Murie, published by The Stackpole Company, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and the Wildlife Management Institute, Washington, D. C., 1951.

For details concerning the distribution of breeding stock we suggest that you contact the various State game departments. A list of the names and addresses is enclosed.

BIG GAME INVENTORY FOR 1956

Compiled by Branch of Wildlife Research
BUREAU OF SPORT FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE

The big-game kill and population estimates of this Inventory are given as reported by the States, based on the best information available to them. The population estimates are made as of the end of the calendar year. Total counts are impractical except in rare instances; estimates are generally based on trend counts—partial counts repeated year after year. These give some indication of probable changes in big-game populations, but sometimes the changes in inventory figures from year to year are the result of changes in estimating methods rather than of changes in populations.

The species listed are free ranging and do not include those of National parks or wildlife refuges.

BIG GAME INVENTORY FOR 1957

BUREAU OF SPORT FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE

The big-game kill and population figures in this Inventory are tabulated as reported by the States. These figures are based on the best information available on the abundance of each big-game species at the end of calendar year 1957. It is usually impractical to attempt to make total counts of a big-game species and in practically all cases the estimates are based on partial or trend counts which are repeated in the same areas and in the same way each year. Therefore, the chief value of this Inventory is in showing whether the species has increased, decreased, or remained relatively constant from one year to the next. It should not be considered as giving accurate figures on total abundance of these species.

The State of Washington reports 18 bighorn sheep under fence, recently introduced from British Columbia. Except for this case, all figures refer to free-ranging populations. Thus, the Inventory does not include animals confined by fences on National Parks or National Wildlife Refuges.

As in the past, the kill and population figures in this Inventory are the figures reported by the States. These estimates constitute the best information available on the abundance of big-game species at the end of the calendar year 1958. Attempts to make total counts of big-game animals are usually impractical; in most cases, estimates are based on partial or trend counts, repeated in the same way and on the same sample areas each year. Therefore, the chief value of this Inventory is in showing whether a species has increased, decreased, or remained relatively constant from one year to the next. The figures given should not be regarded as precise measurements of total abundance of these species.

Several States which formerly reported total population estimates have discontinued doing so, feeling that they are not justified by the harvest figures presented. Helpful indications of trend have, in most cases, been substituted. No figures for the State of Alaska are included in this Inventory, except for those under Mount McKinley National Park.

An innovation with this 1958 Inventory is the tabulation (Part 4) of animals under wire or free-ranging on various Federal- or State-administered areas. The treatment is similar (except for kill figures) to that in other parts of the Inventory, but with this initial effort the coverage is not as complete as might be desired. For this reason, only the totals or trends are indicated for those National Monuments, National Wildlife Refuges, and State Parks and Refuges which reported.
