As you know, the 1947 National Apple Week newspaper food page contest is now closed, and Marie Copeland of your paper has won first prize of \$500. Miss Copeland and your paper well deserve the prize and the honor that goes with it. It was the finest publicity effort I have ever seen or heard of.

I think you and Miss Copeland would both like to know about the comment made by one of the judges:

"The Yakima Daily Republic is, of course, in a class all by itself, a joy to see and to read for all its civic pride implications, its scope, imagination, skillful writing and editing, photography, even the type faces and all the other elements that go to make up a good newspaper job. A special apple edition, front page, signed articles, pictures that are truly terrific 8 column banner of women polishing gargantuan apples, Coath Eubank and Junior College eleven doing their stuff, apple head doll picture and story and more and more wonderful apple stuff.....780 inches, 14 pictures.... and 85 recipes. Your hunble judge doubts if any industry has ever remotely approached anything like it; hopes that copies were widely distributed and some put in enduring form for posterity.

"Marie Copeland's contribution to the ensemble is outstanding in every respect, pictorially, news-wise, recipe-wise, headline-wise, writing-wise. (Ask her if she wants to come to New York.) The apple industry, the state of Washington, the Pacific Northwest, the country are to be congratulated on having such a newspaper as the Yakima Daily Republic."

This letter is reaching you and will reach the Wenatchee Daily World at the same time. We hope that the two of you will do what you can to publicize the contest results.

The following are some vital statistics which you may want in connection with the contest:

All daily newspapers in the United States were invited to enter. Sixty-six newspapers submitted formal entries, but 80 papers sent in tear sheets showing use of the apple material which we had furnished them. Known publicity reached a total of $9\frac{1}{2}$ million readers. At regular space rates, the publicity was worth approximately \$25,000.

Attached is the list of winners, with the prizes won.

We have wired for the checks for the winners, and hope to have them in their hands before Christmas. Letters to all participating newspapers are going out from here tomorrow, but the checks have to be mailed from New York City.
