A lew dead have have These beads were sent over for Indian trade. The importing company went broke. In 1960 the building was razed, the decedents of the original company offered them for sale. As you may know there have been no imports from Commun-ist China for some years and it looks like it will continue that way for years to come. These are the same beads found in Indian mounds from California to Alaska brought here by fur traders years ago. This is what the editor of the monthly publication "THE INDIAN RELIC COLLECTOR" had to say about them, in the August 1963 issue. "TO ALL MY SUBSCRIBERS: I would like to call your attention abour the ad on the back page of the Indian Relic Collector about the hand rolled glass beads, Harts Antiques, Washington.
