"TO THE PEOPLE OF THE GREAT WEST:

Jefferson gave you the country.

Lewis and Clark showed you the way.

The rest is your own course of empire.

Honor the statesman who foresaw your West.

Honor the brave men who first saw your West.

May the memory of their glorious achievement

be your precious heritage." —Elliott Coues.

These words of Elliott Coues' dedication in his History of Lewis and Clark should set the tone and suggest the pattern for the Sesquicentennial celebrations throughout the Northwest. The event provides an occasion for clubs and organizations of all types to honor the vision of Jefferson and the courage of the explorers, and to become better acquainted with their own area and its historical background.

Various aspects of the epoch-making expedition and its far-reaching results may be used as a theme for a single or a series of club programs. For example, consider Jefferson's instructions to Lewis in which he emphasized that the explorers:

Record daily weather conditions;
Make careful notes of the flora and fauna of the area;
Note the language, occupations, food, trade, laws, diseases,
morals, and customs of the natives;
Record the "soil and face of the country"; and
Explore the upper reaches of the Missouri and other rivers with
a view to locating the most direct route to the Pacific Ocean.

Programs may be varied and distinctive if use is made of material available in local libraries or borrowed through the wide-spread interlibrary loan system. Below are some suggestions for subjects for talks, book reviews, or travelogues:

Before Lewis and Clark: Mr. Jefferson's dream. Adventurer extraordinary, John Ledyard. Jefferson and the Louisiana Purchase. Highlights along the Lewis and Clark trail: Then and Now. Mr. Jefferson's instructions to the explorers. What kind of journals did Lewis and Clark keep? Who cares about the Lewis and Clark journals? What Lewis and Clark inaugurated. The Indians as seen by Lewis and Clark. First geographers of the Great Northwest. "Rain again today;" Lewis and Clark record the weather. Winter on the shores of the Pacific, 1805-06. Lewis and Clark contributions to the study of natural history. Lewis and Clark country. Sacajawea, Indian guide to the white man. Lewis and Clark camped here: (Lewiston, Wallula, Seaside, Clatsop, From these historic beginnings. Following the Lewis and Clark trail along the Columbia. "Lewis and Clark: Linguistic pioneers." Historical perspective: Our debt to Lewis and Clark.

Program chairmen may develop one or more of these themes by making use of talent within their own groups or by joining with others in the community to produce or sponsor one or more of the following:

Radio and television programs.

Historical art displays through one of the

Historical art displays through one of the local or state historical societies.

Plays or pageants (with or without school cooperation, or use of members of Boy or Girl Scout troops or Camp Fire Girls).

Exhibits of films showing geography, natural history, Indian life, or current industrial development of the Lewis and Clark country.

Visits to historical museums.

Speakers who are authorities in Northwest history or related fields.

Contests or art projects, in cooperation with the schools, relating to the Lewis and Clark expedition.

Purchase of books for the local library which the librarian may feel would enrich the Northwest history collection.

Community-wide celebration of the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial.

Bibliography

This bibliography is meant to be neither exhaustive nor elementary. Some of the items listed are out of print, some are of minor interest, even of questionable value, others are too scholarly for most purposes, but the list has been compiled with consideration for the limitations of small libraries, the variety of the larger collections, and the wide range of interests of the organizations which may plan Lewis and Clark programs.

The Journals are the basic source material for most of what we know of the expedition. They have been published in numerous editions, only a few of which are noted here. Many libraries in the region may own one or more volumes or editions of these or other unusual source material; if not, it may be of interest just to know that they exist.

SOME MATERIAL TO BE CONSIDERED FOR PUBLICATION

BY THE WASHINGTON STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

COLLECTED PAPERS OF DR. CEYLON S. KINGSTON

Dr. Kingston was professor of history at Eastern Washington College. Soon after his death, an effort was made to publish a memorial volume of his papers on Pacific Northwest history. Because of lack of cooperation from the College Alumni, this project was not completed. The papers are scholarly and in most instances were printed in quarterlies with limited circulation or in newspapers.

LETTERS OF EDWARD J. ALLEN, 1852-1853

Allen was a man of many interests: surveyor, roadbuilder, artist, author and a member of the Monticello Convention. In 1852 and 1853, he wrote a series of letters on this region that were published in the <u>Pittsburgh Dispatch</u>. These have been collected by Blanche Billings Mahlberg, Bellingham, whose article on Allen was published in the October 1953 issue of Pacific Northwest Quarterly.

"CAPTAIN GEORGE VANCOUVER," REAR ADMIRAL BERN ANDERSON

Recently Admiral Anderson received the degree of Ph.D. from Harvard. His thesis -- a biography of George Vancouver -- gives an excellent description of the state of the British Navy at the time of Vancouver's work, and a detailed account of Vancouver's explorations. Admiral Anderson used a large amount of unpublished material in the preparation of this study.

PRELIMINARY SURVEY OF THE HISTORY AND STRUCTURE OF FORT VANCOUVER," DR. JOHN A. HUSSEY

Dr. Hussey is Regional Historian for the National Park Service. This study was issued several years ago in a mimeographed edition of some 50 copies: a book of 235 pages and 29 plates. It is of definite value to students of Northwest history, the fur trade and early commerce in this region.

"REMARKS ON BOARD THE SHIP VANCOUVER, 1804-1806," EBENEZER CLINTON

The <u>Vancouver</u> was sent to the Northwest Coast to meet Lewis and Clark, with orders from <u>Jefferson</u> to bring at least part of the company back to the East Coast. Clinton's account of the voyage is in Yale Library's Western Americana Collection (item 92, Withington Catalogue).

LETTERS OF GEORGE SUCKLEY

Suckley was naturalist of the Stevens Railroad Survey Expedition. His letters are in Yale Library's Western Americana Collection (item 461, Withington Catalogue). They describe the organization of the expedition and the transcontinental journey of 1853; life and adventures on the coast, 1854-1856; Indian Wars of the Northwest, 1854-1858; and Suckley's controversy with Stevens regarding the publication of the railroad reports.

HENRY BRIDGMAN BREWER LETTERS

The collection of unpublished material recently acquired by the Society. Brewer was a member of the Methodist Mission in Oregon Territory and for several years was in charge of the station at The Dalles. Of great interest, but would require a good deal of editorial work to prepare for publication.

LETTERS FROM THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST, 1853-1858, DAVID AND CATHERINE P. BLAINE

Blaine was minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Seattle, from 1853 to 1856. After the Indian troubles, the Blaines moved to Oregon City. Their letters present an excellent picture of Seattle and the Pacific Northwest, with intimate details of life in a frontier settlement. Copies are in the collections of University of Washington Library, Seattle Historical Society and Yale Library (item 34, Withington Catalogue).

JOURNALS KEPT ABOARD U. S. SLOOP OF WAR PEACOCK, GEORGE FOSTER EMMONS

Emmons was acting lieutenant aboard the <u>Peacock</u> during her cruise with the Wilkes Expedition. He was a competent artist and his sketches of this region are of particular value. His account of the Expedition's visit to the Pacific Northwest would make an interesting volume. Emmons' papers are in Yale Library's Western Americana Collection (items 166-169, Withington Catalogue).

THE CORRESPONDENCE, JOURNALS AND PAPERS OF ELWOOD EVANS

The Winlock Miller, Jr. Collection of Elwood Evans' papers at Yale Library is a vast lot of material on early days in Washington. Because Evans was the region's foremost pioneer historian and one of the founders of the Society, it would be fitting to publish some of his papers. The principal problem would be to screen the collection and select the items of most interest and value.

JOURNAL OF THE VOYAGE OF H.M.S. DISCOVERY AND CHATHAM, 1791-1793, THOMAS MANBY

Manby sailed with Vancouver as mate on the <u>Discovery</u> and served later as master of the <u>Chatham</u>. The journal is in Yale Library's Western Americana Collection (item 325, Withington Catalogue). A copy of the log of the <u>Chatham</u>, 1792-1794, is in the British Columbia Provincial Archives.

LOG OF THE BRIGANTINE HOPE FROM BOSTON TO THE NORTHWEST COAST, JOSEPH INGRAHAM

The original is in the Library of Congress; a photostat copy is in the University of Washington Library. A brief account of the voyage, edited by Judge F. W. Howay, was published in the Washington Historical Quarterly, January 1920.

NARRATIVE OF AN OVERLAND JOURNEY TO FORT VANCOUVER AND LAPWAI IN 1836, HENRY HARMON SPALDING

A typewritten copy of this account (107 pp.) is in Yale Library's Western Americana Collection (item 436), Withington Catalogue). Apparently it was prepared for publication and would require a minimum of editing.
