His paintings have appeared in art shows in Hayward, Berkeley, Saratoga, the 1st Annual National Exhibition of the American Indian Artists, in Oakland, and currently quite a few of his paintings are on exhibit at the U.C. Medical Center here in San Francisco. It can easily be said that Nathan Olney, Jr., has come a long way in a short time and his name is getting around this part of California.

Nathan has many favorite medias of art including, silk screening, prints, and oils. He believes that a artist can get into a rut sticking to one form but the more fields you get into, the better reactions and work you will turn out. His main aim is to maintain good quality at all times.

His latest activity is working hand in hand with a Pueblo Indian, Mr. Santiago Romero who is a schoolteacher in Berkeley, California. Mr. Romero will be giving lectures to the school children on Indian heritage and Mr. Olney will present War Dances explaining the difference between tribes.
