### Sorority Life

### Scholarship

Every since you entered grade school you have heard the term "scholarship" and have come to realize its importance. In college attending classes and maintaining good scholastic standing are of prime importance. Scholarship is a vital part of sorority life. Maintaining good scholarship contributes most to the individual, and also to the living group and college as a whole.

With the approval of the administration of WSC, Panhellenic has set a standard grade average of 2.3 which a girl must attain before she is eligible for initiation into her group. Many groups require that its pledges study a certain number of hours in the library each week, thus encouraging study habits. Organized study hours are maintained by many sororities on week nights, from 7:30 p.m. until 10:00 p.m. to further aid the individual study programs. Individual help is given to pledges. A girls must have a 2.3 grade average from high school or for her previous college work to be eligible to go through rush.

#### **Activities**

Sororities encourage reasonable participation in extra-curricular activities on the part of their members, feeling that through these activities the members broaden their interests, and the interests of the entire group as well. They feel, too, that the members will earn the benefits of cooperation, responsibility, and leadership. These activities are an integral part of college life, for they prepare one for taking one's place in the activities of home and community after college.

#### The Social Side

Coke dates, open house, firesides, formals, and semi-formals soon become part of the co-ed's vocabulary, on the social side of the slate. Washington State College's social activities place the emphasis on home and campus functions, with much to be gained by the individual in learning to meet and talk to people, in learning to entertain graciously, in qualities such as responsibility and initiative, so essential when you have been appointed to be in charge of a dinner or to decorate for a dance.

WSC's annual "open house," is a function which is well known for its campus-wide friendliness and is held at the beginning of each fall semester. Each women's living group on campus opens its doors to the men to come in to dance and chat.

### What is Rush?

Rush is an enriching experience and something from which you can greatly benefit. During rush week you are faced with an important decision—that of choosing your living group for your college career. Be sure to get acquainted with the people in as many groups as possible during rush, before making any choice.

Try to select a group with which you feel at ease and comfortable, one which offers you opportunities for enduring friendships, one whose members have wide and varied interests and one with which you feel you could work hard and congenially. Be wise, open-minded and sincere in your choice. Remember, make your choice on the basis of personal convictions, not campus gossip or preconceived notions.



A girl who has been awarded a room scholarship should not plan to go through Rush, unless she is willing to give up her scholarship privileges, as these scholarships are not applicable in a sorority house.



### What to Bring for Rush

When you are packing your suitcase for rush week remember that an abundance of clothes is not necessary. You will not have access to your trunks at this time; therefore, bring what you will need for the week. Too many clothes will merely be a bother to you, so select your wardrobe carefully. Interchangeable skirts, sweaters, and jackets are good for casual functions. The weather during rush week is often very warm so you may need a few cotton dresses. A completely new outfit for each party is a needless expense.

There are three dress functions during the week. Suits, afternoon dresses, and heels are appropriate for the parties on Sunday and Tuesday. For calling hours on these days, you will need a hat. For the final

luncheon and dinner on Thursday you will want to wear something a little dressier than the other two days; perhaps a dark color.

The rest of the functions during the week will be casual. It might be wise to bring a rain coat and scarf to be prepared for the Pullman fall rains; for lounging in the dorm, pedal pushers might come in handy. If you have an iron, it might be to your convenience to bring it; however, there will be irons in the dorm.

Our campus stresses simplicity and comfort in clothes. The main thing to remember is to be neat and not to overdress. You know that you are more at ease when you are wearing comfortable clothes in which you feel well-dressed, and you will want everything to add to your naturalness during rush week.

### Important Things to Remember

In order that Rush Week may be a pleasant and happy experience and run smoothly it is necessary that certain procedures be followed. These **Final Instructions** are for your information and benefit.

#### PANHELLENIC COUNCIL

Rush Week is under the direction and supervision of Panhellenic Council which is the governing body for all sororities on the campus and formulates the rush policies for them. It is composed of the President and one other member from each of the sororities. During Rush Week the Panhellenic officers and representatives (Panhellenic Counselors) will live with you in the dorms.

#### PANHELLENIC COUNSELOR

There will be a Panhellenic Counselor nearby at all times to answer your questions and help you with any problems that may arise. Feel free to go to her on any occasion.

It is the desire of Panhellenic Council that each rushee have the opportunity to visit all sorority houses and to have the sorority girls meet the rushees. It is most important that each rushee make her own decision regarding her choice of sorority. For this reason, certain rules are placed upon rushees in order to free them from outside pressures and influences.

#### HOUSEMOTHER

In each residence hall there is a housemother. She will be glad to talk to you and to help you.

#### ARRIVAL TIME

Friday, Sept. 5, 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Special permission for late arrival must be secured from Mrs. Hilmer Axling, Panhellenic Exec. Sec., 410 Dilke St., Pullman, Wash.

#### FIRST MEETING

A picnic Friday, Sept. 5, 5:00 p.m. followed by a convocation.

#### DPEN HOUSE

During open house, Panhellenic Counselors take small groups of rushees to each sorority house. No invitations are needed. It is very important that you be there since it is the first opportunity for you to meet the sorority girls and for them to meet you. It is NECESSARY to attend the scheduled open house in order to receive invitations for the rest of the week.

#### VISITORS

Rushees shall have no visitors or contacts with any one except at scheduled rush functions and with sisters who are not members of sororities or parents.

#### DATING

There is NO dating during Rush Week. If a rushee has a date she will be **Dropped From Rush.** 

#### TELEPHONE CALLS

Rushees shall receive no telephone calls except long distance calls.

It is suggested that you inform your parents as to the rules about telephone calls and visitors. The Council recommends that if your parents bring you to Pullman that they not remain for Rush Week or try to direct your decision by long distance calls.

#### **BEDDING & LINEN**

This is provided during Rush Week. However, you must plan to provide your own bedding and linen if you pledge a house; otherwise it will be provided in the residence halls throughout the year by the College. Towels are not provided.





### **Rush Registration Instructions**

The rush registration card and fee must be in the Panhellenic office by **AUGUST 15**, in order to participate in fall rush.

Freshmen women to be eligible to go through rush must have a 2.3 accumulative grade point average from high school. A girl with previous college work to participate in rush must have a 2.3 accumulative grade point average with no incompletes from WSC or her previous college and must have been enrolled in 12 hours of class work in the previous college semester.

A girl should enter Rush Week with the intent of pledging. No girl awarded a **room scholarship** from the College should go through rush unless she is willing to forego the use of her scholarship.

Fill out the enclosed registration card (no nicknames, please) and return it with a check for \$5.00, payable to Panhellenic Council, addressed to WSC Panhellenic Council, Student Activities Center, Pullman, Washington. This fee is good for one calendar year.

Your Rush registration cannot be completed until you have made application for a room in the college dormitory and your \$25.00 dormitory deposit has been paid to College Food and Housing. The \$25.00 deposit will be refunded by the college if you pledge a sorority. Remember that this deposit must also be paid by **August 15.** YOUR RUSH REGISTRATION IS NOT COMPLETED UNTIL THIS DEPOSIT IS PAID!

Room assignments for Rush Week will be made on Friday, September 5, starting at 9 a.m. at Davis Hall. Room assignments are made alphabetically.

The board and room bill for Rush Week is \$20.00 payable when you arrive for rush September 5. Checks for this amount are made payable to WSC Food and Housing.
