NNOUNCES the first of what it hopes may become a distinguished series of scholarly studies—Carl I. Wheat's monumental, five-volume work on *Mapping the Transmississippi West*, 1540-1861. The Institute deems itself singularly fortunate to be able to present, as its initial publication, this notable contribution by one of the West's better known writers on historical subjects, magnificently printed and handsomely illustrated. The first volume is now ready.

Designed by Edwin and Robert Grabhorn of San Francisco, and printed by the Grabhorn Press in an edition limited to one thousand copies, this opening volume contains a detailed discussion of the earliest attempts of European explorers and cartographers to picture, by means of maps, the vast and almost unbelievably complex region that has come to be known as the American West. The majestic sweep of these early achievements is here graphically recounted, beginning with Coronado's pioneer Spanish *entrada* in 1540, and continuing to the year 1804, when the Americans, Lewis and Clark, were poised for the take-off of their memorable expedition to the Pacific. In subsequent volumes the expansion of knowledge and understanding respecting this extraordinary area will be carried forward to the onset of the American Civil War, by which time reasonably accurate maps of large portions of the West were beginning to become available. A few maps subsequent to 1861 will be included in Volume 5.

In these studies the primary aim has been to avoid the production of a mere catalogue of what might seem to many a disorganized mass of unrelated documents. Instead, the author has consistently sought the basic correlation between the maps drawn or published over the more than three centuries in question and the plodding efforts of men of several nations to seek out, over the years, the mysteries of this remote region. No similar examination of the West's cartographic background has previously been undertaken, almost three hundred

maps being discussed and bibliographically considered in the opening volume of the series. Not only is a clear perception of historical developments and of the maps that illuminated them thus offered to both the casual reader and the cartographic enthusiast, but no less than fifty of these remarkable documents have been reproduced by a process that faithfully reflects their historic nature and their antique charm. Selected from the foremost collections and Archives of America and Europe, this array of reproductions brings together for visual inspection many important and little known documents not hitherto available as a group even to the specialists in this important field.

The extensive undertaking here announced is the result of almost a quarter century of research, and stems directly from the author's earlier examination of maps relating to the California Gold Rush (a book also produced by the Grabhorn Press, long out of print, and now a rare and much-sought-for item of *Californiana*). The present publication also represents an expansion of Mr. Wheat's preliminary discussion of Western mapping (likewise out of print and already difficult to obtain) published in 1954 by the American Antiquarian Society of Worcester, Massachusetts. That summary study contained no bibliocartography and dealt briefly with only about a fifth as many maps as are now to be discussed—though it was even then by far the

most extensive effort that had been undertaken to its date in this significant but strangely neglected area of Western history.

Carl I. Wheat has become well known for his numerous books and articles on Western historical subjects, especially those dealing with maps and mapping. A lawyer who has also written widely in the field of Administrative Law, he for years followed historical pursuits purely as an avocation, but of late has devoted more and more active attention to problems surrounding the cartographic background of the American West. The project here announced reflects many years of scholarly endeavor in this field, and amply discloses both the extent and scope of his researches into the widely scattered and hitherto imperfectly understood and uncorrelated documents now discussed in detail. This has been a pioneering and a time-consuming task, but we believe the result will be recognized as well worth waiting for.

Among Mr. Wheat's more notable historical contributions have been Maps of the California Gold Region, San Francisco, the Grabhorn Press, 1942; Books of the California Gold Rush, San Francisco, the Colt Press, 1949; Mapping the American West, 1540-1857—A Preliminary Study, Worcester, Massachusetts, The American Antiquarian Society, 1954, and (in collaboration with Dale L. Morgan) The Maps of Jedediah Smith, San Francisco, The California Historical Society, 1954. For several

years the editor of that Society's publications, he is also a Director of The Book Club of California, and a member of the official California State Historical Landmarks Advisory Committee, as well as of the Federal Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings and Monuments.

Each volume of this series will measure 10½ by 14½ inches, approximately the size of the author's earlier work on California Gold Region maps. The map reproductions are being executed in offset lithography by Charles R. Wood and Associates, of San Francisco, while the type in which the books are printed (the English Monotype Company's distinguished "Van Dijck," based on a Dutch type originally designed in 1640) has been set in its handsome 16-point size under Edwin Grabhorn's personal direction by the firm of Mackenzie & Harris, Inc., also of San Francisco, sole users of this typeface in the United States. The paper is Natural Wove Curtis Rag, identical with that of this Announcement, and the books will be sturdily and attractively bound, as befits their importance.

The price of the volume now announced is \$60.00 (net) per copy, and since the demand is already expected to exceed the edition, early orders (accompanied in all instances by payment in full) appear desirable. California residents should add 4% sales tax, and the enclosed

blank may be used, or orders may be placed through leading booksellers. The name of each purchaser of Volume One will be registered with the Institute in order to insure appropriate preference in obtaining subsequent volumes as they appear.

I would certainly like to have one of the Ulster County Gazettes. An original would be quite valuable, but I would hardly believe it unless it were in a file.
