Will be seeing you on the 25th, I hope. And thanks again for all you've done for us.





Dear Mr. Brown:

I have your inquiry regarding the Wanapum Indians. As the enclosed booklet will tell you, so far as we know the Wanapums never signed a treaty with the United States Government.

The F.P.C. License for the building of the Priest Rapids Project contained a provision that required the Grant County PUD to protect the Indian burial grounds and also provided for the removal of pictographs from P"na" Island and the setting up of these pictographs for monuments. These pictographs were selected by the late Puck Hyah Toot and one of them was placed on his grave and several others are in storage. It is possible that they will be placed on public display sometime after Priest Rapids Dam is completed.

So far as we know, this is the first government recognition of the Wanapums as a separate band.

The PUD recognized the inherent rights of the Indians at this site and on January 15, 1957 agreed to pay the Wanapums \$20,000.00 to be divided equally between Puck Hyah Toot, Frank Buck, Rex Buck, Harry Wynn and Bobby Tomalawash. (You will note there is some variation in the spelling of Harry's and Bobby's names from time to time, especially in the booklet.) Puck Hyah Toot asked that his share be divided between his two sons, Frank and Rex Buck. This money is being paid in annual installments of varying amounts from January 15, 1957 to January 15, 1962.

In addition, the PUD has repaired three homes on the west bank of the river which were formerly occupied by the original power plant operators and three of the Indian families are now living in them. The PUD also moved their longhouse to a site near the homes. The four surviving Indians also are employed on the Priest Rapids Project.

I suggest you write to Mr. Click Relander of the Yakima Republic, Yakima, Washington, whom I regard as the outstanding authority on Indian history in the Northwest, for any additional information. I also suggest you read Relander's book "Drummers and Dreamers" published by The Caxton Printers, Ltd. from Caldwell, Idaho, for a comprehensive history on the Northwest Indians.

Thank you for your interest in our Priest Rapids Project. If we can be of any further help to you, do not hesitate to call on us.



Dear Click:

I took your archeological folder over to Dr. Rutherford, but asked him to return it to me so I can send it back to you when he has looked it over. I didn't get to see Dr. Rutherford personally but he should be delighted to get the folder, as the picture of the artifact appears to be an exact duplicate of the one found by his office.

Enclosed is a tear sheet from the Grant County Journal with a fine compliment for you from the ladies of Martin Village. Incidentally, I understand the new owner of the Journal takes over October 16. His name hasn't been announced--but he's a publisher from the Middle West.

I'm sending you three general aerial views of Priest Rapids and two photos of the gates. There are 22 Tainter gates in the spillway, each 40 feet wide and 50 feet high. The spillway is designed to handle almost twice the biggest flood of record (1894) so there isn't much danger the dam will ever be washed away. I'm leaving for the dam soon and I'll dig through the files down there and see what other photos I can come up with. If I have any luck I'll send them along.

Your plans sound interesting and I believe you are on the right track.

Dear Mr. Strom:

No doubt you have received by now a letter from Professor Miller regarding my inquiry to him, concerning the dedication of the Priest Rapids Dam. I am after local back-ground color for a little story on the irony of the plight of the Winahpams.

When they came to him, unarmed and asked for advice," If, as you say, this (the land around Priest Rapids) is your birthplace and the home of your people since the footprints of the first man's embedded in rocks on the island in the rapids, let it be then the land of peace and you will never be harmed." (page 62 A.J.Splawn's Kamiakin)

That was probably in 1857, and now a century later the island in the rapids is submerged and gone form the sight of men forever. Where is it planned that the Winahpams shall live now? And what do they say about the loss of their home-site? Did they accept the march of progress and decide to find ha piness in its wake, where ever they may be?

I have long been interested in the religion of the Winahpams, and have wondered if they themselves, gave it the name -2 The Dreamers---or if the name was given it by the whites. Mr. Miller says you know a great deal about them I would be interested in knowing about the funeral he speaks of, and the speach that Lenora Buck gave. Could you give me a few details? I hesitate to ask so great a favor but feel compelled.

I do not know just how I will develope the material, but I hope to interest some magazine. I have thought of introducing a fictional character --perhaps an ancient woman of the tribe who remembers "the old days", in order to bring out the historical background---and thus get suspense by contrasting with present day behavior. I thought I might bring out Smohalla's resistance to civilization. Shawn qoutswm' My young men shall never work, for men who work cannot dream, and wisdom comes from dreams. We will not plow the ground, for we cannot tear up our Mother's breast. We will out no hay, for we dare not cut off our Mother's hair." I feel that Smohalla feared the day the white man would grow food, plow and reap---for on that day he would decide to stay forever and the Indians would lose all his resistance to work revealed his fears, which we the resistance to work revealed his fears, which we have the resistance to work revealed his fears, which we have the resistance to work revealed his fears, which we have the resistance to work revealed his fears.

I will have to be very skillful to keep my story free of critisism of the white race and the terrible fate they dealt to our Indians. We are ashamed of it now. Not many stories which reveal it outright are acceptable --- only those which are free of gudgment. But I can do that. If you can help me, clea se do.

Her version is that when a white person came down with smallpox he usually was isolated in a small cabin and after he recovered (or died) all his blankets, clothes, etc. were burned. However, occasionally a lone settler died and before the neighbors could return to the cabin and destroy his blankets the Indians stole them. That's her defense of the whites. (You oughta know by now you can't argue with your mother-in-law. Show this to yours, and see if she won't agree that you shouldn't.)

Anyway, thanks again for a very valuable and treasured addition to my small library.

I'll be gone April 15 through 19 to the Northwest Public Power meeting in Seattle. But if you folks are here on the weekend we will be glad to have you drop in. I've got some genuine old busthead Dago Red wine siphoned out of the "kag" by an Italian friend of mine in Cle Elum. My wife says its vinegar, so I could scare up something else.

Your story on Vantage is a beautiful piece of writing. Doggonit, Click, you give me an inferiority complex. When I read something of yours like that Vantage article --- colorful, graphic and smooth flowing, with one historic incident after another appearing dramatically out of the mists and then quietly fading away --- it makes me realize what a long apprentice-ship I have to serve before I can call myself a writer.

There are a lot of scribblers in the field --- as witness stories in SEP and other magazines --- but there are damn few writers. Your articles give me the same pleasant reaction I used to have when I read stories by Rupert Hughes. It was as if I were listening to music. Hughes (and Relander) can describe a man walking down the street in a manner to make the reader feel that HE is walking on a gritty pavement, shivering under the bite of the wind, wondering if he will be on time for his appointment, and conscious that his suit needs pressing. A. W. Sommerville, of years ago in the SEP, had the same gift with his railroad stories. You smelled the smoke and hot grease of the locomotive, felt the steel deck surge and sway under your feet and tasted the grit blowing in through the cab window. You weren't an observer in one of his stories --- you were there!



I shouldn't have started on this line of thinking, for I am apt to talk for hours. Anyway, congratulations again on a fine article. And thanks for the fine coverage your papers continue to give the Priest Rapids Project.


From a Vista Point on the hill just east of the dam you'll get a comprehensive view of the dam and part of the 38-mile-long reservoir.

Your proposal for renaming the Priest Rapids Reservoir with the name Lake Chia-Wana was discussed with out Board of Commissioners at their regular meeting on May 13th. The Board at this time is not prepared to support your proposed name, but would like to discuss it further and consult with others on this matter. By use, the names Priest Rapids Reservoir and Wanapum Lake have become common names in this area, but to our knowledge no official designation of these names has been made. It is my understanding that the Board on Geographic Names in the Department of the Interior does assume some responsibility for assigning names to such man-made reservoirs as these. We, therefore, believe that the names presently in popular use should be continued until agreement by all parties concerned can be reached. I would, therefore, suggest that your initial printing of brochures use the name Priest Rapids Reservoir rather than the name which you have proposed.

It may be of interest to you to know that other proposals for naming of these reservoirs have included Smowhala Lake, referring to the founder of the religion followed by the Wanapum Indians, and Splawn Lake, named after one of the prominent area ranchers along the Priest Rapids stretch of the river. I will attempt to keep this subject before our Board of Commissioners so that they might arrive at a conclusion regarding their desires for making these names permanent.


We would like very much your approval of naming the lake and any suggestions you may have for properly recording the name.
