#### HISTORY OF ST. MARY'S CHURCH

White Swan, Washington

The history of St. Mary's Church, White Swan, had it's beginning seventy-five years ago. In July of the year 1889, the Yakima Indians held a meeting in North Yakima. At that meeting, Charley Mann publicly gave four acres of his land for the erection of a Church. The Right Rev. Aegidius Junger, D.D., was the Bishop of Nesqually at the time.

A note in an old expense account kept by the Rev. Victor Garrand, S.J., Superior of St. Joseph's Mission and Church at North Yakima, would seem to indicate that the Bishop was present at the meeting and publicly accepted the land in the name of God for the Church. The Yakimas agreed to furnish the material and necessary man power for the building of a Church. Early in the year 1890 they completed a frame building about 300 yards south-east of the present Catholic Burial Grounds at White Swan. This served as a Church for the Yakimas for thirty years.

On May 15, 1929, negotiations were begun for the acquirement of a new location for the erection of a new church. Simon Goudie had offered two and one-half acres of his land for a new Church in exchange for the four acres on which the old church stood. It was not until March 1, 1930, however, that word was received from the Department of the Interior approving the exchange. Work was begun immediately on the new structure. The Indians of the Yakima Tribe furnished much of the material and much of the help which went into the building of the Church. On July 8, 1930, the Most Rev. R. J. Crimont, S.J., Bishop of Alaska, dedicated the new Church to Mary the Sorrowful Mother.

Father Michael Simpson is at present Pastor of St. Mary's Church, White Swan. He succeeded Father John N. O'Dea who was the first Pastor of St. Mary's.





Our next duty is to render an act of thankfulness to those who have gone before us, who from the beginning until now have made this day possible. Out of the life of yesterday, out of the annals of things gone by, they step into our lives today.

#### THEIR FAITH IS LIKE A DIAMOND

The Diamond Jubilee of St. Mary's Church, White Swan, commemorates the abiding faith of the Catholics among the Yakima Indians. It was their faith that prompted them to ask their Bishop of seventy-five years ago their faith that prompted them to ask their Bishop of seventy-five years ago for a church where they could worship God. They donated the land, provided the materials, and did the work themselves. Also to the credit of their faith they donated the property for the present St. Maryls Church to replace the first church which had become inadequate after forty years of service, and again they contributed materials and much of the labor for the new church. On this day of jubilee the Catholics of the White Swan parish offer thanksgiving to God and to the memory of their forefathers for the faith which was because the distinct of the White Swan politics of the White Sw bequeathed to them from the days of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate whom Bishop A. M. A. Blanchet of Walla Walla sent to this region 117 years ago. Additionally they have a special feeling of gratitude in their hearts today for the sixty-nine years of service which the Jesuit Fathers rendered them in their mission church under the direction of the Bishops of Nesqually, Seattle, and Yakima.

To reward the faith of the Yakima Indians, it pleased me six years ago to elevate their mission to the status of a parish with a resident pastor. And the generous faith of the Yakimas finds it reward today in the presence of Father Michael Simpson, who lives among them as their pastor and who gives voice and gesture to Christ the High Priest, Who continues His life on earth through the priesthood.

The non-Indian members of St. Mary's Parish are the grateful beneficiaries of the faith of the Indians. On their part they have also contributed much to the development of the faith within the parish. Thus the Yakimas and the newcomers are all one in Christ before God's altar.

Over these seventy-five years our Biessed Lady of Sorrows, to whom the church is dedicated, has looked kindly upon the members of her church at White Swan whose faith has been like a diamond. It is strong and lasting, and it shines for all men to see.

May the faith remain and increase among the Yakimas and all who worship God in St. Mary's Church, White Swan.
