She has copies of the notes they exchanged to prove it! Mrs. Scott told us about a truly magnificent eollection of "Westward Ho!" -- a set of 48 pieces of this beautiful Early American pressed glass. This famous set portrays the westward movement with Indians, covered wagons, buffalo, deer and antelope racing through pastoral western scenery.

Mr. Hitchman, Dr. Carstensen and I met yesterday with the director of the University of Washington Press in Seattle to discuss ambitious plans for future publications. All we need is more money, more people, more time! But the plans are good.
