LOCAL: Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Salvation Army, Visiting Nurses, Washington Children's Home, Yakima Day Nursery, Yakima Dental Clinic, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A.

NATIONAL: USO, United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners Aid, Philippine War Relief, Belgian War Relief Society, United China Relief, American Relief for Czechoslovakia, American Relief for France, Greek War Relief Association, American Relief for Holland, American Relief for Italy, United Lithuanian Relief Fund, Friends of Luxembourg, American Relief for Norway, Polish War Relief, Russian War Relief, United Yugoslav Relief Fund, American Field Service, Refugee Relief Trustees, U. S. Committee for the Care of European Children.

What Will They Do With the Money?

Locally, the agencies will build character in our youth. The unselfish performance and unstinting sacrifices of our young people in the war have been conclusive evidence that basically our boys and girls have profited from the YMCAs, the YWCAs, Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts, and all the other agencies that represent the American way of doing things. The Salvation Army will continue to raise the fallen. The Day nursery will continue to free mothers for work. The Washington Children's Home will continue to care for orphans—and find good homes for them so that they become fit to carry their load as adults even as you and we. The agencies will do the things you would—if you had the time and facilities.

Can't They Get by With Less?

No. Nationally, the need is far GREATER than during the war because now we can get through to the war stricken lands to minister to their needs and help them help themselves. Locally, a committee composed of Mrs. Bert Broad, George Corbett, Walter Funk, E. J. Newcomer, F. W. Norgard, Walter Olofson, and

Don Sinclair, met eleven times. They scrutenized every item. Demanded proof of its necessity and effectiveness. OK'd only the most necessary expenses. The budget committee was far "tougher" than YOU would have been. Almost every budget was CUT after it was submitted.

This War Fund and USO, Are They Still Needed?

Yes! Definitely yes, even MORE now than during the war. Most of their services will be rendered in foreign lands. With our armies of occupation, where the boys are homesick, staying against their will, and with time hanging heavily on their hands. Ask any returned service man. Ask the man who was befriended by the USO, entertained, cheered and sent on his weary way with lighter heart. And think of the orphans of war devastated Europe—and China! Millions of war-robbed people will starve to death and freeze to death this winter despite our best efforts. We went all out for war. Let us not fail in the peace. Now comes the time of testing. Are we worthy of our victory?

Isn't There a Better Way to Raise the \$114,000.00?

Not to our knowledge. We welcome your suggestions, but the alternative to this drive is an individual drive for each agency or group of agencies. You would probably feel obligated to give substantially to each—and thus would find your contributions mounting—and getting out of control.

Suppose I Don't Like Some of the Agencies?

Then designate that your donation go only to the organizations you do approve. We will gladly handle your contribution this way.

This "Quota" Deal—Does Someone Tell Me What to Give?

Not at all! But many, many people frankly admit that they have no idea what would be

considered in keeping with the donations of others. Almost everyone wants to do his part. So, from the records and experience of our years of operation, we have set up figures which we hope will give people an idea of about what is proportionate. Please do not feel that we are attempting to tell you what to give. Your conscience is your best guide.

Why Should I Contribute More Than Last Year?

Because practically every agency is expanding its program . . . stepping up the amount of service to the community . . . meeting the new demands caused by reconversion to a peacetime world.

Do These Agencies Charge for Their Services?

War Fund agencies, No. Local agencies, Yes, partially. But to spread the benefits as widely as possible, the fees charged are but a fraction of the cost. If a person cannot pay, he is given service anyway. Our policy is that everyone should pay what he can. As the small fees do not add up to anywhere near enough to pay the cost of operating these agencies, WE must chip in and pay the difference.

Tax Allowances

ON CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE UNITED WAR CHEST DRIVE

Never has any government given such encouragement to the support of private philanthropy as does ours through generous income tax allowances for charitable contributions. The cost of contributions, both by individuals and corporations, is absorbed through tax allowances to the extent of from 18.4% to 88% in the case of individuals, and from 27% to 81% in the case of corporations. Hence it may be said that the government shares in the cost of each gift.


And your war won't be over when the white flags go up —no, not until the Service Flags come down on your street. Until then we have but one thought, one aim—to see it through.
