Dear Mr. Relander:

I must apologize for the delay in answering your letter, but I have been out of the city plus being involved in tax problems.

We would be able to cast a plaster from your clay, but it would be very difficult for you to transport your clay as you say so it might be better for you to make your own plaster. If you do, it would be better if the piece were in sections with something like a Roman joint as this would make preparation of waste molds easier.

If you would like us to do the plaster, the cost would be approximately \$300.00 for a five foot piece and \$350.00 for a six foot piece.

We would certainly recommend bronze in preferance to any other material. Actually, the cost would be little if any higher than aluminum or other metals.

The price of a completed patinaed work from the plaster would be \$950.00 for a five foot piece and \$1,125.00 for a six foot piece.

We always hesitate to give an exact quotation from a single photograph and it might be possible to work out a more favorable figure after we had further details. As an example it might be possible to work at least a part of the figure directly from clay to bronze by use of a rubber mold so we would like an opportunity of discussing this in more detail.

The Indian head could certainly be done this way which would cut the cost as you could obtain both a plaster (or hydrastone) and a bronze from the same mold. Including the making of the mold, this would cost \$275.00 in either polished aluminum or bronze. If you would want the mold made from a plaster cast, the cost of the plaster would be \$40.00. Again, it might be possible to modify these figures somewhat when we saw the actual piece.

Mr. Ckick Relander -2-January 26, 1965 The third piece, again, including mold cost would be approximately \$275.00 (plus \$40.00 for plaster if necessary) for the area marked in ink, if this is a bas-relief. If this is a figure in the round, the full cost of the bronze would be \$400.00 plus \$85.00 for the making of the plaster. I hope you will find these prices interesting and as I have said we would welcome the opportunity of going further into these problems with you. Dear Mr. Relander:

I will try to answer some of the questions in your letter of February 13.

In making the bronze casting we always provide some means of attachment to the base. If we use internal gating, we usually drill and tap the gate so that a bolt can be inserted in it or, if this is not available, we can weld some sort of a lug to the base for drilling and tapping. We can always work out something and the method often depends upon the size and shape of the piece.

I can't answer your question regarding the cost of second figures too exactly but on a figure in the round with a total cost of \$400.00 the mold cost would run somewhere between 75.00 and 126.00 which could be deducted from the cost of the second piece. Another example would be a portrait head costing \$250.00 where the mold cost would be approximately 50.00 and the second piece would therefore cost approximately \$200.00.

It is always possible to make one piece now and another piece or pieces at a time in the future.

On delivery time, we would like to have approximately 90 days from the date of delivery of either the clay or the plaster at our plant. It is always better to allow as much time as possible since it is always possible that we might encounter unforseen difficulties and it is impossible to hurry this type of high quality work.

If the piece is to be ready for dedication early in November, we should probably plan on shipping it from here by the middle of October at the latest so the very last possible date to start would be July 15. However, if we could get started early in June

it would be particularly helpful because vacation periods during the summer are always a problem on production schedules.

I certainly hope that you can talk them into casting the heads rather than leaving them in hydrostone since the bronzes would certainly be far more inpressive. I am confident that if we did one in bronze to show how it would look that they would want all of the others in the same medium.

I do hope that this answers your questions and I will look forward to hearing from you further after your meeting next week.

Dear Mr. Relander:

I was delighted to hear that we are making progress on your work to be cast in bronze and I can sympathize with you on all of the many complications in trying to tie the loose ends of your negotiations together.

The biggest pieces we have done were 12 foot figures for Lorenzo Fenci which were installed about a year ago at a new office of the Home Savings & Loan at Burbank Blvd and San Fernando Road, in Burbank. Unfortunately our only good picture of these was sent out and never returned.

However, I am enclosing a photograph of a 5 foot figure which we cast as a fountain piece for Tom Van Sant which was installed at the Gibralter Financial Corporation. While this is considerably different from what you have in mind it is for the same type of use. Please be sure to return this photograph to me for our files.

I am also enclosing a picture of a piece which we have recently cast for Jacques Schnier who is head of the art department at the University of California and which was included in one of his recent shows. This piece was approximately 3 feet high. I am also enclosing a catalog for a show of Albert Wein which is currently being held at the Heritage Gallery in Los Angeles and I have indicated by red check marks two of the figures which we cast for him. Actually, we cast several other figures for the show which were not included in the catalog.

We have worked for many other artists and did a number of pieces for Robert Russin, head of the Art department at the University of Wyoming among others. I am enclosing a copy of a letter which we received from Walla Walla College describing a plaque which we designed for Professor Bowers which has since been installed in the college. This is in your neighborhood in a very general sort of way.

I hope that all of this will give you the ammunition which is necessary for you but drop me a line or give me a call if there is anything further I can do for you.

First let me thank you for the very excellent Delicious apples which you sent. The people in Classic Bronze thoroughly enjoyed their box and I have distributed at least some of mine at this end of the plant.

Next let me thank you for the check which you enclosed with your letter of October 20. This was certainly not necessary, but, after thinking it over I have decided to accept it in the spirit in which I know it was offered. Don't be too surprised if you do receive some bronze work in exchange as I think that the price will be adequate to include a couple of private dividends.

Several of the molds are completed and all of them are processed except the Ladder of Life itself and Tom Papaleo is preparing the separation lines on that himself at the present time. Dear Click:

I have just returned from a trip to the frigid East and have your letters of January 24 and January 29.

All of the waxes have been completed and retouched. Incidently, Tom tells me that he spent far more time than he had anticipated to do an outstanding job of retouching on the waxes and he hopes that when the final settlement is made it may be possible to obtain some premium for this extra work. We can discuss that later.

The first of the three bronzes will be cast by the end of this week and the balance of them will be coming through on a regular schedule. I will write you again to let you know how they look and of course we will immediately start with work on chasing and patina.

When the final agreement was issued, the date was set for March rather than February and we will complete shipment sometime before March 15.

Unfortunately the last thing on the schedule which was worked out is the base of the fountain, but I am trying to have them move that ahead as we cannot supply a pattern until that one piece is completed. We will certainly be able to let them have this pattern within the next couple of weeks.

Your letter did not arrive until most of the waxes were invested or cut up for investment so we could not take any pictures of them. Photographs of the pieces in the shell would be meaningless, but I will ask Dick Evans to take some shots of the casting before all of the work

As you say in that letter, we had planned on having you do quite a bit of the retouching and, since there would have been expenses involved for your trip down here, an additional charge probably would not increase the total cost of the project materially.

I have your letter of February 7 and I am enclosing an extra copy of this letter so that you may make it available to Jack Park.

As you say in that letter, we had planned on having you do quite a bit of the retouching and, since there would have been expenses involved for your trip down here, an additional charge probably would not increase the total cost of the project materially.

I have talked this over with Tom Papaleo and he feels that an amount of \$300 could be justified very easily. Actually he feels that even this would not reflect the additional total cost, but suggests it as a good compromise figure.

On the smaller figures we plan on pulling a plaster from the molds which we will send you and, when you compare them with the finished bronzes, I know that you will be delighted with the results of the retouching. The Drummer has now been completed, ready for patina, and we are very proud of the result as we know you will be.

I feel sure that this letter will reach you in Yakima before you make your trip to Ephrata and, I wouldn't blame you a bit if you were to postpone your trip if the weather gets bad.

A couple of the other heads have been cast but not dleaned up as yet so we are showing vary definite progress.

Dear Click:

I have your letter of February 25 regarding the bronze plaque.

It would be possible for us to do the sculpture for this plaque from photographs. It would be desirable if this were done to have several photographs with one marked as the one to be duplicated.

The cost for this would be \$250 and we would submit a plaster of the sculpture for approval prior to casting.

We have had a number of commissions of this kind which have been very well received. One of these jobs was for Walla Walla College and I am enclosing a copy of the letter of appreciation we had regarding that.

We do suggest a special procedure on plaques of this kind which gives a better reproduction of the likeness than the technique used for plaques which contain only lettering. This makes the price slightly higher and it would run \$.40 a square inch and \$.20 a letter. Based upon a 22 X 38 plaque we would have 836 square inches which at \$.40 a square inch and \$.20 a letter would be just under \$375.

This same price would hold true if we were to receive the sculptured likeness. If that were done, it would be better if it were supplied in hydracal since we did not want to try to copy directly from wax in case of accident.

It would be necessary to plan from four to six weeks to do the sculpture and present a model for approval. The finished plaque after approval of the sculpture could be produced in

a maximum of four weeks. As you have seen, we hand chase each letter on plaques of this kind which does take longer but does give a very beautiful result.

Dear Click:

I have just checked with our insurance agent and he tells me that he can arrange for insurance on both shipments to include the time you have the pieces in Yakima. I assume that you will not have them for more than thirty days and this is what we will cover them for unless I hear from you to the contrary.

I can't give you an exact price for the coverage yet, but we do a lot of business with these people and I know it will be kept to a minimum.

I have given Tom a copy of your letter of February 18, giving shipping instructions and I hope that all of the pieces will be sent to you by the early part of next week at the latest. They have all been cast and finished so the only thing is the patina and Tom was working on that when I was out in the shop this morning.

I have also spoken to Tom about the small quantity of paint and he will make this up for a shipment to you. He tells me he will have to ship this in a tin can, but recommends that you remove it from the can and place it in glass immediately when you receive it as it will deteriorate if stored in metal.

The plasters are not yet completed so they will come forward in a separate shipment.

We will include the BAS Relief Plaque, which I believe is for you and not the PUD, in the main shipment but I cannot see that should create any complications. I think that you will agree that this turned out very well.

I am sure that we will be able to work out the additional charge for the extra work. What we will probably do is

Click Relander, Cont'd What we will probably do is make out an invoice for \$300 and send it to you so that you can try to get them to issue the necessary voucher. I don't believe we ever did decide definitely what other pieces would be cast off for you personally so let me have your thoughts on that. I have asked that a copy of the Fisherman be made in bronze, possibly because this appeals to me very much, and this will go right into work. As you will see when you compare the original of the Drummer with the bronze, Tom did a tremendous job of retouching on it and we would almost have to make another mold to duplicate the bronze. We could make a bronze more nearly like the plaster without so much trouble but it would not be nearly as good as the one we are shipping for the PUD. Let me hear from you as to whether you would like to have anything in addition to the Fisherman in bronze and I think you will be delighted when you see the work which has been completed.
