Mr. Bob H. Hansen has informed me that he has discussed my impending visit to Seattle in connection with the publication of my forthcoming book, Drummers and Dreamers. And I am pleased to learn you are interested in the possibilities we are suitable material for your program.

We are in Tacoma Sept. 10, and plan to come on into Seattle that evening, so no doubt would have plenty of time to talk with you before any appearance.

Right now, because of the death of Puck Hyah Toot, things are a bit unsettled, but I believe two and perhaps three Indians will accompany me. And they will be in regalia. I have my own regalia made by the older "anapums and with the burial of Puck Hyah Toot, my jacket is the only one left with the "anapum symbols of sun, moon and stars, and the openhand.

I am making reservations at the Olympia, although it is possible that the national convention of bricklayers may be a handicap on that score.

Review copies of the book are to be out any day now. I am writing the publisher, requesting that he send you a copy as soon as possible. Additionally, I am sending you a copy, to the same address, of the Yakima County Centennial booklet which the Yakima Nation requested me to edit for the 1955 centennial. I wrote several sections and compiled this in nine nights time in order to make a deadline.

If you are familiar with Dr. Charles Gates, you may ask him concerning my "Indian Project."

If you will let me know when to contact you on October 11, I will be most happy to confirm.
