Brochure On Wakima Community Art Center

YAKIHA COLIUNITY ART CENTER

Me of the Yakima Valley Art Association extend greetings and welcome to you, members of the Mashington State Drama Association. This visit to our Community Center, (still in its first stage of construction), was included in your tour, not only because it will house a Little Theatre, but because in this project we have something unique in the State of Mashington and a project that can be achieved by any community that desires orneeds a center of this type. At the cuggestion of your convention committee we have prepared the following brochure trying to anticipate your questions on the Community Art Center, its history, its present and its future.

The story behind the Community Art Center begins with the organization of the Yakima Valley Art Association in 1945. A small group of Yakima people, keenly interested in the cultural progress of their community, formed this association which would have as its purpose: "to encourage, appreciate, perpetuate and educate in the field of all the arts". Perm ment rooms were rented classes in painting and crafts were started, and art exhibits were brought to Yakima under the association sponsorship. The same year the YVAn sponsred the formation of a Little Theatre Group. By 1948 membership had grown from somet ing under twenty-five to several hundred, and the varied activitities of the Association had outgrown its small meeting rooms. At the same time the Little Theatre Group had produced seven financially successful plays, but with inadequate rehearsal space and on a rented stage which that year was no longer available to them.

It was at this crucial point that Ir. Hon Gilbert, a local fruit man, himself interested in thecultural progress of Yalima, expecially in its influence on young people, donated to Yakima a large warehouse and tract of land. This donation was made by deeding the property to the YVAA with the stipulation that it was to be remodeled into a Community Art Center, and, in turn, the YVAA accepted the responsibility of raising the necessary funds to build and maintain this center.

The plans for the Community Art Center were drawn up by the Architects Association of Yakima, representing almst all local architects firms, andtheir services were donated to this community project. When completed, at an estimated cost of \$25,000, the Center will house:

le Little Theatre Audi torium (for plys and community events, lectures, musical events, etc.)

2. Art Gallery

3. Morkshop for the atre, metal andwoodworking classes

- 4. Workrooms for classes in painting, crafts, ceramics, children's art, sculpturing etc.
- 5. A large room foruse of community for banquets, meetings, dances, Boy Scout and Campfire meetings, and other club groups

6. Office h adquarters for YVAA

It is also ofinterest to note, that this land andbuilding donated by

lir. Gilbert is part of a five acre tract, which he has given to the city for a park.

Yakima Park Board plans call for maintenance of the Community Art Center surroundings when the park is built, as well as creation of an outdoor ampitheatre directly northeast of the building.

To date the Yakima Valley art association has raised approximately \$12,000 for its building fund. This money was raised entirely though memberships and income from Little Theatre plays.

As a first step approximately \$2,000 was spent erecting a temporary stage with lighting in the warehouse for the Little Theatre, installing a small heating plant, and in clearing and gravelling a parking area.

In July of this year, 1951, actual remodelling work began, and for an approximate investment of \$8,000 basic strengthening of foundations and roof, and partial completion of the Little Theatre auditorium was done. This sum includes surchase of 245 theatre seats and all bilding material needed to complete the interior of the stage and cover the theatre floor.

The Building Committee estimates that an additional 36,000 to 37,000 will be needed to complete the upper floor of the Center and install basic heating, plumbing, and wiring. Then this sum has been approximated construction will be resumed.

At present the YVAA anticipates, andhopes, that the Lt tle Theatrewill be able to present its first production on the mew stage by early next summer.

In the mountime the YVAA has maintained all its activities with an increase of membership and interest each year. At present the Association has two large cooms on a permanent rental basis in the basement of the Larsh Building for classes, petings, and rehearsals. In cooperation with the Yakima Valley Junior College, the VAA sponsors continuous art exhibits in Yaima's new Larson Gallery. The Little heatre has produced to date six successful plays on the temporary stage erected in the Warehouse. Their recent summer production, a melodrama, played to over 1500 cople in ten nights of performance, although remdeling was in progress and it was accessary to use canvas for one wall of the auditorium, and to perform on a shaky bage two feet less in widththan it had been.

Because of repeated questioning, we would again like to emphasize that all oney has been raised for the Building Fund from Little Theatre profits, and from memberships.

Il memberships of \$25.00 and over include tickets to 3 Little Theatre Plays for two in a family. At present the Little Theatre is 1 unching a drive to sell plaques for their 245 theatre seats at \$10.00 each. Until this year the YVAA had no paid employees, but this year have hiredan executive secretary on a part-time basis.
