Dear Store Manager:

Not having heard from you about the forthcoming book, Drummers and Dreamers, I am writing and enclosing an advance order circular.

Of course, as I explained when through Chiloquin a few weeks ago, you as a dealer are entitled to 40 per cent off.

Moreover, if you found anyone interested in the Treaty Centennial booklet (selling price \$1) you could dispose of that copy and I would provide an additional copy with each order for Drummer and Dreamers.

From reaction throughout various regions, I am sure you would find a ready buyer for two or three copies of Drummers and Dreamers. And as I explained, these may be returned after one year, if in good condition, and under the usual 10 per cent discount of the publisher in that respect.

I do not know how long my small supply of the treaty booklets will hold out, having only a few now left.

I have asked Shorey's at Seattle, a big dealer, to "quote you" on the Indian relics book you inquired about. That puts you under no obligation. You can send for it if they quote. I asked them if it were not on hand to quote you when it shows. They would be sure to obtain a copy soon or should. They carry a stock of about half a million books I believe. I saw a salesman for the company who published it

and he told me he could obtain no ready copy of it, but that the company was considering re-publishing it. That would mean a year from now however. But it will eventually show and I shall keep my eye open on it.

I do hope you will feel clear in sending an order for Drummers and Dreamers. This will be acknowledged by the publisher after I send it on with other material, @@@

It just occurred to me, too, that if you wished to "discount" the basket hat you had for sale at \$15, I would send for it. I believe at the right price I could use it in a window display of certain artifacts I am getting up for Seattle when Drummers and Dreamers comes out.
