The sad information has been conveyed to us that
John A. Parker one of our members died at his home on the 17th
day of October 1913. He was born on the 16th day of April,
1857 in Fountain County, Illinois, and in the year 1883 moved
to the City of Tacoma, where he has been eversince said time,
in the active practice of law. and

WHEREAS, the ancient and honored custom permits us after such an event, to assemble and pay a tribute of respect to one of our profession who is worthy and deserving and if we wish, to seal the record of his professional life and career with a signa of our admiration and respect,
