At first, when the question was raised, years ago, we gave our consent. We realized a benefit thru in the way of mills, agricultural implements & in various ways. But suddenly that stopped.

The younger Indians pressed us to find out the reason, so we called a council but the Agent got angry & gave us no satisfaction.

It stood so until we consulted Maj Dickson who told us that the money had been paid over to the govt.

Now we have called this council & want to see what can be done in the way of mill &c.

Mr. Dickson Allen & Empie had a talk, and Allen afterwards offered to put up saw mill &c.

I told Allen we would know how to answer you when we find just how much money is to our credit in Washington.

When we had council in early Spring I promised & did write the Dept what you said, & the reply came recently that you had money there sufficient to build a new saw & repair old grist mill or both new & then told me to make estimate of cost of both saw & grist mill

There being so many ideas as to what kind of saw mill we wanted I submitted three estimates one for portable saw mill one for steam saw mill & 1 for grist mill - My preference was for Portable saw mill - Have rec'd no reply from Wash as to what kind they would build -

Per my estimates the mills would cost from 5000.00 to 7000.00 We can do nothing now but wait till we hear from Washington - If they should decide to send us a portable mill the first we may know will be the mill landed here -

I do not know the reason for the delay - Now what do you say about purchasing stock -

I may have to write to Wash - No one can come on with stock without consent of the Indians The Agent & the Department

Muchawke

We have before this understood that there were different funds & we then could understand all about these funds - Since you have spoken it has awakened within me some of my old feeling, I feel that we have a friend - & we will again understand things again

Agent

- Explained to Muchawke & others the difference in some of the old customs & the new.

Eneas -

We once agreed to let cattle graze but afterwards changed our minds & turned off the cattle, and

caused The Agent considerable Trouble -

Ⓔ We could not see what became of the pasturage money, and never had an agent who could or would explain to our satisfaction -

Agent -

If pasturage money is paid to me, I cannot hold it here for the disposal of the Indian, but send it to Washington there to be disposed of by the Department - I cannot promise how -

Eneas

Have patience with us Agent - There are a number of young men sitting around & we want to consider this matter, as it is one of importance to us -

(A number of Indians speak in their own language, consuming considerable time)

Tenwasha

I understood some bastons were on Range looking for cattle - found them & forbid them & told them if they wanted to round up let every body know - they said we dont care what you say nor do we mind moose who has a paper - I told them they should go back to where they came from - They were Snipes men I have seen snipes men rough.

I sent 2 boys up to report - one old man said he came to you - You sent letter to them - I sent the paper to where they were gathering cattle - They said they cared nothing for the Agents orders - They had taken it slick ears - We asked you Indians to come - They divided a beef after killing it with the Indians

Agent - The Snipes Cattle were on when I came
& we intend to collect from them -

We would have had them off before but
as they promised to pay liberally & it was
so late I thought - I would write the Dept
After the 1st July they will have to leave -

Do you know of other cattle on range -
Ans - Yes I see lots of cattle of different
brands - They are white men's -

Agent - I will start Police to take every thing
about 1st July & will seize the stock & make
owners pay -

One reason why we were lenient with S. & A.
they had bit so many cattle off the Dept & it
was hard to keep them off - We will keep
them off tho' finally -

(Other Indian speeches -)

Tom Simpson - Have been in service a long time - Have put
off great many sheep - would take our band
for penalty but another would come in its
stead - Finally Gen Milroy decided to let them
graze here then I had less work - but we finally had
to prohibit them entirely

Agent - After we start any man who tries to cross
the Rio without authority should be ordered
off & if he does not go arrested & brot to me
I think any Indian has a right to demand

a mans authority & if he has none then he
has the right to make him go off-

Every body has a right - to drive stock
on main thoroughfare if they do not delay
on road - Have given some this permission
tho' they did not need permission written -

now as we have decided to prohibit cattle
& all stock from grazing on the Res.
I want to make arrangements to get pay
from Snipes & Allen before they go - no one
else has a great money - we get ready
we want every body to help drive stock off
& tell them their stock cant come again
& if they do seize the stock or owner -

Some may complain ~~to~~ when we take
some stock out side but you have as much
right on outside public land as anyone.

He will go at this matter quietly & do
not want to have trouble -

After we get them off I do not
think we will have much trouble -

It is your right - to keep these stock off
& this right - will be protected -

I have a matter for your consideration
which was referred to Gen Milroy who
failed to call a council to consider it -
It is a claim of Mrs. A. Billion of
Portland, Oregon -

I call your attention to it because
ordered to do in accordance with the
law in such cases. It is a claim
that a woman named Mrs. Billion
she makes a claim against Govt
for damage done her property in 1856
1856 - This was a long time ago
I am ordered to present the claim
& hear what you have got to say
about it -

The nature of the claim is
for cows & household furniture
alleged to have been destroyed in 1856
26 27 & 28 March - It all amount
to \$1138.⁵⁰ - This damage was claimed
& have been caused by Yakama &
Klickitat - before this woman can
get her claim from Govt

It is necessary to fill forms
of law - ^{and} ~~to~~ make this demand

Do not want to dictate or indicate
what you shall say ~~to~~ but want your
reply. Is there one present who
acknowledges knowing anything about it?
(No Indian remembered the circumstance ~~nor~~ knew
anything about it) - No one at the Council
had any knowledge of the damage claimed
to be sustained by E. A. Bellion at the time
mentioned ~~nor~~ at any other time - and denied
or refused the claim -
