daily--Yakima Herald, July 21, 1892.

Charles Henry, Will Carpenter and Will Crook spent several days up the Natcheez in the vicinity of Rattlesnake duringthe past week and brought back a three gallon jar filled with trout, a number of which measured from a foot and a half to two feet long-Yakima Herald, July 28, 1892.

The chicken and grouse season opened on Monday and a good many financiers who did not care toface their creditors were out enjoying the shooting. The birds are reported plentiful and not especially strong of wing--Yakima Herald, August 4, 1892.

John Stone reports that while he was on the Sound recently arrangements were made for two important cocking mains, one to be fought at Puyallup on the 10th and theother at Yakima on the 15th of January.

The principals in making the match are not desirous of having their names mentioned but one of them is a prominent attorney in Seattle and the mains will be for \$1,500 a side bette each.

Thirty birds will be used in each main--Yakima Herald,

December 8, 1892.

A well known hop man and a Roslyn fancier are arranging for a cocking main to take place at this place in about two weeks.

Considerable money is already wagered on the birds.

The ULS. fish car loaded with black bass to stock lakes Union and Washington passed through Yakima Monday night--Yakima Herald, Sept. 25, 1890.

The Spokane baseball club passed through Yakima Tuesday westward bound. They have finished at Snokane Falls and are now concluding the games of the circuit. They have captured the pennant without question. The standing of the clubs at present, and it probably will not be materially changed in the few games yet tobe played is as follows: Spokane Falls 650: Tacoma 542; Seattle 506: Portland # 301. The Spokanes have only three more games to win out of thirteen before they will make the pennant a certainity --Yakima Herald, September 25, 1890.

Salvator is without doubt the greatest running horse in the world. On the 28th of August at Monmouth, New Jersey, he broke all records by running the mile in 1:35 1-2. The previous record for the mile was Ravelo's 1:39 1-4 made over the Mo mo th track in July .--- Herald, September 4, 1890.

One day last week Will Lemon, while riding the range on the upper Wenas, encountered a big black bear. Lemon had no gun but he is very handy with the lariat and he soon had the rope around bruin and with true cowboy sckill and a hitch around the pommel of his saddle he quickly had the bear off of his feet and dragging over the ground. Then lashing him to a tree he dispatched him with rocks. 8-20-91

James Corbett, theyoung Californian, has covered John L. Sullivan's deposit of \$2,500 and articles have been signed for a fight between these two for \$10,000 side and a purse of \$25,000 before the Olympic club of New Wpleans on the 7th of September. 3-17-92

The four year old trotter, Margaret S was the most successful campaigner of 1890 in theway of money, winning 11 races netting her \$12,000. The great California filly won six races, was second in one, third in two, fourth in one and distanced in one.

The pacer Dallas, record 2.11 1-2 comes second in the list of successful campaigners while the Philadelphia mare, Mambrino Maid 2:17 1-2 ranks third. Leopard Rose, Hy Wikes and Abbie V were the most persistent performers, each starting in seventeen races. The latter won only two. Hy Wikes, 2:20, won nine of his 17 races and \$1,445. -- Yakima Herald, February 5, 1891.
