At Library**

At the regular monthly meeting of the American Association of University Women Saturday afternoon, that group voted unanimously to go on record favoring the continuance of the present organization of the Yakima Valley Regional Library.

Mrs. Sylvia Murray, president, conducted this general meeting opening the year's activities. Committee chairmen and study group chairmen summarized their programs for the coming year in order to acquaint those present with the work of the Association.

Mrs. Lambert Beholt, chairman of the fellowship committee, announced that the Grace Barret Robertson, international study grant, provided by the Yakima, Sunnyside and Ellensburg branches, has been assigned to Mrs. Ingrid E. Reinton of Norway. Mrs. Reinton, who teaches at a high school for girls in Oslo, will study with the department of education of the University of Minnesota. Following her year in the United States, she will return to Norway to help in the revision of the school curriculum.

Mrs. W. D. Harris, chairman of the legislative committee, announced that as a part of its legislative program, the national association through its local branches is supporting federal aid to education with state control of the funds so obtained; the advance of educational television; the promotion of women to elective and appointive offices on the local, state and national levels.

A program of South American music was presented under the direction of Father Paul Funari, director of Catholic Chapel in Toppenish. Following this, Miss Thelma Pearce, who attended the London Conference of the International Federation of University Women in August, explained the work of the Federation and told of the highlights of the conference.
