John Miller Murphy

Born Ft. Wayne, Ind., Nov. 3, 1839. Crossed the plains to Oregon, 1850. Attended the first school in Portland, winter of '50-'51. Learned the printer's trade in the office of Weekly Times, Portland, 1856. Moved to Olympia, 1860, and established the Washington Standard. In 1865 erected the building which has ever since been the home of this paper.

Was married in Portland, 1861, to Eliza A. McGuire, who died many years ago.

Washington Standard founded, owned and edited fifty years and never missed an issue.
