came last evening and will remain
until Tuesday. They are somewhat
on the Doctor Mexican side, so you can
imagine how much we are enjoying
their visit. Mr. White is going to join
our Mt. Whitney club and this morning
he promised me that he would write
an article for our next Journal.
Mr. Ellis gave him copy of our last
number and I promised to send him
one of the first. They expect to reach
their home in Santa Barbara in two
weeks. I wish Mr. Stewart would send one

for me, to Stewart Edward White, Santa Barbara, and I will pay him when I get home. While at Eschum I visited Pinn Valley and met with a party to the Geyser Park of the Hawaiian.
