,452)—Title runner-up three times, third for the championship two other years, and fifth in '63, is the bull riding record of this close-coupled (5'6", 140 lbs.) Oklahoman since '58.

While '63 goes in the record book as Bob's poorest season for quite a spell, actually it may have been his best, competitive-wise. For the little man with the big grin, weathered a king-size cold streak at the start of the season, which kept him from winning a dime for nearly four months. Anyone with less heart would have thrown in the sponge.

By the end of March when Wegner broke the jinx at last, with a \$206 win at El Cajon, Calif., he was spotting the leaders nearly \$6,000. Coming from behind—his big win was \$2,799 at Cheyenne in July—to third in the standings as the NFR started could have been too tough a grind. Biggest bull riding winner at the four previous finals (\$4,797) Bobby bucked off four bulls, collected only a meager \$51.50 on one of his other four draws, slipped two notches in standings for the year.

Bob and his wife, Judy, have one daughter, Kelly, 2 in '64. Weg was born March 10, 1934, at Ponca City.

Calf Roping 1963

WORLD CHAMPION

\$28,375

Dean Oliver Boise, Ida.

With this '63 championship—his sixth in the last nine years—Dean became the biggest money winner in calf roping history—\$219,950 accrued in a 12-year span of pro competition.

To those statistics, add rodeo's record for money earned in one event during a single season—\$28,841 for his '60 roping title—the top price paid so far for a roping mount—\$5,000 last July—plus domination of the calf roping throne for the last four years in a row. (His other roping title years were '55 and '58.)

Calf roping is one of rodeo's most populous events. In the last decade junior and scholastic rodeo organizations have turned out scores of young hopefuls who think only in terms of tying a calf in ten seconds or less; many turn pro, and, with any sort of break, can accomplish exactly what they're thinking. Back of these keyed-up newcomers are the capable veterans. Add the fact no bunch of calves ever are an even draw and you understand why Oliver's case history is regarded with something akin to awe in the rodeo world.



Actually, much of the credit for Oliver's 4-year reign goes to a nervy, 14-year-old sorrel gelding, called Mickey, whose teamwork with the rangy Idahoan has been the outspoken envy of other ropers.

With Mickey—Dean bought him in the fall of '59 from fellow roper, Lee Cockrell — there's the timing and coordinated moves which make the winning runs come easy and often.

When his equine partner hurt a stifle midway thru '63, forcing his retirement, at least for the remainder of the year, Dean bought the horse he felt nearest to Mickey's caliber. This was Don Feddersen's Vernon, for whom Oliver paid \$5,000, highest price ever doled out by a professional roper.

Riding Vernon, Dean won \$11,467 from Cheyenne Frontier Days on to the end of the season, where his \$28,375 total marked the second best year, financially, of his roping career.

Bob Wiley

Porterville, Calif.

(2nd—\$18,180)—One nice thing about Bob, nobody ever had less trouble finding a hat to fit. This blocky 200-pounder, who used to skip the hundred under ten in football regalia, has no idea how high other ropers are on his ability.

For example, mid-way in '63—Bob's best year so far—he finished second at Cheyenne, where traditionally "the toughs" gather full force to rope fresh Herefords over a 30-foot score. Nobody else was surprised but Bob bubbled over like a kid with his check for \$1,868.

After Porterville Junior College, which he attended on a football scholarship and was the league-leading fullback, Wiley joined the R.C.A. in '57. Those first years, he was having double trouble, no horse to suit him and the propensity to rush his ground work into a tangle. (He still blasts down that rope with incredible zip for a man his size.)

Traveling with Oliver, and the purchase of his current roping horse, Jackson, has ironed out these shortcomings. Many now think Bob closest to Dean handling big calves. Calgary handed him his biggest single grab of '63, \$2,736. He placed at a total of 43 rodeos, including the Finals where he wound up a solid fourth in the 8-head average.

Born Nov. 18, 1936, Bob and his wife, Sonya, have a daughter. Bob is 6'1".

Olin Young

Albuquerque, N. M.

(3rd—\$15,334)—Olin, one of the finest horsemen in rodeo today, created a record of his own in '63. This slender, six-foot, 170-pound speedster won what is admittedly the toughest roping of the year—the 8-head NFR average for the third time. Nobody else yet has been able to win it twice.

Only 22 when he won the first Finals' roping, in '59 at Dallas, Olin has been one of the top five calf ropers three of the four years since. (He dropped to tenth in '61.)

Like heady Don McLaughlin, Olin utilizes every bit of help from his horse. His roping runs on Silky, the Wardlow gelding he's ridden the past three years, to the initiated are masterpieces of timing.

The '63 Finals was a good example of their teamwork. Olin established another NFR mark, averaging 14 seconds on the eight husky 300-pound calves, tying his fastest one in 10.1 seconds. The \$1,869 he won there was his biggest grab of the season, but he collected 30 other checks.

Born Sept. 11, 1936 at Lovington, N. M., Olin gives credit to his father, Paul, for his start as both roper and horseman. Married, Olin and wife, Letha, have one son, DeWitt.

Bob Ragsdale

Chowchilla, Calif.

(4th—\$15,116)—For his heft Bob is just as fine a cowboy as anyone around. A wiry, 5'11" and 160 pounds, this southpaw can hold his own with anybody in calf roping and steer wrestling when the livestock isn't oversize.

Rags has come a long way in pro ranks in just three years. '63 was his best bid yet for the calf roping title after finishing fifth in the standings the previous year. He placed at 35 rodeos, including his Finals check of \$997, to tally his current roping total, which by some odd coincidence was exactly fifty cents less than he won with his rope in '62.

Born Oct. 23, 1936 and raised at Harlem, Mont., Bob competed in high school rodeo, entering all five events. He always, however, showed a preference for roping. To improve, he studied with Toots Mansfield, then turned pro in '60.

'61 saw him climb, unheralded, into the top ten calf ropers, riding a rodeo-wise black gelding once the prized property of Texan Buddy Groff. Rags' left-handed roping tactics cured the horse's vice of swerving away from a right-hander's throws.

Bob added \$3,857 steer wrestling to his '63 roping loot for an overall \$18,973. He and his wife, Ada Marie, have twin daughters, born in '58.

Dale Smith

Chandler, Ariz.

(5th—\$15,101)—It was a year of extremes for this 6-foot, 180-pound Arizonan. The first month of '63 he very nearly lost his famed blue calf horse, Poker Chip, in a trailer smashup; then upset prophecies he couldn't win a dime without Poker by clicking off the third biggest season of his 11-year rodeo career.

Dale rode a half-dozen different horses thru the season, logging '63's biggest calf roping packet, \$4,237 at Calgary, on George Richmond's sorrel, Sunday. Overall, Dale drew 23 checks in calf roping during the year and accounted for 21 more in team roping, ending up third for that championship. (Page 10).

Even before he was in his teens, Dale could do most anything well with a rope. At 12, around jackpots in Safford, Ariz., he partnered with veterans in team roping, and won his share. His calf roping soared in '56 with the acquisition of Poker. (Dale figures the big gelding has grossed over \$100,000 for him since).

Adding team roping take, \$8,885, and his calf roping money, \$15,101, Dale's lariat income for '63 was \$23,984, good for fifth in the all-around title standings. (His best year was \$24,209 in '57.)

Born Feb. 6, 1928, Dale and his wife, Bobbie, have three children.

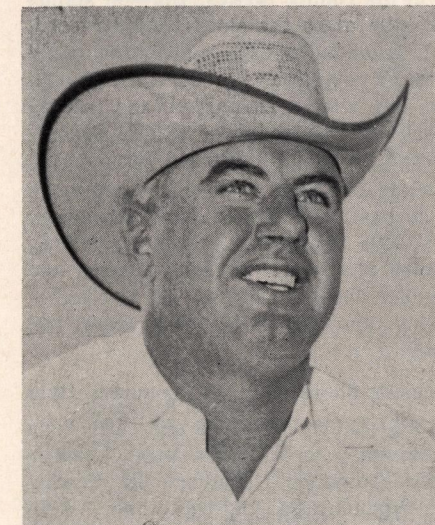
Jim Bynum

Waxahachie, Tex.

Among the steer wrestling fraternity the saying goes, "you don't need to worry about Bynum unless it's a dry year."

Substance of this ambiguous statement is the 4-time world champion owns 800 acres of cotton land and when rains promise a good crop he stays with the farm; a poor growing season and he's roaming far and wide in search of prize money.

Big Jim—he's six, four, weighs 250, has contested in this fashion since away back in '47 when just out of the service he apprenticed himself to Todd Whatley, that year's steer wrestling titlist. How well he learned the art from his Oklahoma prof is a general admission from other contestants, for the last dozen years they've believed Bynum the man to beat whenever he entered any rodeo, on all kinds of cattle, large or small.



For Jim, unlike a lot of giants, is agile. With all his bulk, he seldom trips smaller steers, and the heavy cattle don't go far when he tips their head. (In '61, at Dallas, a steer whipped away and stopped abruptly when Jim was in mid-air. Jim landed with a thump, reached out and held the 750-pound animal by a front leg until he could get on his feet and twist him down.)

If there's a catch in Bynum's bulk it's the scarcity of horses that'll pack his weight properly. Most have a tendency to fade away from him when he starts down. But for the last three years Jim's owned a grey gelding he calls Old Blue that suits the big man to a t.

Descended from Ronald Mason's famed old stallion, Oklahoma Star, that died in '43, Old Blue can haul the mail and lets Bynum down without wavering. Jim's last two championships, '61 and '63, were won on the grey horse.

Steer Wrestling 1963

(Jim's other championships were in '54 and '58. Only New Mexico's Homer Pettigrew, now retired, has won more, six, from '40 thru '48.)

The spring of '63 saw Jim earn \$7,357 by April, highlighted by a whopping \$4,249 packet won at Houston. He went on to place at 27 more rodeos before the end of the year. His \$18,252 total is the event's third largest on record. Jim was born Sept. 15, 1924, at Danville, Ala.

Billy Hale

Checotah, Okla.

(2nd—\$15,635)—Bill wound up '63 in a blaze of glory, winning the 8-head NFR average. The \$1,561 he earned there, coupled with what he'd collected during the regular season, moved him up a notch for the year; and chronicled the best finish Bill's chartered since first appearing among the event's top 15, back in '59.

Born in Colorado Springs, Dec. 1, 1938, Billy was around rodeo when just a tike. His father, Earl, who still competes himself, taught the youngster all he knew at practice sessions in the home arena. A track and basketball star at Falcon high school, Bill grew into a husky six-feet, and 180 pounds.

After high school, encouraged by his dad, Bill decided on steer wrestling as a career and studied under Willard Combs, acknowledged dean of the craft. Their association was cemented further by Bill's marriage to Jessie, the Combs' only daughter.

Billy started '63 with a flourish as well, winning \$5,064 at Denver and Houston. He ground out 22 smaller checks at other rodeos, then hit big again at San Francisco in October, \$1,767, before heading into the Finals. (Bill finished 12th for the steer wrestling title in '59, 7th in '60.)

C. R. Boucher

Burkburnett, Tex.

(3rd—\$15,363)—Just about as fine a fellow as you'll run across, Boucher is the cowboys' own selection to wear the next steer wrestling crown. If and when he does, you can bet your stack it won't affect modest, unassuming C. R. even one iota. He'll praise the horses he rode not his own ability.

Born May 21, 1931, at Livingston, Mont., C. R. grew up around livestock. A husky six, two and 195 pounds he attended Montana State University on a sports scholarship. Later he went south to work on cattle ranches in New Mexico and Texas where occasional weekend rodeos fired his interest in the sport.

Inducted into the army in '56, Boucher played service football at Fort Lewis, and was mustered out in '58. He drifted back to the southwest, met Aubrey Rankin, owner of a top team of steer wrestling mounts. Joining forces has been a financial coup ever since, for both men.

C. R. capped a fine year in '61 (\$14,312) by finishing title runner-up and winning the NFR average. A prolonged slump he couldn't account for, dropped him to eighth in '62, with \$9,479. But, by April in '63, he had won \$6,928 and led the standings. There he stayed until August when Bynum went by him—as it turned out—to the title. Oddly, C. R. didn't make a dime at the Finals, dropped back another notch for the year. Typically his only observation on his plight was a grinning, "they wiped me out."

Don Huddleston

Talihina, Okla.

(4th—\$14,460)—Big Don (six, four, 229 pounds) got away with a rush at the start of '63, the best year of his career so far. He collected \$2,574 in one whack at Houston, which, coupled with earlier winnings, was enough to land him among the top three in the standings.

Never able to notch another big win until late in the season, Don, nevertheless, hung tough, grinding out checks at 28 other rodeos before the NFR. There, he won three go-rounds, finishing sixth in the average for \$1,387, and climbed over Tom Nesmith in the year's final standings.

Born Aug. 21, 1934 at Sardis, Okla., good-natured Don learned a lot of his steer wrestling ABC's from Sonny Oliphant and Tater Decker. He joined the R.C.A. in '55.

Don agrees with fellow contestants that the big difference in '63 above other rodeo years, for him was the deal he made during Shreveport in April for a steer wrestling team of his own. Riding Brownie, Don's been a lot tougher than he ever was on other people's horses.

Tom Nesmith

Sulphur, La.

(5th—\$13,352) — Pro rodeo knows "Tom Nee" as one of the toughest calf ropers and steer wrestlers in the business. He's been proving that since '58, the year his name first appeared in all-around title charts. Winning the '62 all-around crown, and steer wrestling championship to boot, merely cemented everyone's belief.

During '63, Tom didn't travel nearly as hard as he had in his title year. Still the \$26,271 he pocketed in his events—good enough for third in the all-around race—would be a banner year for most cowboys. He placed at 36 rodeos compared to 46 in '62. Aside from the usual touch of "road founder," the common ailment of rodeo hands, another factor kept Tom off the highway, expansion of the cow herd he's been putting together for the last five years.

Born Jan. 28, 1935, at Bethel, Okla., Tom got started on his rodeo career helped by Dick Truitt and Everett Shaw. A compact 5'10", 185-lbs. Tom and his wife, Jane, have one daughter.



World Champion Team Roper \$13,266

Les Hirde Turlock, Calif.

For the last thirty-four years, the team roping championship has belonged either to an Arizonan or a Californian—Les Hirde evened the score in '63, making it seventeen each.

(Actually, until '58 the Arizona roping cult enjoyed the role of lop-sided favorite, but the last six years the title hasn't budged from the west coast.)

With the tandem roping crown—his first—Les also established a new money winning record for the event. His \$13,266 total obliterates the previous mark of \$10,408 set by fellow Californian, Jim Rodriguez Jr., in '60. An accelerated version of livestock handling on the open range, team roping today is split-second coordination by the man who ropes the steer's horns and his partner, whose target is the animal's hind feet. Hirde is a horn roper with all the moves smoothed by twenty years experience in the event.

Les placed at 27 rodeos during '63, only five of them out of California, and collected his biggest check, \$2,237, at Salinas. Les also won the NFR team roping for the second year in a row. (His '62 partner was Julius Boschi; Al Hooper heeled for him in '63.)

Born Sept. 21, 1923, Les and his wife Frances, with their two children, live on a 220-acre dairy west of Turlock. Les is 5'11", weighs 200 lbs.

Al Hooper Las Vegas, Nev.

(2nd—\$12,186) — The team roping partnership of Hooper and Hirde now own a world champion's buckle apiece. Les helped Hooper to the '61 title and Al returned the favor in '63 which, for the book, was the biggest money year in the event's long history. Even Hooper's earnings as title runner-up also broke the previous record, and were almost twice what he collected in his championship year.

(In '53, when California's Ben Johnson won the championship, the top five men in the team roping standings totaled \$25,747 in prize money: in '63 the top quintet pocketed \$78,581.)

Hooper has an unusual background in rodeo. Already in his mid-thirties, owning no previous experience with a lariat, he became a team roping addict watching others in practice sessions around Escalon, Calif., then his hometown. Four years after that, at 40, Al joined the R.C.A., won the championship three years later. Looking back, he avers a good horse was his biggest asset, gives credit to his sorrel gelding, Okie, whose innate cow-

sense goes back to famed, old Oklahoma Star.

Born April 28, 1917, Hooper and his wife, have one daughter, Jeanie. Al is 5'9", weighs 165 pounds.

Dale Smith Chandler, Ariz.

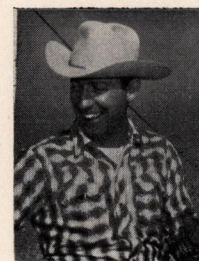
(3rd—\$8,885) — Dale's roping history goes back to childhood in Graham county, Arizona, a cattle country that has produced a score of rodeo immortals, including Hugh Bennett and Everett Bowman.

Before his mid-teens, Dale roped with veterans in jackpots around his home town of Safford. Later he teamed with the '47 titlist, Jim Brister. Dale's first appearance close-up in national team roping charts occurred in '54 when he finished second for the title, losing to fellow Arizonan, Eddie Schell.

Two years later Dale won his first championship, repeating in '57, and then missing by only \$13 in '58 to California's Ted Ashworth.

Despite homestate ranching interests, at Wenden and Kingman, Dale spent considerable time on the highway in '63, placed in 21 team ropings including the NFR. He was the only Finalist qualifying in calf roping as well.

Dale has shouldered additional burdens the last two years, serving as president of the R.C.A. Re-elected for '64, Dale feels working for the sport in an official capacity to some extent repays what rodeo has handed him over the past decade.



Don McLaughlin Fort Collins, Colo.

Those who knew Don a decade ago, when the heady 5'10", 160-pound stylist dominated calf roping competition, find it easy to believe he'll win a bunch more steer roping championships before he's through.

Pro rodeo's biggest winner ever with a rope and tie string—\$253,836 since '46—McLaughlin earned five calf roping titles from '51 thru '57. He became interested in the rope, trip and tie event four years ago, and won the '60 title on a borrowed mount. The next year Don bought Jim Snively's famed black gelding, by Red Waggoner, finished fifth in the year-end standings. In '62 he moved up to third for the title, riding the same horse, and came home the winner in '63, earning \$3,792.

Born Oct. 24, 1927, Don literally grew up with a rope in his hand. He and a younger brother, Gene, were trick roping prodigies. Don turned to contest roping in '46 when he was 18. Actually,

'63 was the first season since '50 Don hasn't been among the top ten calf ropers at the end of the year. Business commitments, and his Fort Collins roping school kept him off the road. This was a situation he'd looked forward to a long time, but the spark won't go out. Don placed at only 12 rodeos in calf roping yet earned \$7,756, picked up another \$1,034 team roping, all of which added to his title loot, earned him \$12,228.

Don and his wife, Jeanie, have six youngsters, five girls and a boy.

Sonny Davis Kenna, N.M.

(2nd—\$3,529) — In the last eight years this explosive 220-pounder, credited by other cowboys with some of the greatest roping runs in rodeo history, has finished out of the top six steer ropers only once; and three of those seasons he was title runner-up. Sonny's calf roping record is almost as impressive, being among the top eight winners each year since '59, and runner-up in '61.

Born Jan. 2, 1935, Sonny, coached by his dad, started roping as a pro at 15. Even then Son had an unequalled velocity in his roping tactics. Big—he stands 6'3"—he owns the steer roping record, 12.1 seconds, a time considered rapid even on calves; and in '59, at Ft. Worth, set the still unsurpassed calf roping mark for one rodeo of \$5,278. Sonny's overall total in '63 was \$16,746.

Many feel Sonny would be even harder to beat if he'd slow down a fraction, but Dale Smith has claimed, "Sonny knows what's best for him. Getting any tougher, he'd starve us all to death." Sonny and his wife, Dot, have two daughters.

Webster Shoat Lenapah, Okla

(3rd—\$3,018) — A ranch and cattle keep Shoat busy most of the year. Leading steer roping charts before the Pendleton Roundup in mid-September, Webster stayed at home working, and saw McLaughlin go ahead of him in the standings. Then at the Finals, in Pawhuska, a broken rope on his third steer cost Shoat any further chance at the '63 title.

But this stocky, 5'8", 180-pounder, already had proved his roping ability. Four times steer roping champion ('49-'50-'54-'55), Shoat was runner-up three other years, and never worse than sixth any of the remaining eight seasons.

Born Jan. 23, 1925, Webster grew up following the footsteps of a famous roping uncle, the late Fred Lowry. During the early Fifties, Shoat won steadily in calf roping and steer wrestling, as well as steer roping. He retired the Sam Jackson trophy at Pendleton, winning the award there four different years.

Shoat and his wife, Shirley, have two children, live on 2,000 acres west of Lenapah.

The National Finals Rodeo

The fifth NFR, held Nov. 26-Dec. 1, 1963 in Los Angeles Sports Arena, may go into the record books as the hardest fought Finals of them all; and, despite being held in the shadow of the century's greatest tragedy—the assassination of John F. Kennedy—logged attendance figures only twenty percent less than the record 85,000 persons who saw the '62 title playoffs.

(Five-year average attendance for the Finals is 51,542 paid admissions, with gross gate receipts averaging \$220,115.)

Climactic rodeo of the year, determining the season's world champions, the NFR was conceived by the cowboys themselves and first held at Dallas in '59, under aegis of the State Fair of Texas. Two years later, following a covenant in its original charter the Finals site moved. The new host was Los Angeles, under sponsorship of H. Werner Buck, west coast sports impresario.

Another location for the "cowboy world series" is scheduled for '65, continuing the premise that as many sectors of the country as possible be acquainted with the sport in its true light—straight, hard competition, unhampered by frills or screen personalities—and to leave a successful rodeo in the Finals' wake. The latter was accomplished at Dallas, with its annual Cotton Bowl rodeo, during Xmas week.

Contestant qualification for the Finals is limited to the ninety top money winning cowboys of the season—a total of fifteen entries in each of six events—who battle 345 head of broncs, bulls, steers and calves, during eight action-packed go-rounds, in pursuit of a \$65,500 prize money packet. Winnings are totalled with seasonal earnings to decide the champions.

(North America's fifty-odd professional bucking strings, grouped under the Rodeo Cowboys Association's banner, are screened by the NFR Commission's stock selection committee for the 225 head of equine and bovine outlaws needed for the playoffs three riding events.)

The NFR, composed of elected representatives from the ranks of rodeo committeemen, stock contractors and contestants, also handles all administrative problems, transportation, care and feeding of livestock, even down to arranging individual, insurance policies on each animal selected for the Finals.

Inside rodeo, even in the short span of the NFR's existence, it has become the accepted criterion of a cowboy's ability. Competitive pressure builds higher at the playoffs than anywhere else during the season. In the '63 edition, the saddle bronc riding champion-

ship hung in the balance until the last horse, with Texan Guy Weeks finally edging out Canada's Marty Wood by the slim margin of \$244 for the entire year. In bull riding where previously the hump-shouldered miscreants have batted a .1000, Canadian cowboy, Leo Brown, became the first ever to qualify on all mounts allotted him; and in the timed events, wiry New Mexican, Olin Young, from Albuquerque, bested his own record by winning the Finals calf roping contest for the third time. He averaged fourteen seconds on eight head, to set another Finals mark.

Bucking Horse of the Year

Among bronc riders an "honest" bucking horse evokes the same mixture of respect and admiration as the hard-knocking thoroughbred in the turf kingdom. Such favoritism toward one of these refractory, spine-jolting equines, whose only therapy is whacking riders against the ground, may seem a little far-fetched. But a cowboy is well aware of the chances he takes and values the animal's efforts to bring him down; for the wilder the ride the more money can be made.

So that these equine athletes might gain what was felt to be rightful recognition outside the sport, the R.C.A., in the fall of the year, asks the top twenty bronc riders in the title standings to vote for the horse they thought the best bucking horse of that season.

For both '62 and '63, their selection was Big John, a 1400-lb bay gelding from Harry Knight's string, at Fowler, Colo. (Knight's horses also won the '58 and '60 awards). Quiet and well-mannered in the saddling chute, Big John waits for the gate to fly open before displaying his brand of pyrotechnics.

Off a farm near Saskatoon, Sask., where he was purchased as half a work team, the horse came into the hands of Jack Bloxham, Havre, Mont., stockman, when his team-mate turned out to be an incorrigible balker. Bloxham, who since has become an R.C.A. stock

contractor, furnished some bucking stock for state high school rodeos.

As last minute replacement in bareback bronc riding during one of these contests, Bloxham sent the sleepy bay into action without really knowing if he'd buck or not. Nobody was in doubt for long. Big John came uncorked like champagne, and nearly tossed his rider over the grandstand. He remained unridden until after being sold to Harry Knight eighteen months later.

Each year during Denver's National Western rodeo, in January, the bucking horse of the year after donning the silver-mounted halter awarded him by Rodeo Sports News meets the newly-crowned saddle bronc riding champion in a special match. In '62, Big John flattened Canada's Ken McLean right out of the gate, but lost to the '63 champion, Texan Guy Weeks, who earned a scorching 84 mark for his ride.

Other Years

1962—Big John, owned by Harry Knight, Fowler, Colo.

1961—Jesse James, 1100-pound palomino gelding, owned by Hoss Inman, of Lamar, Colo., who paid a record \$2,200 for the animal in the fall of '60. Raised in the Dakotas, Jesse is the popular conception of an outlaw bronc. Untractable and dangerous to a man on foot, he can be led from horseback.

1960—Jake, a sorrel gelding, owned by Harry Knight, and noted for his twisting, shoulder-dropping style. Purchased in '56 along with 30 other broncs at the annual Miles City, Mont., bucking horse auction. The lot cost a total of \$3,000.

1959—Trail's End, 1200-pound sorrel gelding, owned by the Zumwalt Rodeo Company, of Missoula, Mont. Raised in the Bitter Root mountain country, Trail's End bucks his best in a building arena where he uses the walls, much as a pitcher uses his "brush back" throw, to loosen a rider. Subject of a sports documentary by Life's Marshall Smith, in '62.

1958—Knight's Joker, and Christensen Brothers War Paint tied for the honor, the latter's third straight nomination. Joker contracted lockjaw enroute home from the Ft. Madison, Ia., rodeo that fall, which proved fatal.

1957—War Paint, a bay and white gelding, purchased off the Klamath Indian reservation in '51, was famous for his high dive out of the chute, a move that served to loosen his rider for the jolting action to follow. Few cowboys weathered the storm; still bucking in '63.

1956—War Paint, owned by Hank and Bob Christensen, of Eugene, Ore., won the first bucking horse of the year award and the silver mounted halter awarded by Rodeo Sports News.

Rookie of the Year

Pro rodeo's rookie of the year is selected by the Rodeo Cowboys Association administrative board. The award is made to the newcomer who, in their eyes, shows most competitive prowess. The board's ultimate choice for '63, after scanning the qualifications of a half-dozen nominees, was a red-haired, freckled-faced 19-year-old, Bill Kornell, of Palm Springs, Calif., who promptly justified their opinion by going on to win the bull riding championship. (page 7)

(So far, only one other rookie ever captured a championship the same season. The '59 selection, Idaho's big Harry Charters Jr., also won the steer wrestling title.)

Born at Klamath Falls, Ore., Billy came into contact with the cowboy world at an early age around the ranch owned by his grandfather, W.A. Seruys. Later transplanted to California—where more rodeo action goes on month in, month out than anywhere else in the world—it was natural for the youngster to gravitate to the sport, aided and abetted by his grand-dad, for whom Bill holds great respect and affection.

Of the many who hanker to test their fortitude and skill riding bulls only a few ever really master the technique

of balance astride the loose-hidden outlaws. No gift, it comes the hard way, through actual practice; getting on a lot of stock is the only path to improvement.

Still in high school, Bill apprenticed himself to the trade in the summer of '61. He picked up needed pointers, traveling with fellow Californian, Ed LeTourneau, weathered a concussion, from a bull's horn, and a badly broken wrist, from being stepped on. Graduating the next spring (with a B-plus average) Bill built more experience in a bone-rattling tour that had him covering 31,000 miles to place in only thirteen rodeos.

But miles and accumulated know-how began paying dividends in '63. Bill, under competitive pressure all the way, came from behind to win the championship and \$15,342.

Past Rookie Awards

1962—Jim Houston, 22, Omaha, Neb., for his winning ability on bareback broncs. A star end on Omaha's Tech High grid team, Jim got his riding start during summer vacations around Cody, Wyo. He finished ninth for the BB championship in '62, 8th in '63.

1961—Ken McLean, 25, Okanagan Falls, B.C., for finishing 4th for the SB championship, winning \$14,640. He went on to win the '62 SB title; finished 10th SB standings in '63.

1960—Larry Kane, 25, Big Sandy, Mont., for finishing among the top 15 SB riders three months after turning pro. He was 6th for the SB title in '61; 4th in '62; fifth in '63. (Full bio, page 5).

1959—Harry Charters Jr., 38, Melba, Ida., also won the SW title in his first pro year, and a total \$24,930. (Full bio, page 4).

1958—Benny Reynolds, 28, Dillon, Mont., for all-around cowboy ability, winning \$26,450 in four events his first pro season. AA champion in '61. (Full bio, page 4).

1957—Bob A. Robinson, 30, Tuttle, Ida., for all-around cowboy ability in riding and roping events. Second for AA championship in '60, earning \$29,213 that season, he won the SW title in a cliffhanger finish with veteran Harley May.

1956—John W. Jones, 31, San Luis Obispo, Calif., for finishing 5th in SW title standings. A husky 200-pounder, who also excels in calf roping, he won a total \$8,342 in '61, finishing 13th for the SW title that year and in '62 also; was 11th in SW standings in '63.

The Rodeo Cowboy

With few notable exceptions, rodeo cowboys always have come from ranch backgrounds where riding and roping was part of everyday life. But in the last ten years a new breed of cowboy athlete, keeping pace with the sport's own growth, has been thronging professional ranks.

Through a staggering array of junior rodeos, national high school and inter-collegiate rodeo competition, these men already are chock full of arena experience before venturing out on the year-round contest trail.

Further opportunity to sharpen their skills are the countless roping clubs and practice riding arenas which have mushroomed over the country from upper New York to California. Result of all this new activity has been to push individual ability to a new high.

Rodeo attracts followers in the beginning much as any competitive, contact sport. But once a cowboy learns he can stand on his own through ability alone, independence and freedom outweigh any threat of serious injury.

Under no contract, a rodeo cowboy pays his own way, earns only what he is good enough to win. His financial reward, however, is small, compared, for example, to baseball's salaried stars. Few rodeo cowboys win \$18,000 a season.

Saddle Bronc Riding

Identity of the first man to tangle with a bucking horse is hidden in history but saddle bronc riding is the cornerstone of all rodeo competition. Experience and "know-how" are paramount in this event where rules are strictly in favor of the animal.

Equipment

Saddles are uniform in design. They must comply with measurements set forth by the R.C.A. One rein is used, usually of braided Manila, some 6 feet long and an inch and a half thick. It is fastened to the bucking horse halter. Spurs are short-shanked, with dull rowels. Chaps are of light leather, snugged tight around the thigh.

Rules

A rider is disqualified for:

1. Failing to keep spurs over the animal's shoulder points until first jump out of the chute is completed. (Called "starting" the horse.)
2. Touching animal or equipment with free hand during the ride.
3. Losing a stirrup.
4. Bucking off before official end of the ride. (Length of the ride may be 8 or 10 seconds. Choice is the stock contractor's, usually based on size of the arena.)

How They Ride

Leaving the chute, the rider tries at once to find "timing" with the bronc's action. Properly executed, his spurred feet fall into rhythmic stride, going to the animal's shoulders as it kicks high behind, moving back toward the saddle's cantle as the bronc jumps.

Some common causes of buck-offs are: too long a rein, letting rider back up on the cantle and then thrown forward; too short a rein, pulling him over the horse's head; a spurred foot catching momentarily in the animal's shoulder, which levers him off on the side the spur hangs up.

Bareback Riding

This is the youngest of rodeo's three standard riding contests. Developed in the arena, it has no actual tie-in with workaday ranch duties. Since becoming a requirement at all R.C.A.-approved rodeos some twenty years ago, bareback bronc riding now is one of the game's most populated events.

Same rules of disqualifications as used in saddle bronc riding, with exception of rule No. 3 (losing a stirrup).

How They Ride

Higher and wilder a bareback rider spurs, the better his marking by the judges. Feet forward at all times, in contrast to saddle bronc riding style, rider clings close against the rigging handhold, tries to keep legs flailing in time with the bronc's jumps. A strong hand and fine sense of balance are needed to keep from being jerked back away from the handhold, a situation that generally leads to a buck-off.

Equipment

Instead of saddles, a double-thick leather pad, called a rigging, is cinched on the bronc's back. No stirrups or rein are used. Slightly off-center at the top of the rigging is a leather handhold. Bareback riders like the one-hand hold snug-fitting as possible for better grip. Spurs and a glove are only other riding gear needed, but chaps often are worn, similar to those used in saddle bronc riding.

Bull Riding

Serious injury occurs more often in this event than any other in rodeo. Capable of savage, sustained bucking, cross-bred Brahma bulls first were introduced into the arena, circa 1921. Fast and powerful, most of them weigh over 1,500 pounds. The loose-hided animals add injury to insult by trying to gore or trample a fallen rider. They are dangerous, as well, in the chute where their leaning weight can easily break a rider's legs.

Equipment

Woven with a single handhold, a flat-braided length of manila rope about an inch and a quarter in width is used—noose fashion around the bull—set just behind the animal's shoulders. A weighted bell also is attached to the

rope, which allows it to fall free when the ride is completed. Tightly strapped spurs and a riding glove complete necessary gear. Chaps of the "shot-gun" variety, so-called for their close-fitting length, are sometimes worn.

Rules

More leniency is shown than in saddle and bareback bronc riding. A bull rider is not required to spur his mount but may receive additional credit from the judges if he does so; in the air when official end of the ride is signaled, but still holding some part of his rope, rider still rates a qualifying mark.

Disqualification comes from hitting the ground before the eight-second ride is completed; failing to have bell attached to his rope; for touching his mount with the free hand at anytime during the ride.

How They Ride

Some cowboys claim a Brahma bull can buck anybody off, anytime they turn on full power. One thing for certain, the snuffy, slack-hided animals devise more spine-rattling action in the arena than any other breed of bovine yet. Staying in the middle of one calls for balance and a strong riding arm.

If possible, the rider stays seated close up on his rope handhold, legs held slightly forward clutching the bull's rib cage. Slipping back off the rope, thus straightening your riding arm, the bull's power will jerk your hand loose, usually the next jump.

Spinning bulls are considered more hazardous to ride than those who buck straightaway. There is more danger of being trampled or butted if a rider falls to the inside of the whirling animal.

Since the bulls fight a man on horseback just as eagerly as one on foot—unlike saddle and bareback broncs—no pickup men are used. Instead a rider dismounts on his own, depends on the bull-baiting clown to keep the animal's attention while he gets out of range.

Steer Wrestling

Developed in the rodeo arena, steer wrestling like bareback bronc riding, never was a part of ranch work. Its origin, more than forty years ago, is laid at the door of a Negro cowboy, Bill Pickett, while working in a Wild West show.

With time taken between flags, steer wrestling is a series of practiced moves beginning as a contestant, aided by another mounted cowboy called "the hazer," leaps from a running horse to the steer's horns, bringing the animal to a halt and then wrestling it to the ground.

Other than a steer wrestling mount and the hazer, whose duty is to keep the steer running straight as possible, none is needed. The hazer is paid an

eighth of what the steer wrestler may win. Many cowboys own a "team," i.e., both steer wrestling mount and hazing horse, get a fourth for their use, serving also as hazer.

Rules

Officials are two or more timekeepers, a field and scoreline judge. Contestant waits, with hazer posted on opposite side of the release gate, until steer crosses designated scoreline. Breaking barrier adds 10-second penalty. Steer must be on its feet before being wrestled down. Running falls do not count. Steer is to be flat on its side, all four legs extended, before official time is given.

Things to Watch

Where a steer wrestler's feet hit the ground after taking hold of the steer is a key to further action. A good steer wrestling horse sweeps on by, leaving the cowboy's legs extended at a 45-degree angle to the steer's path. Bringing the animal around in an arc, at the top of the swing, the steer wrestler reaches for the right horn tip, using his left hand in additional leverage under the steer's jaw. Off-balance momentum, plus upturned head, causes the steer to literally throw himself.

Calf Roping

A coordinated effort of horse and rider, against time, calf roping has been honed to such high competitive polish usually only tenths of a second divide the winners.

Since every phase of a roper's actions are planned to coincide with his mount, any disruption of the pattern costs precious seconds. A solid, true-working horse is valuable property. Today such an animal commands a four-figure price tag.

Equipment

Lariat ropes, generally about 25 feet long and three-eighths of an inch thick, are tied at one end to the saddle horn, the other end forming the catch loop. If he misses the first throw, roper may use a second rope coiled ready on the saddle. He is allowed only two throws. Missing with both he must retire with no time.

A slimmer 6-foot length of rope, usually tucked in the roper's belt, is used to tie the calf. Horse gear, i.e. saddle, bridle, etc., are roper's own selection.

Rules

The event calls for two or more timekeepers, field flag judge and scoreline flag judge. Length of score (headstart) given calf depends on arena's size. Roper remains behind a barrier until calf crosses scoreline. Breaking through the barrier adds 10 seconds to roper's time.

Calves used may not average over 350 pounds. After the catch, roper must throw calf by hand, cross any three legs for the tie, then signal for time by raising his hands. Field judge then passes on the tie.

Things to Watch

Long, tedious hours of practice and schooling go into this action you see in the arena. More than the roper, watch the horse, rating the speed of the calf, stopping on cue, then backing fast to keep the rope taut as the roper runs to his quarry. How well the horse carries out these hard-taught maneuvers is the difference between wins and losses. Calf-roping mounts may be any bloodlines but because of their natural, early speed, quarter-horses are used more than any other. Most important requisite, though, is heart.

Team Roping

Catching cattle by the horns and hind feet has been a simple way to doctor injuries or brand since early range days. Rodeo's version is a speeded-up contest against time. Highly popular in California, Arizona and Nevada rodeos, with bankers, doctors and dentists, among ardent competitors, team roping is not one of the sport's standard events.

There are two styles of team roping. One is the west coast pattern, of taking a turn of the rope around the saddle horn after making a catch. This is called dally roping. The other, termed Arizona style, calls for lariat ropes tied to the saddle horn. Each style follows different rules.

Equipment

Both team roping styles require fast handling mounts. Saddles and bridles are the ropers' own choice. Ropes, some 28 feet long, are used. Dally roping saddles usually have a higher horn to facilitate turns with the catch rope.

Dally Roping Rules

Two or more timekeepers, a field and scoreline flag judge are used. Steer is given designated start with both ropers behind a barrier. Breaking the barrier is an automatic 10-second penalty. Picking up a front foot in the head loop adds a 5-second penalty and heel roper is also assessed a 5-second fine if he catches only one hind foot. A total of three throws are allowed. Ropers must face their horses toward steer with ropes taut for official time.

Team Tying Rules

Same officials and starting rules as in dally roping. No penalty assessed for picking up front foot in head loop or for snaring only one hind foot in heel loop. After catches are made, head roper dismounts and ties steer's hind legs below the hocks, with a short length of twisted rope, raising his hands, after completing a double knot, to signify time.

Things to Watch

Head ropers place their roped quarry in position most advantageous for the heeler's throw. Snaring hind feet on a jumping, twisting steer must be timed

to precision. Dally ropers run the ever present danger of losing fingers in the slipping turns of the rope around the saddle horn.

Steer Roping

Tying down the big steers single-handed against time—calling for more scientific skill perhaps than any other roping contest—is one of rodeo's original events. In recent years, however, it has been dropped by most rodeos. Some felt it too rough for the uninitiated and the event cannot be held except in out-size arenas.

Cheyenne Frontier Days and the Pendleton Roundup are two of the major rodeos left where the events' top hands gather each season.

Properly executed, a mounted roper snares the running steer's horns, laying the rope's slack over the steer's right hip. Then, angling his mount to the left as the rope tightens, the steer is spun to the ground. While his mount leans into the rope, keeping the steer prone, roper runs back on foot to group and tie any three legs.

Equipment

Lariat ropes are twisted nylon, about 28 feet long and virtually unbreakable. Tie string is longer and heavier than those used in calf roping. Saddle, bridle, etc., are roper's own choice.

Rules

Two or more timekeepers, field and scoreline flag judges are the officials. Steer is given designated headstart while roper waits behind barrier. Breaking the barrier is a 10-second penalty. Steer must remain tied until approved by field flag judge. Only clean catch of steer's horns is allowed. Two throws permitted.

Things to Watch

Steer horses are specially trained. They must be fast, and strong enough to withstand the steer's weight on the end of the rope. An important part of their training is to stop pulling, at once, on command. The horses learn this through practice runs, made with a heavy log used to simulate a steer's poundage.

Wild Horse Race—An added event, R.C.A. approved but with no championship award. Teams of three cowboys, on foot, try to saddle unbroken mustangs in the arena. One team member then tries to ride animal across given scoreline.

Wild Cow Milking—Another added event with no R.C.A. title award. Against time, two cowboys attempt to get at least one drop of milk from the cow into a small-neck bottle, then deliver it across designated line.

Steer Decorating—The Canadian variation of steer wrestling. Contestant jumps from his running horse on the steer, placing an elastic band on the animal's horn, instead of wrestling the steer to the ground. The event is not seen at rodeos in this country.

Rodeo Cowboys Association



They have been called—with more truth than they like to admit—the world's most battered board of directors. The combined salaries of the voting members won't add up to the price of a hamburger dinner. Yet their decisions affect a sport which, over the past decade, has paid out nearly thirty-three million dollars in prize money.

They are the twelve men who sit on the board of the Rodeo Cowboys Association, the non-profit, service, organization which is both the conscience and moving spirit of professional rodeo. Like the P.G.A. in golf, or the NCAA in inter-collegiate sports, the R.C.A. sets the rules in pro rodeo, names the champions and speaks for the sport on national issues.

Started some 28 years ago as a contestants' brotherhood—dedicated to protecting the cowboy's economic rights in the hardship years of the depression Thirties—the organization then called itself the Cowboys Turtle Association. Demands were limited to standard rules, fair and experienced judges and adequate prize money. But their sport was the world's most disorganized, a series of unrelated contests which, like Topsy, "just grewed" from the informal cowboy sessions on the plains of the early west. The rodeos were—and still are—organized and underwritten by volunteer committees of businessmen who contributed their time and energy as a service to the community. These same

men recognized the need for closer cohesion among rodeos. But as volunteers with their own livelihood to earn in other fields they had little time for organization beyond their own contest.

So the cowboys, the full-time professionals in the sport, were encouraged to take over responsibility. Now, superimposed on the association's traditional concern with contest conditions, is dedication to the future of rodeo as a whole.

There was, for example, the problem of network TV exposure. Some advocates of television insist there can't be too much, that such exposure creates millions of new fans. But the R.C.A. dissents, having noted the box office problems of league baseball and prize fight arenas, limits the number of network telecasts to no more than six a season.

The executive body of the R.C.A. is made up of eight directors and four officers. There is a director for each of the championship events—saddle and bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding, team roping and steer roping, plus a director who represents contract members.

The president and directors are elected at large by the membership, two vice-presidents and a secretary-treasurer appointed by the board. All must be active participants in rodeo with the exception of the secretary-treasurer, who as the only salaried board member, owns no vote.

1951 saw the association win its fight for group accident insurance for all members; publication of Rodeo Sports News began in '52 and three years later, the Rodeo Information Commission, national news and service bureau for the sport, was inaugurated and financed.

The National Finals Rodeo Commission was created in '58 to produce the title playoffs as competitive climax of the season; and newest of all these related agencies is the Rodeo Foundation, a high level advisory group, of committeemen, stock contractors and contestants.

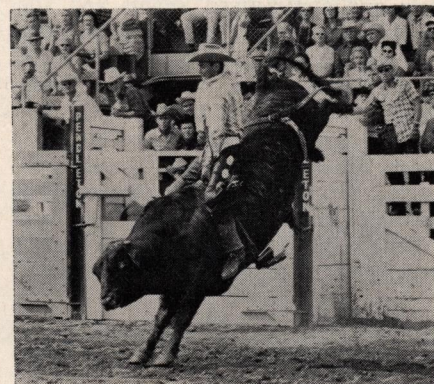
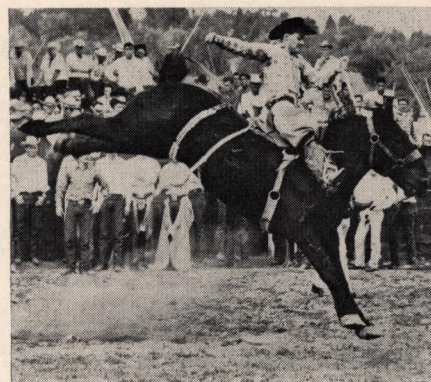
