POPULATION OF CITIES AND TOWNS STATE OF WASHINGTON APRIL 1, 1961

Seattle, June 18, 1961. Today, the Washington State Census Board released official April 1, 1961 population figures for the 264 incorporated places in the state. These figures will be used by the state to determine the per-capita basis for distributing more than \$20,000,000 of tax monies to the cities and towns during the calendar year of 1962.

The combined population of the 264 municipalities was 1,742,305 on April 1, 1961. This is a gain of 2.1 per cent over the number of people (1,705,986) living in the 262 incorporated places in existence on April 1, 1960.

Three new municipalities, with a total estimated population of 13,900 at the time of incorporation, were organized between April 1, 1960, and April 1, 1961. These new places are: Mercer Island City (12,692), in King County, incorporated as a second-class city on July 19, 1960; Lake Stevens (900), in Snohomish County, incorporated as a fourth-class town on November 29, 1960; and Mercer Island Town (308), in King County, incorporated as a fourth-class town on September 1, 1960.

There was one municipal consolidation. Stanwood (646) and East Stanwood (477), in Northwestern Snohomish County, consolidated to form the new town of Stanwood (1,123) on May 26, 1960.

Population Growth and Decline: 1960 to 1961

The 262 municipalities in existence on April 1, 1960, increased by 1.3 per cent (21,960 persons). Seventy-three of the 262 incorporated places increased by 3 per cent or more during the past year, and 15 decreased by 3 per cent or more. There were 174 places which remained relatively constant (changed by less than ± 3 per cent).

About 73 per cent (16,121) of the net growth took place in Western Washington, and Eastern Washington accounted for about 27 per cent (5,839). However, in comparing percentage change separately for Western and Eastern Washington, little difference is noted -- municipalities in Western Washington increased 1.3 per cent; those in Eastern Washington increased 1.2 per cent.

In Western Washington, 29.1 per cent of the 133 incorporated places increased between 1960 and 1961, while 2.3 per cent decreased, and 68.6 per cent remained the same or experienced less than 3 per cent increase or decrease. In Eastern Washington 26.4 per cent of the 129 incorporated places increased, while 9.3 per cent decreased, and 63.3 per cent stayed relatively the same.

During the past year, the gain of 36,319 inhabitants of incorporated places is attributable to new incorporations (14,359), annexations (9,046), and natural increase (excess of births over deaths) and net migration (12,914). Annexations and new incorporations accounted for 64.4 per cent of the net gain. Excluding new incorporations (14,359), the 262 incorporated places existing on April 1, 1960 gained 41.2 per cent by annexation and 58.8 per cent by natural increase and net migration.

In Eastern Washington, the greatest percentage growth since April 1, 1960 occurred in East Wenatchee (122.7), Westlake (34.2), Soap Lake (16.2), Warden (14.1) and Riverside (11.9). Spokane (1,192), Moses Lake (808), Wenatchee (474), Ephrata (473) and East Wenatchee (470) had the largest absolute gains. Of the cities and towns in this part of the state reporting declines in population, Entiat (19.9), Rock Island (16.9), Reardan (11.2), Waverly (11.1) and Malden (9.6) had the largest per centage loss, while Medical Lake (445), Entiat (71), Newport (66), Reardan (53) and Rock Island (44) show the largest absolute population decreases.

East Wenatchee, which had the largest relative increase since April 1, 1960, annexed two parcels of land including about 498 residents. Entiat's sharp decline was due primarily to the relocation of 100 homes outside the corporate limits, necessitated by the encroaching waters of the Columbia River when the Rocky Reach Dam was finished.

In Western Washington, Mossyrock (25.0), Port Orchard (18.8), Bonney Lake (18.6), Yacolt (17.6) and Index (17.1) had the largest percentage gains, while Bremerton (5,078), Tacoma (1,021), Mountlake Terrace (913), Seattle (913) and Centralia (664) reported the largest absolute increases in population. The largest percentage population declines were reported for Carnation (4.3), Sumas (3.0) and La Center (2.9), while Oak Harbor (42), Carnation (21) and Sumas (19) declined most in number of persons.

The relatively large population increment in Bremerton during the past year was due to four territorial annexations which included the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. The population increase of Mossyrock resulted from an influx of construction workers on the Mayfield Dam and a new bridge across the Cowlitz River.

Factors Influencing Population Change in Incorporated Places

In the year between April 1, 1960 and April 1, 1961 several general interrelated factors have been operative in influencing population change in the incorporated places in the state of Washington. Some of the most important factors were: climate, shifts in labor force, varying economic conditions, changes in institutional populations, the continuing trend of suburbanization, and territorial annexations.

Inclement weather throughout most of the state this spring curtailed logging operations, particularly at higher altitudes, and threat of frost in the valleys tended to limit the influx of migrant farm labor to many incorporated places. On the other hand, migrant labor disputes in California influenced some farm laborers to move to Washington earlier than in previous years.

Especially in recent years, the lack of employment opportunities for high school graduates has been a growing problem in many parts of the state. Estimates have been made suggesting that 75 per cent of high school graduates leave Okanogan and Douglas County areas in order to seek work in other parts of the state. In an effort to find a solution to this problem, the Washington State Employment Security Department initiated special counselling and testing programs in many areas for youths of high school age.

The overall economy of the state has lost momentum since April 1, 1960. Several parts of the state, including King, Snohomish, Pierce, Clark and Spokane Counties, which comprise the metropolitan areas of the state, have been classified as areas of labor surplus. Areas of "labor surplus" represent those areas with 6 per cent or more of the total labor force classified as unemployed. In contrast, the central and southeastern parts of the state -- areas in and around Moses Lake, Yakima, Richland - Pasco - Kennewick and Walla Walla -- show low unemployment rates.

Some sectors of the economy have shown increased activity since April 1, 1960. Employment in retail trades, education, aircraft and missile complexes is greater than a year ago. Increased federal spending in certain areas has been a significant factor, particularly in the Moses Lake - Ephrata area where Larson Air Force Base now includes activities of the Strategic Air Command and a Titan missile installation.

Change in institutional population accounted for much of the change in municipal population in Port Angeles, Bellingham, Cheney, Ellensburg, Pullman, Burlington and Medical Lake. For example, Medical Lake lost 478 persons as a result of decreases in resident patients and staff at Eastern State Hospital and Lakeland Village.

The suburbanization trend is clearly evident in areas adjacent to the larger metropolitan cities of the state. Population increases in Mountlake Terrace, Bellevue, Normandy Park, Des Moines, and Lynnwood in the Seattle area illustrate this trend. Also, areas surrounding Spokane, Ellensburg, Pullman and Walla Walla have had similar although less spectacular rates of growth.

Annexations have continued to play an important role in the growth of cities and towns throughout the state. Population of cities and towns in Western Washington gained about 7,900 by annexation compared to approximately 1,200 in Eastern Washington. There was a total of 35 annexations in the entire state between April 1, 1960 and April 1, 1961. In Western Washington the following five cities reported the largest number of persons in annexed territory: Bremerton (4,866), Kent (520), Port Orchard (520), Vancouver (234) and Renton (234). In Eastern Washington three incorporated places reported annexation of 100 or more persons -- Wenatchee (500), East Wenatchee (409) and Ellensburg (113).

Comparative Size of Municipalities

The April 1, 1961 populations of incorporated cities and towns in the state of Washington range from 65 in Hatton (Adams County), to 558,000 in Seattle. The average (median) municipality has 1,072 residents -- that is, one-half of the 264 incorporated cities and towns have populations greater than 1,072 and one-half have less. Warden (Grant County) with a population of 1,083 and Republic (Ferry County) with 1,061 residents are nearest to the average size of municipality.

There are 26 cities with populations greater than 10,000 and 112 municipalities between 1,000 and 10,000 in number of inhabitants. The remaining 126 incorporated places have less than 1,000 residents.
