I thought perhaps that if you do not have copies of these, that they may be of interest to Mr. 'enderzicht, and I anticipate that there will be other references to the matter in subsequent letters which will be glad to send you copies of. True, you may already have them. They are ones imentioned to you on one of your visits to Yakima.

I gain a different perspective than incidental scanners of history may gain from this "incident." It appears far more than the attack upon a white man on "historical importance in my estimation and opens a big field of investigation, picture possibilities etc. esides the governors involved, there is the President of the United States, the scretary of "ar, secretary of the Navy, verious naval vessels etc. and a far wider field of history than is contained on "hidby's island.

I'm glad to hear that you and others plan to be here from eattle to attend the Fort imose meeting. My research in that matter is mounting rapidly.

I've locatednothing else especially new concerning Concommley but have some good lines out and high hopes.
