I know Dr. Daugherty well enough from many years contacts with him to fall him Dick and when he started work around the Palouse country he asked for some of my material on the historical aspects of the Palouse Indians and that country, reports of my studies there etc.

Because I have some 10.000 books, I have material, including photographs in the books of such stone carvings as you described briefly, or at least enough like them to be some indication to you.

What amazes me is that no other artifacts of the kind described, with possibly one, have shown up anywhere in the Yakima country.

The "carving" which Harlan Smith described from the Tampico was a type of carving on a piece of bone, and I can show you a photograph of that in his @rchaeology of the Yakima Valley, a very rare book now.

I will also bring some lithographs from the 1880s of the Soda Springs country when there was a resort there and it was the vacation spot for many of the pioneers.

But I must wait impatiently until you feel better. Your mention of Charles Barnes broughtback memories of Mrs. Barnes (Pauline?) to show you some of my earlier acquaintanceships. Bux I have so many contacts in colleges and universities I am confident, that once I see the things you described I can betteradvise you as to what you would want to do, and logically, so there would be no doubt in your mind.
