BRIEF HISTORY AND DESCRIPTION OF THE RELANDER COLLECTION

Click Relander, former Yakima editor and author, collected a voluminous personal library related primarily to Pacific Northwest history and Central Washington Indians. This library consisted of books, private papers, microfilm, and photographs which Mr. Relander used in his work as a writer and sculptor. Following his death in late 1969, this collection was sold to a Seattle, Washington, bookstore where it remained while several groups negotiated for its purchase. Included in the collection of papers was a large quantity of materials relating specifically to the Yakima Valley, so it was with great pleasure that the Yakima Valley Regional Library accepted the Relander Collection as a gift of anonymous donors in December 1970.

The moving of the collection from Yakima to Seattle and back again seriously disrupted any possible logical arrangement the papers may originally have had. Furthermore, Mr. Relander's wide range of interests resulted in his collecting similar materials at different times and for different projects. For example, in his vertical files Relander had more than 75 scattered folders dealing specifically with various Indian tribes' relationship with federal and state governments. Thus it was necessary to bring all related materials together if the collection was to be of any value to researchers. The rearranged collection is, we hope, more readily useable for both scholarly research and reference work in the Yakima Valley Regional Library.

The Relander Collection may be divided into three major categories--personal papers and research materials, papers of organizations with which Mr. Relander was associated, and original papers and documents collected by Relander from a variety of sources. The personal papers comprise nearly 80% of the entire collection; however, the unique part of the collection is the group of original documents. There is also a fine collection of books and pamphlets relating to the Pacific Northwest, which are catalogued and stored in the boardroom of the library.

The Relander Collection provides valuable information for Pacific Northwest historians, notably original source material and numerous bibliographies and leads to further documents not in the Collection.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Click Relander is best remembered for his work and friendship with Central Washington Indians. Like Lucullus Virgil McWhorter and Francis Garrecht before him, Relander was one of a small group of men who had a profound interest in the well-being and fair treatment of American Indians and, as a result of their dedicated efforts, were rewarded with honorary membership in an Indian tribe. In 1951 Puck Hyah Toot, leader of the Wanapum Indians of Priest Rapids, adopted Relander and bestowed on him the family name Now-Tow-Look. This facet of Now-Tow-Look's interests, however, reflects only one ray of his prismatic productivity. Mr. Relander also deserves recognition as a journalist for his work on the Yakima Herald-Republic, as an author of several historical books and pamphlets, as a sculptor and artist, and as a collector and preserver of Central Washington historical memorabilia.

Born on a farm near Danville, Indiana, Relander lived with his aunt after his mother's death. A former schoolteacher, she introduced young Clifford to the world of books, which made a lasting impact on the boy. In his late teens he joined his father in California and completed his formal education. He then went to Los Angeles to study sculpture under Julia Bracken Wendt, a pupil of sculptor Lorado Taft and herself recognized as a prominent woman artist. The influence of Taft's realism in art is clearly reflected in Relander's works, some of which are on permanent exhibit in the Wanapum Dam Tour Center.

Before going to Los Angeles, Mr. Relander chose journalism for his career. Leaving the City of the Angels, he returned to Tulare County, California, where his father lived. There he worked for the Visalia Times-Delta but continued to sculpt, which led him to a study of American Indians. While composing his own biographical note for the cover of *Drummers and Dreamers*, Mr. Relander wrote, "The striking features and patient character of the Indians attracted him to the original Americans thirty years ago and this naturally led to a serious study." This "serious study" found expression in some excellent busts of San Joaquin Valley Indians. Several of these were sent to the Southwest Museum in Los Angeles, and another was selected by the Smithsonian Institution for permanent display in their anthropological section. Only gradually did Relander's interest in the Indian change from that of the artist to that of the historian and anthropologist.

In 1945 Mr. Relander moved to Yakima, Washington, and began work for the Yakima Herald, where he remained until his death in 1969. Although concentrating his time on his journalistic career, Relander began an intensive study of a small band of Indians, the Wanapums of Priest Rapids. His respect for their culture and needs opened the minds and hearts of the Wanapums, who made Click a confidant of their deeply religious group. After years of research, usually in the field and accompanied by Wanapum leader Puck Hyah Toot, Relander wrote the definitive history of this Priest Rapids band, *Drummers and Dreamers*. The American Association for State and Local History recognized Relander's work with the presentation of their Award of Merit in 1956.

While working with the Wanapums, Relander befriended the Yakima Indians. His involvement with their tribal affairs led to his testimony as a government witness in the Ahtanum Water Rights dispute in 1952. In 1955, he wrote *Yakima Treaty Centennial, 1855-1955* published by the Yakima Tribe to commemorate the signing of the 1855 Steven's Treaty. Eight years later Relander penned *Strangers on the Land*, a book-length pamphlet describing the economic and social development of the tribe since the white man's encroachment on the Yakima's historic lands.

Mr. Relander did not limit his historical studies to the Indians. In Visalia he helped rejuvenate the Tulare County Historical Society and continued his membership after moving to Washington. Arriving in the Evergreen State, Relander joined the Washington State Historical Society. The Society elected him to their Board of Curators in 1952, a position he held until 1968. He also committed himself to history-orientated projects in the Yakima Valley. Serving as chairman for the research committee of the Fort Simcoe at Mool-Mool Restoration Society, Relander assisted in the drive to preserve and promote Fort Simcoe as an historical site. He participated in the push for a Yakima museum and joined the Yakima Valley Society for the Preservation of Early Western Americana, a group formed in the late 1960's to facilitate the acquisition and display of the Gannon Museum of Wagons.

Although active in the preservation and distribution of local history data, Mr. Relander generally confined his writings in this field to newspaper feature stories. He did, however, co-author *Yakima, 1885-1960, Diamond Jubilee*, and his paper, "The Battleground of National Irrigation," was read before the Pacific Northwest History Conference and later printed in the Pacific Northwest Quarterly.

A prodigious worker, Relander tried his hand at fiction in 1958. *Drummers and Dreamers* had been a scholarly success, but not a best seller. He began work on two manuscripts, *Sorority Row* and *The Lonely Road* and for three years wrote and revised these stories. He contacted a literary agent, Laura Wilch, to promote his works with New York publishing houses but to no avail. Though apparently aware of the difficulty of selling a manuscript in the commercial market, Relander was sorely disappointed when neither of his works succeeded. However, a character from *The Lonely Road*, Joe Leather, became Relander's vehicle for telling the story of the Yakima Indians in *Strangers on the Land*.

To memorialize his Wanapum friends, Mr. Relander resumed his work as a sculptor. In 1965 the Grant County Public Utility District formulated plans for a visitors' display at Wanapum Dam. Relander, having worked closely with the P.U.D. during construction of Wanapum and Priest Rapids dams, proposed making sculptured busts of prominent Wanapum Indians for display in the tour center. He further suggested that E. G. Quigley, a prominent Northwest artist, be commissioned to paint a mural depicting the history of the region surrounding the dam sites. The P.U.D. agreed to Relander's suggestions and both projects became part of the permanent displays at the Wanapum Tour Center.

Mr. Relander's work for the P.U.D. exemplifies the intensity of his labors. After eight to ten hours at the newspaper office, he would often work eight or more hours sculpting. To facilitate his historical research, he purchased a microfilm reader and personally transcribed

thousands of pages of microfilm, books and newspapers. Though he sold many of his collected books from which he had made typescripts, his library still contained over 6,000 volumes at the time of his death. After 1950 Mr. Relander preserved nearly all of his correspondence with people who shared his interests. At the same time he collected original manuscripts and business records containing a wealth of information about Central Washington.

During his lifetime, Click Relander readily shared his knowledge and resources with fellow scholars and students. He often spoke before civic organizations, geneological groups, and historical societies. The legacy of Mr. Relander's willingness to assist and stimulate others was guaranteed by his thorough research and preservation of source material. His Papers, now permanently housed at the Yakima Valley Regional Library, provide a wealth of information for the student of journalism, authorship, Northwest and Western history, and American Indians.

Drafts of Relander's major published work, Drummers and Dreamers, have been arranged by chapter number, although these numbers do not necessarily coincide with those of the published draft. Another major work, though never published, The Lonely Road, has been arranged sequentially according to the revision number of the manuscript, of which there are twelve revisions. Some of the manuscripts in this sub-series were apparently written as part of Relander's testimony as an expert witness in Indian claims cases such as Celilo Fishery and Ahtanum water rights controversies. The second sub-series, newspaper article drafts, has been arranged by subject. Book production, promotion and sales includes general records, mailing lists, and specific categories concerning the publication and sales of Drummers and Dreamers, Strangers on the Land, and The Yakimas, 1855-1955. The fourth sub-series, speeches, includes typescript, note-cards, and notebooks of Relander's speeches to a variety of civic and historical groups as well as to fellow authors. No effort has been made to sort the nearly 1000 notecards so that the reconstruction of some speeches may be exceedingly difficult.

Arranged into four sub-series. Relander's loose handwritten notes were scattered and generally illegible and little effort has been made to identify the subject matter of the notes. Some concern meetings of the Yakima Indian Tribal or General Council, many seem to be notes taken for newspaper stories. Notebooks, also handwritten,

have been arranged by subject. Many deal with more than one topic so the most important or lengthy theme has been selected for classification purposes. The third sub-series, transcripts, includes typescript of Relander's notes from microfilm, government documents, books and articles, newspaper clippings, memoirs, letters, journals, diaries, etc., interviews, field notes, and miscellaneous sources. Each of these categories has been arranged according to author or title when known, and by subject when unknown. This sub-series covers a wide range of topics and contains a great deal of material for the scholar of Pacific Northwest history. The fourth sub-series, collected manuscripts, theses, notes, etc., is also a valuable source for Pacific Northwest historians. These documents are also arranged alphabetically by author.

RELANDER AS A COLLECTOR (1826-1969)
