A broad range of topics will be covered by members of the UW faculty and guest lecturers. Among the guest lecturers will be social work professors: Cora Bamford, Portland State College; Virginia Bellsmith, Columbia University; Nellie M. Hartman, University of Hawaii; and Louis Lehrman, University of Pittsburgh.

Afro-American Project

Lawrence Gossett, a junior History major at the University of Washington, has been employed on a part-time basis to coordinate the University Library's Regional Afro-American History Project, Richard C. Berner, University Archivist, announced today.

This project, in progress since 1964, is part of a general effort of the Library to collect original source materials in the field of ethnic history.

Gossett will search for community newspapers, correspondence, diaries, scrapbooks, pamphletaand selected church, civic organization and business records reflecting Negro history of the region. Tape recordings also will be made of recollections of pioneer Negro settlers and their descendants.

"From these sources, historians and social scientists will be able to write authoritatively about the problems, adjustments and contributions of Negroes in this region, "Berner explained. "The sources will allow the blending of minorities history more effectively into the mainstream of regional and U.S. history generally."

Berner said that although there has been great interest in Afro-American history among graduate students, adequate source materials have not been available. The greatest difficulty will be finding records and papers of those who were living in the region before World War II.

Afro-American Project Add 1

The Library has made a promising start by acquiring recent files of the Seattle NAACP, Seattle Urban League and the Jackson Street Community Council, as well as complete records of the Civic Unity Committee, the papers of Philip Burton, Sidney Gerber, the William Grose family and Harrison Caldwell, first Negro principal in the Seattle schools. Powell Barnett, whose father came to Seattle about 80 years ago, also has made tape recordings of phases of the early history.
