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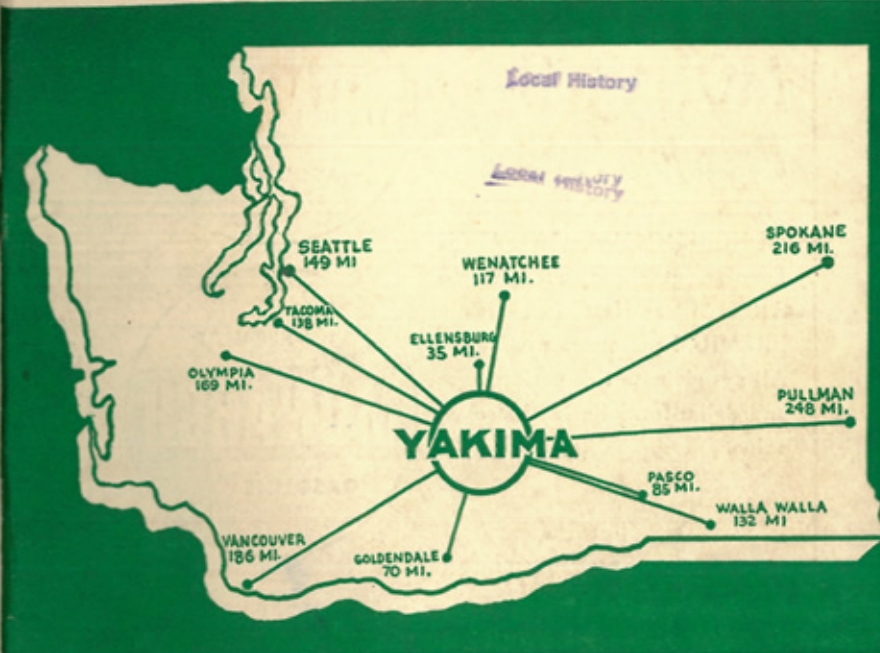

Concessionaires and commercial exhibitors will be entitled to one free ticket for every \$20 paid for such concession or exhibit.

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GENERAL INFORMATION, RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Board of Directors of the Central Washington Fair Association have endeavored to make this Fair truly representative of the agricultural interests of Central Washington, and in addition provide wholesome and varied entertainment for the patrons. The Board will welcome suggestions for improving the Fair. Make your plans to come to the Fair and pass a good word concerning it along to your neighbors. Plan to exhibit your products and get your neighbors to do the same.

2. The Central Washington Fair Association held its 7th fair in 1949. The generous patronage and good attendance enabled the Fair to show a substantial income; the profit will be used to make a better fair this year. The Board expects to be able to pay all premiums in full. However, since the Fair must be self-sustaining, the Board reserves the right to make whatever reduction in premiums is necessary in order to avoid a deficit.

3. Premiums will be paid insofar as possible on the grounds before the closing of the Fair. Otherwise they will be mailed as soon after the closing of the Fair as possible. Checks must be cashed within thirty days of the date of the check, otherwise they will be forfeited to the Fair.

4. Any person knowingly violating any of the rules of the Fair will thereby forfeit, and may be debarred from receiving, any premium that may be awarded him or her. Exhibitors should also note special rules at the head of each department.

5. No smoking permitted in the Fair buildings on account of fire regulations.

6. Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their own booths. Concessionaires or renters of booth space are required to keep their spaces neat and clean.

7. Food handlers must be dressed in a neat and clean manner. Food supplies must be pure and wholesome. Concessionaires must confine themselves to the space assigned.

8. Exhibitors will at all times give necessary and personal attention to their stock and at the close of the show must take entire charge of, and remove the same, promptly. Every exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by or arising from, any animal exhibited by him and shall indemnify the management against all legal or other proceedings, in regard thereto. The management will take every precaution in its power for the safe preservation of stock and articles on exhibit. The same shall, at all times be under the direct control of the management, but the show will in no case be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any such property while the same is on the grounds, or at any other time or place. If the property owners or others interested in property desire protection against loss or damage, or injury from fire or other cause, they must make their arrangements therefor. No officer or employee of the show has authority to suspend or change this rule.

9. Most of the people who come to the Fair do so in order to see the exhibits of superior livestock and the other products of the farm, the home and the factory. In order to offer an attractive and interesting Fair, exhibits must be kept in place until the closing day. The exact time at which displays may be removed may be obtained from each Department Superintendent. No article or animal may be removed before such time without special permission of the manager, and any article or animal removed without such permission will forfeit any premiums won.

10. The Fair Board has made every effort to make the rules and regulations definite and clear, but reserves the final and absolute right to interpret them as may become necessary, and to settle controversies arising out of, connected with or incident to the Fair.

11. Superintendents of Departments shall have authority over all matters within their respective departments, subject to the Board of Directors. Protests of Superintendents' decisions may be submitted to the Board whose decision will be final. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$5 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Manager within twenty-four hours after the cause of the protest.

12. Animals must be shown in such manner as the Judges may require or allow. Exhibitors refusing for any cause not meeting with the approval of the management to lead out their animals for parade or for competition in the show ring, or for students' judging contests, when called by the stewards, will not only forfeit all

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prizes previously won, but will be debarred from further participation in the show. They may be further required to remove their stock from the show grounds. In livestock parades only ribbons won at this exposition may be worn.

13. Judges must not award prizes to any unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the show that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. Judges are also required to discriminate against animals upon which a surgical operation has been performed to improve "show" appearance. This rule must be strictly adhered to.

14. Where there is no competition, or where there are fewer entries in a class than number of premiums offered, Judges may, in their discretion, award premium or premiums of such grade as the exhibit deserves. **No cash awards will be paid for champions unless there is competition.**

15. No exhibitor may receive more than two cash awards in any one lot.

16. In livestock classes, if ten or more animals are shown in a class, the 6th to 8th place winners will receive a premium equal to the fifth award. In poultry classes, except specials, where cash awards are offered, the premiums will be increased by 50% if ten or more entries compete in any one class or lot. In such cases the extra money will be awarded twenty per cent (20%) to each of the first five places.

17. The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases under their jurisdiction except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proven. In such cases, the authority of Department Superintendent shall be final, except as provided in Rule 11.

18. Should any animal or article awarded a prize be disqualified, the ones gaining the lower prizes shall graduate up into the higher positions next in order above them, if in the opinion of the Judge they are worthy of such prizes.

19. Every exhibitor of livestock must place in a conspicuous place over his exhibit his name and address and on each stall or pen information as follows: Breed and individual names of animals and their age and sex.

20. Animals exhibited either singly or in groups must be owned by exhibitor, entered in his name, and must have been owned by him for not less than 30 days prior to the opening of the Fair.

21. Temporary transfers or sales to make competition are barred.

22. Entries should not be made for championships or for special prizes. Eligible animals will be automatically entered by the clerks.

23. Entries for groups must be made, but the individual animals making up the groups need not be specified until shown.

24. An animal may compete in single classes and in all groups or specials to which it is eligible. Individual animals shown in all of the group and her classes must have been entered and shown in one of the classes for single animals.

25. The same animals may not compete in both junior (4-H or F. F. A.) and open classes.

26. Animals entered in the wrong classes may be reclassified by the superintendent, but exhibitors are not allowed to withdraw or change their entries after the opening of the Fair.

27. All animals entered in breeding classes must be registered in the respective association herdbooks, and registry papers must be provided for each animal upon request of the Superintendent of the Department, provided that registry papers will not be required for cattle or horses under six months of age unless required for breed association prizes. However, the registry names and numbers of sires and dams will be required.

28. Cows over 42 months of age and bulls over 36 months of age must show birth of living and calf within 12 months of date of show.

29. Entry fees—There will be no entry fee except for poultry. Stall and pen fees will be charged as follows:

(a) Horse box stalls.....	\$6
(b) Single tie stalls for horses.....	2
(c) Single tie stalls for cattle.....	1
(d) Swine per pen.....	1
(e) Sheep per pen.....	1

30. Exhibitors will be furnished first bedding free.

31. All entries must be made on official forms, a single copy of which is in-

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32. Entries for the livestock department must be in the Fair office by Saturday, September 23.

33. Unless otherwise specified, all animals entered must be on the grounds by 8 a. m. of the opening day of the Fair.

34. The manager reserves the right to accept, reject entirely, or accept conditionally any entry or application.

35. All exhibits will be held in place until Sunday evening, October 1, 8:00 p. m. unless granted special permission from the Department Superintendent and approved by the management.

36. Special Note—To the herdsmen in each department who keep their livestock exhibits most attractive, neat and clean during the fair, special prizes will be awarded as follows: 1st, \$5; 2nd, \$3; and 3rd, \$2.

(1) A veterinarian licensed to practice in the state of Washington shall be in attendance when animals are being entered for exhibition or sale, and shall make careful clinical examination of all classes of livestock and poultry to determine that they are healthy and free from all infectious or contagious diseases.

(2) All dairy and beef cattle over the age of six months must be tested for Bang's disease within thirty days of the date of the show or sale and found to be free as a result of a blood agglutination test in a recognized laboratory. Cattle which have been officially vaccinated between the ages of four and eight months with Strain 19 vaccine are exempt from the above provision and need not be tested until eighteen months has elapsed since the date of vaccination.

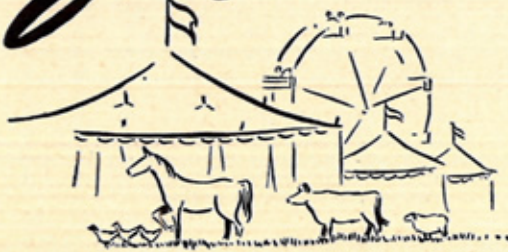

54. For the purpose of this exhibition the term cock and hen shall mean birds hatched before 1950; cockerel and pullet, birds hatched in 1950.

55. All birds must be plainly banded and band numbers plainly marked on the entry blank. Exhibitors not having leg bands on their birds can obtain the same from the department superintendent by enclosing with entry fees 5 cents per band for the number wanted.

56. Birds suffering from disease on arrival will be returned at once, and entry fees for the same shall be forfeited to the Fair.

57. Every precaution will be taken to properly protect exhibits in this department, and for this purpose experienced attendants will be on duty at all times during the Fair. The Fair, however, will not be responsible for losses or accidents to specimens while in the showroom.

58. Every effort will be made to assist exhibitors to make sales. Selling price must be stated on entry blank if sale is desired.

59. No exhibitor will be allowed to bring birds into the showroom to be offered for sale unless entry fees have been paid thereon. This rule is made in order to give every exhibitor from a distance the same opportunity as the home breeder.

60. The following rule shall govern for display premiums: In deciding display awards the number of points won shall be multiplied by the number of birds in the class. First, 6 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; fifth, 1 point. Trios—double. In order to be eligible for "best display," exhibitors must show not less than 1 entry in each of the following: Cock, cockerel, hen, pullet, trio.

61. Rule 15 does not apply to poultry.

62. The Central Washington Fair will offer cash awards and ribbons to all varieties of poultry recognized by the American Poultry Association, and to any other variety which, in the opinion of the Fair management, is worthy of recognition. (See also rules 13 and 16.)

DIVISION 2—VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITS

69. Vocational agricultural departments are invited to enter educational agricultural displays. Agricultural products shown should be representative of the crops and livestock grown in the area. They should be selected and arranged by the agriculture students under the supervision of the vocational agriculture instructor.

Entries will be scored by the judges according to the following scorecard:

Originality	100 points
Educational Value	200 points
Diversity of Products.....	100 points
Quality of Products.....	300 points
General Attractiveness.....	300 points

Please note the following explanation and suggestions.

Originality means the working out of a unique idea, suitable for use as a central theme around which the display may be built. Since an idea would not be unique or original if too closely defined or limited, the working out of such ideas is left entirely to the chapter concerned.

Educational value. The educational feature should show to the general public one or more things that F. F. A. and vocational agriculture mean or stands for, or does in our high schools or communities.

Diversity of products. The number of commodities necessary for full credit shall be weighed according to area. Judges will be furnished with lists of products agreed upon to qualify for full credit for each area. Products exhibited should include the main commercial crops and livestock of the area and particularly those raised by the students in their home supervised farming programs.

Quality of products refers to the character of the products shown. All produce should be of the best grade obtainable. Judges are specifically authorized and instructed to examine carefully all displays to ascertain their quality. Judging will be

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done early in the period of the Fair in order that all displays will be judged at their best.

General attractiveness refers to the general balance, arrangement of color and design, lighting effects and eye appeal. Of the 300 points allowed this item, 200 will be allotted to the main body of the exhibit and 100 to the background. Since the location of the booths is by lot, no points will be awarded for any attractiveness based solely on location.

For each F. F. A. exhibit scoring 600 points or more a prize of \$25.00 will be awarded. In addition the following prizes will be awarded:

1st.....\$25.00 and Ribbon 2nd.....\$20.00 and Ribbon 3rd.....\$15.00 and Ribbon
4th.....\$10.00 and Ribbon 5th.....\$ 5.00 and Ribbon

DIVISION 3—LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

70. Entries in livestock classes are open to purebred or high grade stock (except sires) owned and fitted by any Future Farmer of America. All entries are to be approved by the local agriculture instructor.

71. Entries must be in the office of the F. F. A. division, Central Washington Fair, by Saturday, September 23.

72. All Future Farmers as defined in the National Constitution shall be eligible to show animals in this division.

73. Animals must be the property of the boy under whose name they are entered.

75. Health regulations in this division shall be the same as for the cattle in other divisions. These regulations shall be strictly enforced.

76. A 6" x 8" card bearing the name of the animal, owner's name and address shall be placed over each stall by the owner.

77. Animals not properly fitted and trained for showing will be rejected.

78. All livestock must be in their pens or stalls by 10 p. m. the evening before the fair officially opens.

79. Base dates for computing ages of all cattle shall be January 1 and July 1. Base dates for swine shall be September 1 and March 1.

80. The award money will be divided according to point value. This point value to be determined after entries are accepted and judging done.

81. Entries accepted in this division cannot be entered in any other division.

82. No championship ribbons will be awarded without competition.

DIVISION I—DISPLAYS BY DISTRICTS AND REGULAR GRANGES

83. Open to all granges and communities in Central Washington. Displays will be judged according to general attractiveness and the manner and completeness with which they portray the district products.

84. The judges will score each display, with a perfect score of 1000, items to be judged being:

Diversity of Products shown.....	250 points
Quality of Products shown.....	300 points
General Attractiveness.....	250 points
Originality of Display.....	200 points

PLEASE NOTE the following explanation and suggestions:

Diversity of Products refers to the completeness with which the exhibit displays the various products grown by the members. It is desirable that the more important products in a district be given major importance and space in the exhibit, and minor products be given minor space. Products not raised upon the farm, if shown, are not to count in the calculation of points. Manufactured goods such as canned goods, malt from hops, lumber from trees, sugar from beets, sorghum from sorghum cane, butter and cheese from milk, and so forth, may be shown but are not to count toward any points under any item unless actually grown and processed by the farmer exhibiting such products in the grange area for which it is displayed. Purchasing of commercial products to fill out an exhibit is not permissible.

Each grange or district display should include as many of the following as are grown in the area covered by the exhibiting grange:

1. Forage crops—including individual plants and sheaf material for all kinds of forage crops. Sheaves should be not less than 3 inches in diameter at the butt.

2. Cereals & Grains—Threshed grain, 1 peck of each variety. Grain sheaves made up same as forage plant sheaves. Corn—any kind on cob, 10 ears, each variety.

3. Fruits—Tree fruits, small fruits and grapes. Quantities should be as indicated in Dept. J.

4. Vegetables and root crops—For beets, carrots, turnips, parsnips, etc.—6 specimens each variety. For potatoes and onions—1 tray or 12 specimens. Cabbage and cauliflower—1 specimen each variety. For melons, pumpkins, squash, mangels, sugar beets, egg plant—1 specimen each variety.

5. Livestock products—eggs 1 doz.—butter 1 lb.—wool, honey, cured meats, etc. Fresh milk generally sours on display and detracts from the exhibit.

6. General—Empty cartons and containers should not be used and this use will be counted against the exhibitor. The various kinds of products should be well-balanced in amount. Quality should be of the highest. Canned goods should be in uniform containers insofar as possible, of good variety and of highest quality.

Quality refers to the character of the products shown. All produce should be of the best grade obtainable. Judges are specifically authorized and instructed to examine carefully all displays to ascertain their quality. Judging will be done early in the period of the Fair in order that all displays may be judged at their best.

General Attractiveness refers to the general balance, arrangements of color and design, lighting effects and eye appeal. Since the location of booths is by lot, no points will be awarded for any attractiveness based solely upon location.

Originality of Display means the working out of a unique or unusual idea, suitable for use as a central theme around which the display may be built. Since an idea would not be unique or original if too closely defined or limited, the working out of such ideas is left entirely to the district concerned.

85. Competent judges will be appointed to judge the displays, and these judges will keep their score sheets separately and secretly and turn them in to the Manager's office for final computation. In case of tie, first and second money will be added together and split, etc.

Prizes will be as follows:

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For each Grange exhibit scoring 750 points or more a prize of \$50 will be awarded. In addition the following prizes will be awarded:
1st—\$50; 2nd—\$40; 3rd—\$30; 4th—\$20; 5th—\$10.

In addition to cash awards, suitable banners will be awarded the first five displays, and a special banner will be awarded the most artistic and attractive display. For information which may be helpful to exhibitors in this division, communicate with the manager.
