Gentlemen:

I am enclosing several clippings, two of which are of interest to Yakima Claims 161.

I believe that Dr. Voegelin would be especially interested in the Story of Kamiakin. Chief of the Yakimas that appeared in the Venetchee ally World of Oct. 10. I had considerable difficulty obtaining a copy of this (and one for my own files) because of a short supply.

I believe it would be of especial interest were this clipping read, especially in the final paragraphs.

Judge Brown is a oted historian (locally) but is rather old and inform. I understand he is attempting to obtain publication but I doubt if it will come to pass unless he subsidies it as a vanity work and if it is any length, that would be prohibitive.

There ere many errors, but there is a fundamental trend that beers out the contention of the Vanapums relative to Kamiakin's claim. Then too there is the matter of the salouse and the last son of Kamiakin. Desides there is the microfilm material on the mid-columbia that shows Kamiakin claimed other land that was not his to claim.

In reference to the Priest Rapids clipping, you all note the proviso mentioned by the Federal Power Commission. and hopeful that this may also be obtained if and when a license is granted. hen the wanapass will here an opportualty to prove themselves different from the treaty Indians, in conduct and lack of greed as well as other ways.

The clipping perteining to Hill's Catle etc. is morely one of a series of historical writings.

I have received Effective Testimony for Scientific "itnesses and find it interesting as well as valuable." ould that I had possessed such three years ago! but as I have said before, I think an capable of learning quickly.
