

Would you take the trouble to glance through these pieces? Your booklet "The Yakimas" provided me inspiration for some remarks about the Wenatshapams. But I am obviously confused. The treaty of 1855 mentions the Wenatshapam Fishery and when it was sold it apparently included Lakes Wenatchee and Fish Lake. Our Wenatchee Chief Harmelt lived on land apparently given by treaty around Leavenworth, 25 miles from Lake Wenatchee. Could you suggest how I could solve the riddle of the two pieces of land that seem so similar, yet can't be? Where did Harmelt get his land?
