Dear Chapin:

Thought I should drop a line concerning the Schon drawings, as I understand, unofficially, that the Yakimas are going ahead with plans for a Treaty Centennial publication (Booklet)

Either negatives or glossy prints would be satisfactory, whichever is the most convenient for your staff, and I suppose the customary fee of \$1 a copy negative or \$1 for an eight by ten glossy would be about right.

Not having a complete list of what Schon put out, or what was published in Steven's 2 vol edition, I don't know what is available.

I know we should have ones like:

Perhaps 1 Cayuse, a Umatilla or similar representatives from a few tribes in Eastern Washington.

If there are "unpublished" pictures on file, those not published in "Life of General Stevens" that deal with the council of Walla Walla,

or any additional ones of Yankimas or members of the Yakima Nation, we should have them by all means.

Then, there should be one good picture of Gen. Stevens himself.

It sounds like a big order, but perhaps by relying upon your judgment to be a little selective it will work out satisfactorily.

I don't know just how many we would use, perhaps half a dozen, but some others could be used in the newspaper. And be sure and specify what type of standard credit should be given for them.

I think I can always rake up a little money for such purchases for a worthy cause and that will be part of my contribution to the publication.

I'm dead tired tonight--hence the rambling letter, but I'll be ready to go again after one good night's sleep. Quite a bit of research on the Treaty, together with the second annual Fort Simcoe meeting etc. have temporarily slowed me down, remembering that my work at the office comes first.
