



1957 CONTROLLED DEER AND ELK SEASONS

Controlled hunt applications may only be used by the person to whom the corresponding Hunting Permit was issued.

Important: Anyone wishing to apply for any controlled hunt, either deer or elk, must remove the application attached to his punch card and fill in the following information:

(1) Name and address of applicant.

(2) Designate unit or area number and county in which applicant desires to hunt.

(3) Number of applicant's hunting license.

(4) Number of applicant's deer seal, if applying for a controlled deer hunt.

(5) Number of applicant's elk seal, if applying for a controlled elk hunt.

Applications shall be mailed to the Seattle office of the Department of Game, 509 Fairview Avenue North, Seattle 9, Washing-

following each drawing, validated permits will be mailed to successful applicants. If an applicant does not receive a permit within 15 days after the drawing, it can be assumed his name was not drawn.

WARNING: Only applications made on the form attached to Hunting permits will be accepted.

Any person entering his name on more than one application for a controlled hunt will be eliminated entirely from all drawings. Applications received by the Department of Game, which do not contain the above information or do not comply with the above requirements, and those received after the closing date and hour listed for the area will not be eligible to be drawn.

Permits are not transferable.

NOTE: Every person while hunting elk must have in his possession an elk seal, elk stamp, and a Hunting Permit (punch card). This is the same card required for pheasant and deer hunting. Immediately after an elk is bagged, the designated elk punch MUST be removed from this card and the seal locked to the carcass of the animal. A Hunting Permit (punch card) is not required during the deer or elk seasons after November 30, 1957.

1957 OPEN SEASONS

CHINESE PHEASANTS: General Open Season: October 13 to November 17, both dates inclusive, in all counties

Bag Limit: Three (3) cocks per day.
Season Bag and Possession Limit: Fifteen (15) cocks per season icason Bag and Possession Limit: Fifteen (15) cocks per season. Stote: Every person while hunting Chinese pheasants must have in his possession a Hunting Permit (punch card). This permit is issued free through all hunting license dealers. This Hunting Permit is also required for deer and elk hunting. Immediately after a pheasant is bagged, one of the pheasant punches for the date of kill MUST be removed from this card.

Iunting Hours: Pheasants, Quail and Chukar Partridges, 7 a. m. to 5 n. m.

CHUKAR PARTRIDGE:

Bag and Possession Limit: Five (5) chukars per day or a total of ten (10) in possession at any one time.

BLUE GROUSE, RUFFED GROUSE (Commonly known as the native pheasant), FRANKLIN GROUSE:

General Open Season:
September 21, 22, 28, 29, October 5, 6, and concurrent with the dates and areas of the general buck deer seasons in all counties of the state, EXCEPT Adams, Benton, Franklin, Grant, San Juan and Whitman counties.

Bag and Possession Limit: Three (3) grouse per day or a total of six (6) in possession at any one time, straight or mixed bag.

Hunting Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE: Closed season

Note: Every person while hunting deer must have in his possession a supplemental deer seal and a Hunting Permit (punch card). This is the same card required for pheasant hunting. Immediately after a deer is bagged the designated deer punch MUST be removed from this card and the seal locked to the carcass of the animal. A Hunting Permit (punch card) is not required during deer or elk seasons after November 30, 1957.

GENERAL BUCK DEER SEASONS: Bag Limit: One (1) buck deer with visible antlers. (Note: A visible antler is hereby defined as a bony growth with velvet shed that is visible above the hair.) October 13 to November 2, both dates inclusive, in all counties west of the summit of the Cascade Mountains.
