

















Here are scenes where the flood which swept through Visalia, broke through the levee at Miller's bridge, northeast of Visalia. Upper left to right: a flood victim, the carcass of a cow, one of four within a 100-yard radius lies partially buried in mud and silt below one of the levee breaks while men work to repair the levee in the background. Right: heavy road equipment working on center break. Center

row: widest break, just east of Miller's bridge. Height of levee can be seen. Right: area up the river a short distance where second break occurred. Lower pictures, left: the levee on the north bank of the St. John's, (North Levee district) which stretches for miles, unbroken, up and down the north bank of the river. Right: break west of Miller's bridge, closest to Visalia.—Times-Delta News Photos.
