ROAD BUYS IN CICERO FOR SWITCH TRACKS

Belt Line, by Three-Acre Purchase, Will Improve Its Freight Facilities.

FILES CONDEMNATION SUITS

Western Indiana Seeks Property on West Side for Track Elevation Purposes.

Three acres of land in Cicero, on West Twelfth street, near Central avenue, have been sold to the Western Indiana Belt Railway Company by the Grant Land Association, through Willard T. Block, treasurer, and Walter Mills, agent. The Belt Railway will improve this land with team tracks and also a freight warehouse to take care of carloads and less than carload freight in this section.

The Western Indiana Belt Railway Company has secured an option on three acres in the southwest quarter of section 21 of Cicero, near Twenty-second street, for the purpose of putting in other team tracks and freight warehouses. August Leuders has purchased from the land association four acres at the corner of Sixteenth street and South Fifty-second avenue which he will use for a plant to load and unload scrap iron by electricity. A number of other industries are considering the purchase of land in this new district, as the land association has built this past year one mile of switching track and has in contemplation the building of more tracks as soon as they are required.

STARTS CONDEMNATION SUITS.

Condemnation proceedings to secure possession of several pieces of property in South Forty-sixth avenue and between Jackson boulevard and Van Buren street and in West Harrison street have been started by the Chicago and Western Indiana Railroad. The railroad desires the property for track elevation projects before it goes ahead with plans for a large terminal station between Polk and Twelfth streets and Dearborn and State streets. The road has been buying up land for nearly two years in the downtown district and has secured practically all that is necessary for the terminal itself, and it is now acquiring the property in several connecting links in some of the outlying districts. The land which it is sought to condemn in the present proceedings is on the outskirts of the city and comprises the frontage in several blocks. The road has already purchased a large amount in the same locality. Among the parties named in the bill which was filed in the Circuit Court are the City of Chicago, Charles R. Kappes and Bartholomae & Roessing Brewing Company.

BIG SHOW NEXT WEEK IN 500 LOOP STORES

Industrial Exhibit Planned to Demonstrate Supremacy of Chicago's Markets.

WILL FORM VAST BAZAAR

Elaborate Displays Promised to Afford Liberal Education in Industrial Energies.

On Monday morning of next week Chicago's big industrial exhibition will be viewed by the public. The exhibition will be miles long for it will be displayed in the five hundred show windows of eighty leading retail shops in the loop district. It will be absolutely free and anyone who chooses can learn anything he cares to know about it by inquiring of the proprietor of the shops.

Chicago market week is designed to teach Chicagoans and others something of the reason for Chicago's supremacy in the markets of the country. It is to be a display of various sorts of merchandise, either manufactured or controlled, as to its sale in this city. Chicago wants the merchants of the central, western and southern states to realize that it is the greatest manufacturing center in the country, and market week is intended to make the matter apparent.

The big industrial show is the outcome of patient and diplomatic work on the part of the market co-operation committee of the Chicago Association of Commerce headed by Hugo Du Brock, of the firm of Hugo Du Brock & Co. It has resulted, so far, in bringing the merchant and the manufacturer much nearer together, so much so indeed that the retail merchants have agreed to turn over their show windows to the manufacturers for a week.

AN ENORMOUS BAZAAR.

In these windows—500 of them—will be displayed all manner of objects manufactured in this city, hats, shoes, paints, wooden ware, nails, clothing, shirts—in a word all of the things which go to make up civilized living. The whole will constitute an enormous bazaar such as Chicago has never seen before and it will constitute a liberal education in the manifold industrial energies of the city.

Handsome posters in the shop windows will inform the passerby that the goods on display were either manufactured here or are being sold exclusively in this market. Some of the window decorations will be quite elaborate.

The idea of the association of commerce in supporting the exhibition was that it could so foster a closer relation between the Chicago producer and the Chicago retailer. The heads of the association believed that much general ignorance exists among Chicagoans as well as among those dwelling outside as to the amount of merchandise manufactured here, and they desired to encourage a campaign of education on as large a scale as possible.
