Below is a listing of the pictures and illustrative material on Fort Vancouver available from the National Archives, Washington 25, D.C.

111-SC-89554	Fort Vancouver, W. T., 1853-1855 (from an artwork) <u>probably the Sohon sketch</u>
111-SC-91451	Fort Vancouver, W. T., in 1845. (artwork) Shows buildings, gate, and Indians. <u>probably the Warre sketch</u>
111-SC-90804	Fort Vancouver, W. T., in 1833 (artwork) Fort with stockade around it, seen in distance. Indian tepees in foreground.
111-SC-89870	Sketch of Fort Vancouver in 1841 when it was a trading post of the Hudson Bay Company. <u>probably a sketch by a member of the Wilkes Expedition, perhaps Henry Eld</u>
111-SC-88073	Fort Vancouver, Washington Territory (first named Columbia Barracks) now called Vancouver Barracks. Seven sections to photo, showing quarters of clerks, depots, stables, etc.
111-SC-82606	Vancouver Barracks, Washington, 1888. Group of soldiers lined up in front of barracks.
111-SC-5508	Soldiers of Aviation Section raising the new pennant at the U.S. Government Spruce Mill dedication, Feb. 7, 1918, at Vancouver, Wash.
111-SC-5524	Government's Spruce Mill at Vancouver, Washington, Feb. 18, 1918. Railroad cars in foreground and mill in background.
111-SC-5518	View of interior of Spruce Mill, showing soldiers turning out spruce for airplane parts, Feb. 18, 1918.
111-SC-5511	Spruce timber arriving at spruce mill, Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 18, 1918. Unloading timber in front of cut-up mill.
111-SC-5510	Officials responsible for operation of mill, standing on timbers in yard. H.S. Mitchell, builder of mill, Maj. John B. Reardon (in charge of laborers), Lt. Henry Dickinson (in charge of technical work),

Lt. T. B. Lawrence (Adjutant), and Capt. O.P.M.
Goss (Asst. Gen. Mngr.)
