Dear Mr. Relander:



n 1926 this beautiful early day residence property was presented to the Eastern Washington State Historical Society by Mrs. Helen Campbell Powell as a memorial to her mother and became the Grace Campbell Memorial Museum which now houses the extensive collection of historical and art material belonging to the Society.


An additional building connected with the

beautiful pioneer mansion, which is a priceless part of early day Spokane, and to be known as the Cheney Cowles Memorial Museum is being built and given to the Society by the members of the family of Major Cheney Cowles who lost his life in World War II.

The land on which the new building is being built has been given by Mrs. Powell as a memorial to her son, Lt. Allen Campbell Powell, a bomber pilot who lost his life when his plane went down in France.

To be completed and open to the public in 1959, the Museum buildings and the grounds are, indeed, fitting memorials to two fine young men and an enduring gift to the State of Washington and to the people of Spokane.
