

Dear Dean:

Just checked with Archives regarding Agent Wilbur's reports from 1874-9. They are in the printed reports of the Department of the Interior of those years. They average about two pages in lengths. The books are available in most libraries so it might be easier to borrow them and copy the reports than to microfilm them.

The original copies, along with the accompanying papers have been lost. It seems that the printer claims he returned them to the Department of the Interior and the Department of the Interior Claims they never were received and that this argument has been going on for the last 75 years.

If you want copies made from the printed books it might be better to order from the Library of ongress. It seems that there is some sort of a geneleman's agreement between the Archives and the Library of Congress to the effect that the Archives will copy only manuscripts and that printed work will be reproduced at the Library. I'm quite sure any order sent in by mail would be taken care of at either place.

Dr. Herman J. Deutsch of the State College of Wash is at the Arvhives this week doing some research in Department of the Interior records.
