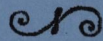

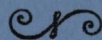

THE 1954 NATIONAL AND SCHOOL AWARDS

Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge: (1) Accumulates each year outstanding expressions, projects, and programs from throughout the nation which build an understanding of the American Way of Life; (2) Selects by non-partisan independent awards jury the effective, useful and inspiring works of individuals, organizations and schools; (3) Spotlights the affirmative useful works of award recipients; and (4) Distributes and publishes these expressions and programs, providing more and heavier ammunition in the struggle of free men for their personal liberty and dignity against every totalitarian compulsive tyrannical force.

Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge is independent, non-profit, and affiliated with no sectarian religious group or political party. It may not lobby. It may not create any materials of its own. It expresses no viewpoint on any issue. Its officials do not select awards recipients. Its funds come from widest national sources, individual, corporate and foundation. No one source may contribute in excess of five per cent of the annual budget. Any American may become a member by subscribing financial support. It is tax exempt by ruling of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

The awardees listed in the following pages were selected by the distinguished awards jury for their outstanding work for freedom, from multi-thousands of nominations submitted by the general public for evaluation.

The cash awards are "Freedom Seed Money Awards". Recipients are encouraged to find ways of applying their awards cash in new and creative ways which further a better understanding of this land of God and freedom.
