Toledo, Penton County, Oregon, August 13, 1878

... The dreamers who have at times seemd to exercise considerable influence over the wildest of the Indians have about lost their power over them Comparatively few believe in their old medicine men and this class and their former chiefs are the poorest of the people now.

In fact, the Indians are fast putting away their old customs and adopting the customs of the whites. Very ittle hunting or fishing is done by them. ould the present policy be continued for a few years more and theagency furnished w th means necessary to keep the Indians at work and to properly instruct and educate the children, the Indian problem would be solved so far as the Indians of Siletz are concerned, they would be able to take care of themselves ... in relation to the transfer of the Indians of this reserve to the Grand honde Agency of which there has been so much said in and out of Congress would si ply ask if after expenditure of several thousand dollars to build mills for the benefit of the 1,085 Indians belonging here @ 600 mid 00 did just when the se m lls are completed and running in order, the Indians making every effort in their power to make progress for themselves would it be just to even ask them to remove to another country? For more than twenty years the government, through their agents, has been promising them secondflingd securit in their homes and during the same time their original reserve has melted away from a length of 600 120 miles by an average width of 18 miles, containing 1,382,000 acres to a length of 24 miles and an average w00 width of 15 miles containing 223,000 acres. Not more than 23,000 acres may be termed a gricultural land, the remainder being rugged mountains. They were promised when the gave up their original lands that they should be permanently located here and not until 1,860,000

acres of this reserve was taken away from them did Congress pass a law looking to the permanency of the reserve. When this law was passed and approved by the President it wash oped that the Indians were permanently secured in the possession of their lands. Now to remove them again would be simply legalized robbery.

in 1752 the Lenape chiefs sent to the British agent the interrogatory: "The English claim all on one side of the river, the French claim all on the other--where is the land of the Indians?" (Cancroft.)

In 1762 appeared a prophet among te Delawares at Tuscarawas, on the Muskingum, who preached a union of all the red tribes and a return to the old Indian life, which he declared to be the divine command as revealed to himself in a wonderful vision.

• the religious ferment produced by the exhortations of the Deleware prophet spread 0000 rapidly from trie to tribe until under the guidance of of the master mind of the celebrated chief, Pontiac, is took shape in a grand confederacy of all thenorthwestern tribes to oppose the further progress of the English....an idea afterward taken up and carried almost to successful accomplishment by the great Tecumtha. (called council accomplishment in April, 1763)

..the contest of savagery against civilization has but one ending and the scenes closes with the death of Pontiac, a broken-spirited wanderer, cut down at last by a hired assassin of his own race

40 years later and the cross of St George erected in the place of the

Lilies of rance, had been supplanted by t e flag of the young republic.

Laulewasikaw..arose among the Shawano as prophet in November, 1805 revealed re elation with Master of Life in Ohio..

..later changed na e to Tenskwatawa, the Open Poor..

by some means learned that an eclipse of the sun was to take place in the summer of 1806 ..as time drew near called scoffers and announced that on certain day he would prove to them his supernatural authority by causing the sun to become dark...fame spread, apostles began to carry his revelations to the remotest tribes.

••a religion which found adherents alike in the everglades of Florida and on the plains of the Saskatchewan must necessarily have undergone local modications...

Catlin found it spread to the Blackfeet thirty years later.among the prairie tribes.

With death of Tecumtha, the confederacy of the northwestern tribes fell to pieces and on the closing of the war of 1812 the government inaugurated a series of treaties, resulting within twenty years in the removal of almost every tribe beyond the Mississippi and the appropriation of their former country by the whites.

Kanakuk of the Kickapoo...1827. meetings held on Sunday..in 1831.

About 1852 or 53 appeared on Turkey River, Iowa a prophet known as Pa'theske, or Long Nose, a new dance, to perform at intervals for a whole ye r at end of time in spring take warpath against their enemy the Sioux and would reap rich havest of scalps...continued, then prophet announced that he had received new revelation forbidding expedition. He died few years later on visit wo wash with delegation of his tribe, looked upon as retribution.

prediction of destruction of world..cycle myths are general among Indians and primitive tribes. The Arapaho informed author that we are now living in the sixth cycle and that the final catastrophe will take place at the close of the seventh.

About 1870 anoter prophet among the POCCO Paiute in Nevada..

1869 to 70, about 60 miles from south of Virginia ity, Nevada his son not far from "alker Rive reservation..said his father's name was Tavibo or "hite Man ..used to have visions and was invulnerable.. doctrines he started, son developed and promulated into the present messiah religion.

He was visited by Indians from Oregon and 9000 Idaho..... and his teachings made their influence felt among the Bannock and Shoshoni as well as among allthe scattered bands of OP10 Paiute wto whom he continued to preach until his death a year or two later.

that earth would swallow up all and after three days Indians would be resurrected..white sperish..

in 1872 preacher among Paiute..on Walker Lake reserve, Nevada..

Waugh-zee-waugh-her ..went into trance to see great spirit..

;....various other prophets of more or less local celebri ty have arisen from time to time among the tribes and the resurrection of the dead and the return of the olden times have usually figured prominently in their prophecies..n In fact this idea has probably been the day-dream of every Indian medicine man since tew ite first landed in America. Most of these, however, havebeen unknown to famce, outside of their own narrow circles except where chance deliberate deliberate purpose has given a warlike meaning to their teachings and made them the subjects of official notice.
