Always sign your full name. Give your postoffice, county and state, and your shipping point, if different from your postoffice.

Always give catalogue number in full and also the names of the seeds wanted.

Please do not send us an order for less than 50 cents. Should your order for seeds amount to less than 50 cents, please select one or more needed articles from our large general catalogue, so that the order will amount to 50 cents or more.

CASH SHOULD ALWAYS ACCOMPANY ORDER. Remit by postoffice money order, express money order, bank draft or cash. We recommend postoffice or express money orders, because they are inexpensive, less trouble and safe. Besides this, if a money order should be lost or miscarry, your loss will be made good.

To insure safety, always register a letter containing money. Be sure to state in your order plainly how much cash you enclose and in what form. You need not be afraid of sending too much, as we always refund balance when too much is sent.

When ordering seeds by the package to go by mail, be sure to always enclose enough to pay postage. When you order seeds by the ounce packet, enclose 1 cent for each ounce packet, and for ordinary packets, enclose 5 cents for every 10 packets ordered. If seeds by the pound, pint or quart are desired by mail, 8 cents per pint and pound and 15 cents per quart additional must be sent to pay postage. Seeds by the peck and bushel, field seeds, implements and other heavy goods are sent by freight or express at customer's expense. Please order early.

OUR NURSERY STOCK is handled entirely separate from our seed department. If you should receive goods from one department, but not from the other, please wait a few days before writing us. Always write your seed order on a separate sheet from your nursery order.

QUANTITY OF SEEDS IN PACKET. No less quantity than a packet can be sold. In companing our prices with those of other seed men you will readily see how reasonable our prices are for liberally filled packets of the best seeds that grow.

REDUCED EXPRESS RATES. All express lines in the United States are in the traffic agreement; seeds and plants are now carried at a reduced rate of 20 per cent less than merchandise rates.

GRASS SEED MIXTURES FOR MEADOW AND PASTURE.

For every different kind and condition of soil there is a large number of grasses, either indigenous or introduced, which are especially suitable. Some sorts do best on high ground and in dry weather, others prefer plenty of moisture. Some mature so early, and others so late, that from the beginning of spring until winter sets in, there is no time when one species or another is not at its best. Successful farmers recommend heavy seeding. The quantity that should be sown per acre depends upon the location and nature of the soil. There is a wide difference of opinion on this subject and the actual quantity of seed necessary should be determined by some one conversant with the local situation. A good authority recommends the following formulas for the different classes of soils;

Sow one ounce for sixty feet of drill. Sow in March or April, in rows one foot apart. When two years old transplant into permanent beds, which should be well and deeply manured and trenched to the depth of two feet. Set the plants (in rows) from three to four feet apart, and two feet in the rows, spreading out the roots, and covering them from six to eight inches. On the approach of winter cover with manure or compost; fork the beds early in the spring and apply a dressing of salt. Cut for use the second year after planting in permanent bed.



We exercise exceptional care in selecting our cabbage seed. Not only are the plants grown from the best stock, but they are also inspected carefully before being put away for the winter. We can assure our customers that it is impossible to get better seed.

For the earliest supply, seed may be sown in September and the plants wintered in cold frames, or seed started in hot beds or cold frames early in the spring. For the fall crop the seed should be sown early in June, and the young plants transplanted to the rows during the latter part of July. One ounce of seed will sow 300 feet of drill; two ounces sown thinly should provide plants enough for one acre.

General Cultural Directions.

Most of the varieties thrive best on rich, sandy soil, which should be carefully prepared and well cultivated, as the young plants are for the most part delicate and easily choked out by weeds. Sow as early as the ground can be made ready, in drills 16 to 18 inches apart, taking pains that the soil is fine and pressed firmly over the seed; or they may be planted as a second crop, the seeds sown in beds in April, and the plants set out in June. Most of them should be cut when in bloom, wilted in the sun and thoroughly dried in the shade.

RHUBARB

(PIE PLANT)

Rhubarb, familiarly known as Pie Plant, or Wine Plant, is cultivated in gardens for its leaf stalks, which are used for pies and tarts. Immense quantities are now annually sold in all the large markets. No private garden should be without it.

CULTURE. Rhubarb succeeds best in deep, somewhat retentive soil. The richer its condition and the deeper it is stirred the better. Sow in drills an inch deep, and thin out the plants to six inches apart. In the fall transplant the young plants into very highly manured and deeply stirred soil, setting them four to six feet apart each way, and give a dressing of coarse manure every spring. The stalks should not be plucked until the second year, and the plant never allowed to exhaust itself by running to seed. Our seed is saved from selected plants of the Linnaeus, Victoria, Giant and other improved sorts, but like the seeds of fruit trees, rhubarb seed cannot be relied upon to reproduce the same varieties.
