Dear Mrs. Travis:

I note to express my appreciation for your attendance at the field day, and to enclose a couple of clippings, although you've probably seen one of them. I think we are getting very good reactions.

About your Piutes. I've more material on them than you will ever need, but it indicates that they all pulled out of the country around 1880-81 and I don't believe any of them came back. I've not yet bumped into the "Buffalo" name but will watch for it. It doesn't seem to tie into the Piutes.

When you have the opportunity, drop me a note telling me what specific lines on the Sincoe research you'd like to specialize in and I'll pass the word around so you can cooperate directly with other committee members working in that same field, and, so others can contribute things in your line they might encounter. Pick one or two fields and we'll turn them over to you, taking our time and just pegging along.

Also, write out any notes you accumulated on the trip at your convenience for the files, just sketch them out. Do the same with any interviews you develop.

Thanks again. Take it easy and don't be discouraged.
