Thank you for your interesting letter of July 21st.

There is no particular hurry about the kodachrome on the Lincoln painting, since we will not be needing it until sometime in December.

It is quite possible that we might be able to use some of the Quigley paintings in a layout. I would prefer, however, to reserve decision on that until I saw the material. We do not, as a rule, use paintings when photographs are available. That is by no means an ironclad rule, but is followed pretty generally.

Quigley has done a spirited piece of action for the cover of your book. It should definitely be eye-arresting.

Newspaper men around New York City usually devote themselves to reporting, writing and holding up bars. Your activities seem to be much more varied. Is that a personal idiosyncrasy, or do all Washington newspaper men go in for such diversified activities as sculpturing, etc.?

However, a reader came in with a book, "Portrait Life of Lincoln" published by the Patriot Publishing Co., of N.Y. in 1910. In it there is a foto of Lincoln taken in 1864 when he was seeking a new general of the armies.

The collected works of Abraham Lincoln, published by Rutgers University Press also has a foto of Lincoln made in 1863. These fotos bear a striking resemb-

lance to the painting we reproduced.

It might be interesting for your museum to make some comparisons and I would appreciate hearing from you as to whether they think the fotos may have been the source for the painting.
