Colonel Samuel Cooper, Adjutant General, U.S.A. Sir:

I beg leave to call your attention to the subject of of (sic) my rank as a brevet major from the date of the bettle of Chapallpec, given on the 23rd of August, 1848 after the tour of service of the Voltigeur Regt in which I held a captaincy had expired.

I have never doubted my right to wear it as a badge of honor until degraded by the sentence of a court martial, or until a voluntary resignation, and am confirmed in this opinion by the concurrence of nearly every officer of the old army with whom I have spoken.

I am the more anxious to assume my brevet because I find myself ranked in my regiment by officers much younger than myself, all of whom, with the exception of one 1st lieutenant who retains his brevet majority, were second lieutenants while I was a captain in the Mexican war.

Please take the occasion (earliest before occasion) to lay this letter before the Secretary of War for his opinion.

wo Buttes Excerpts from military correspondence

Dalles of the Columbia, O.T.

To His "xcellency ob. "corge G. Curry overnor of Oregon territory ir:

In obedience to your order I took up the lie of march for the Yakima country on the 3d instant. On the ev ning of the 7th I arrived with my command in company with the U.S. troops under com and of Maj. Rains on the southern edge of the Yakima valley and encamped on the Simcoe "iver. On the morni of the 3th I detailed Cap. Cornelius wdd with twenty-fivemen from his commany "C" and ten men from each of the other commanies and directed the Capt. with his command consisting of about sixty-nie men to follow up the valley for the prose of recoinnerting the enemy and to driven in their stock if found in hat direction.

The remainder of the command proceeded over the valgy in the direction of the main Yakima on which I encamped for the night with U.S. troops i advance. During the day the rear, comprising Capt. Hembree's Co and Capt. "ayden's Co G found it n cessary to encamp some four miles inthe rear of the main body by reason of the inability of a sick man, who was carried on a litter, to proceed further.

(Hembree kill d from ambush on small patrol following year about where Alfalfa is located)

My command was thus separated i to three detachments. Shortly after I had formed my camp Maj Reins then about two miles in advance dispatched to me an express with information that he had discovered the I dians on the bank of the ri er opposite h s command. I immediately or ored out ant. Permett with about forty of h s company and bout twenty four o under Lieut Conner and w th them proceeded up the river to where I found the U.S. troops engaged in firing for the purpose

of dislodging some Indians who occupied the brush bordering the other (sic) on the eastern side of the river. fter a slight delay in finding a ford we succeeded in crossi g, the Andians in the meantime retreating to a high hill. "e p rsued them charging up the hill, the Indians firing at us a few shots during the ascent and then deserting their positions. We gave them pursuit over very difficult grounds but were compelled to relinquish our efforts to come up with them as there fresh horses weremuch superior to our own. It. Sheridan of the U.S. Army with some xwaxxxx twenty dragoons together with a few other ersons promptly followed us over the river and up the hill. he enemy continued thei retreat to the summit of a mountain, immediately to the northeast of the hill, whi e we retraced or course to the crossing of the river but found it too deep and rapid. In the attempt unfortunately two of the U.S. troops were drowned. "e retired to our camp after dark where we were prese tly joined by apt. Cornelius and his det chment. he capt. reported that he had been engaged by a superior force of the enemy for the last half of the afternoon that two of his party were severely wounded and me slightly and that several of his horses were injured during the en agement. The conduct of apt. Cornelius and the men under his command was highly creditable to themselves. they doubtless inflic ed considerable injury upon the enemy and brought into camp two head of cattle they had captured and retai ed during the fight.

On the morning of the 9th we moved in direction of the Gap in the range of hills through which the Yakima and are known as the "Two Buttes." Capt. Orn lius, hembree and bennett with their respective companies proceded in advance and rapidly drove the Indians from the plains and brush in the skirted the river to the position they had

previously attempted to fortify on the buttes. " sorge nt was sent back for the hewitzers to dislodge them, as the main butte was too steep for horses to scale. Lieut Piper and Day of the artillery came promptly upon the ground and fired a few shots but such was the elevated position of the enemy that the shells could not be thrown to reach them. The whole c mmand in due time having arrived an encampment was formed at the base of the buttes. Major Haller and Capt. Auger with their com anies and a large detachment from the volunteers nobly chir ed up the hills. The enemy with their accustomed prudence expended a considerable amount of ammunition at a very respectable distance at this force, and quickly fled down the op osite side. At dar our fires were blazing upon the summit of the butte which the Indians had occupied but an hour befor. The position of the enemy had selected was a strong one. They numbered about 300. "ith but little resolution they might have maintained their stronghold against our hole force, but it was wrested from them without the slightest in jury to the assailants. During the night the enemy occupied the butte but wth diminished strength. In the morning they were driven off. Capt. Tembree of o p and 1 wo com an les of Infantry under Capt. Walling and "ussell. (sic) This time however the enemy was less fortunate as two of their numb r were killed at the base of the ill. had detailed Maj. "rastrong with the commany of Capt. Hayden and a portion of om any under Lt Hannas (? difficult to decipher) to pass through the gorge and deplo to the left under the butte so as to surround and cut off the retre t of the enemy. wing to some in xo icable mistake this detachment did not follow the maj. but charged up the river, leaving a rap for the enemy to escape. During this ay detached parties scoured the plains in various directions havin slight skirmishes with +ndians and at night drove into c mp on the Atanham , considerable stock. This night our

encompment was two miles east of the mission. As the Indians had e idently abandoned that section of the country, Maj. ains was apprehensive they had congregated in the neighborhood of Natches (crossed out and Nisches inserted) pass to attack Capt. Maloney's command which was be leved to e approaching the Akima country through that pass.

"... I am satisfied that the resistance offered by their force at the pass of the Two Buttes was merely forthe purpose of gaining a little more time to a complish the remote r moval from the Yakima country of small scattered portions of their stock...

"e have routed and dispersed them wherever they could be found. "e have taken some of their stock, principally wild mares and colts about one hundred head of which we e sho by my orders as they were warned perfectly useless to our men and could not be guarded at night without mounting cuard with the whole company at once for that purpose

The fewc ttle which have been found were also wixx wild and have been killed forthe purpose of subsistance of the com and.

effected his retreat. I took some pains to examine the position which had occupied in his defence and saw ample evid noe of his having been surrounded by the enemy in very good force. The only matter of surprise is that he escaped with a single man

pir:

The Yakima "xpedition left amp No 1 on the 31st ct and marched only 4 mi es that day. We left amp No. 2 next morning and 4 miles further, arriving at amp No. 3 at or before 12 o'clock when we remained that day giving ample to me for all our wild and stray animals to be found and brought up.

At this last place after night you came and informed me that all the packers had banded together refusing to stand guard and the animals and I authorized you to discherge them and employ soldiers. It was impractical in the dark to collect the stray animals which I had directed to be picketed which was done but imperfectly and a believe fear was the cause of their conduct and thought from your remarks that an attempt to (disicipherable) to then there, but about 3 miles from the post of Fort Falles could cause them to disent, subsequently after advancing further I notified you that a would then compel them and you informed me that it was unsatisfactory as they had come to terms.

Our camping ground next day according to our guide McCoy (McCay) being lémiles off and findi from the above night that our whole force would be delayed going as per plan of campaign to the relief of troops and "aptain Maloney who might be fighting an enemy overwhelming in numbers, I det mined to march with such companies as were ready so as to reach the ground and our camp before night leaving the Dragoons and (2) companies to bring up the rear as the packers found their animals.

"e arrived at amp No. 4 sometime before sunset but without our bag age as that with the pack train and troops in rear to my surprise did not come up until late in the night on acc unt of the neglect of the packers as reported, not getting in time the animals struyed away.

I had a chain of sentinels put around the animals which came with us and at night they were picketed but those which came, contrary to my orders were suffered to loose and the consequence was the indians capture as per affadavit 24 horses and 5 mules. Your clerk, M. Planshaw (hard to decipher) from much experience thinks our loss smaller than usual on such marches, that may be so yet in the present case the packers wax were to blame and should not have gone off scott free; when I called upon you for an explanation.

In the morning of the Kidixxx 3rd of November, 1855 at camp on the Ko-insch Creek (Skloom's log house) twenty five horses and five mules were run off by the Indians as appears by the affidavit of dward conquil a packer andherder on duty that morning.

On the night of 9th of November 1855 at 'amp on the Yackima "iver twenty horses and four mules were run off by the Indians as appears by the affidavit of Danald "ckey a packer and herder on duty that night and by the affidavit of 'amuel D. Smith packmaster of the Expedition, one horse stampeded and run off and two horses and one mule were abandoned broken down and unable to travel...
