I do not know your situation as to a better discount, in view of hisregular orders of this book, but it may be that you will have so ething to suggest, especially after sufficient order credits are built up.

Later I will be traveling around and am sure some of the stores

I contactare in the same position, short of books but just don't get around to reordering.

I have bumped into that situation so often, that I have determined to keepmy contacts out. However, as you know, our weather has not indicated favorable travel conditions.

I mill give especial attention to Ellensburg, Vantage, Moses make, Ephrata, Spokane, etc. early this spring, and equal attention at Eeattle, Olympia etc. in that neck of the woods later.

I believe I told you that we took care of the books that the student book store at Pullman had on hand. These are moving ok in this area.

I am also contacting M-s. Bloom at Olympia. She is in a good position to move them right along, if she will. She was hard to get to stock them to begin with but I think by now she may have found they are moveable.

I will keep a close eye on Broad's situation here and be sure that he keeps a suitable stock on hand in keeping with various speeches etc.

The Yakima Library, where two copies are in circulation, has not yet been able to display the book with the new books for reservation. They have had a standing order of reservations for both booksup to now and for several weeks are ahead. It is exceeded only by "The Nun's Story" and "The Story of the FBI," and that is not always the case with a local city and a local book.
