Sir

Since writing you as to our
action and Judge White's orders and acts, Mr O'Day's
man Whealdon has through their laborers replaced all
of the wire fence obstructions between the houses of
the Indians and their fishing berths in the Columbia -
and threatened them with violence, and to place
U. S. attorney General White in jail, as well as
the writer.

The Indians waited upon me in a body today
to know what to do, as they feared his loud talk.

I told them to go back and open the places which
they did before when they followed Judge White's personal
orders. At which time he also ordered that, "Shaw's Taglor
or his men obstruct these trails again to remove them"

They seem afraid of Taglor. I wrote to Judge White today the facts
and expressed willingness to open the way if ordered. Yours Thos. S. Lang
